

Important note

Correctional Populations in the United States presents numbers that describe persons under some form of correctional supervision. In this compilation the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) seeks to help users by—

- making readily apparent the links between different correctional institutions or methods in each State
- suggesting the similarities and differences between States and regions as our system of criminal justice responds to both common and disparate needs
- permitting comparisons, however limited they must be, with previous years' statistics.

Helping readers find a single number

Through an **index** at the end of the volume, readers can find all topics treated in the tables. The index numbers refer to the tables.

Footnotes give extra information about how to interpret the numbers in the tables.

Category definitions are available in three places: the explanatory notes in the appendixes of sections, the questionnaires also in the appendixes, and the definitions of common terms in the Introduction on page 3.

To make comparisons across years or between jurisdictions

BJS makes every effort to report numbers that are consistent in interpretation with those of the past and between separate jurisdictions in the present. Data collection rules and reporting protocols that fit historical statistics and that impose the least burden on respondents are used.

Some jurisdictions depart from the reporting conventions, and some categories for counting have shifted over the years. Users who try to draw conclusions from such numbers by comparing years or jurisdictions must take into account special circumstances and changes. Footnotes, table notes, explanatory notes, and other material highlighting the tables must be consulted for a full understanding of the data.

History of U.S. corrections statistics

In 1850 the Federal Government, in cooperation with the States as a part of the Seventh Decennial Census, initiated a count of prisoners in 32 States and in the territories of Minnesota, New Mexico, Oregon, and Utah. Between 1850 and 1870, U.S. marshals administered the census of prisoners as part of a special schedule of social statistics. The 1880 report indicated there were 61 prisoners in State institutions per 100,000 residents. By 1890, Nevada had the highest per capita rate among the States, 203, and Wyoming had the lowest at 16. In that same year New York had 136 prisoners per 100,000 residents, and California had 169.

In 1910 the introduction of the indeterminate sentence was described in prisoner statistics; 21% of State prisoners on January 1 had received such sentences. The 1923 report said that more than a half of the prison admissions that year were under indeterminate sentences and observed that such sentences resulted in wide ranges between minimum and maximum sentences and disparities in setting release dates. In 1926 the Bureau of the Census began the annual collection of prisoner statistics, and the report for that year described the goal of the effort as the collection of data to "show the application of penal policies for various classes of offenders and in different parts of the country." That first annual report in 1926 provided information by jurisdiction on admissions, releases, sentences and time served, inmates under sentence of death, recidivism, and crowdingissues of major concern today.

During the past 60 years the partnership between the Federal Government and the States and localities in collecting corrections data has grown and prospered.

In 1950 the program was transferred from the Bureau of the Census to the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) in the Department of Justice and in 1971 to the predecessor agency of the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS), the National Criminal Justice Information and Statistics Service of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA). LEAA added the statistical series on local jails (1970), parole (1976), and probation (1979).

All of the major reporting series and projects of the corrections unit, Bureau of Justice Statistics, are outlined under "Data sources" below. The Bureau of the Census serves as the data collection agency for these series. When Congress created the Bureau of the Census in the late 19th century, it charged the agency with the responsibility to account for prisoners. That involvement has continued intermittently and in various forms until the present, as shown in the following chronology that sketches the evolution of the statistical reports grouped in this volume:

- 1904. Prisoners and Juvenile Delinquents, 1904, reported movements rather than individuals. Prison officials served as enumerators.
- 1923. Prisoners, 1923, presented adults separate from juveniles.
- 1926. Prisoners in State and Federal Prisons and Reformatories began as an annual report that continued until 1946. The report included a special section on prisoners under sentence of death. From 1946 to 1970 the Bureau of Prisons published the annual figures. The Law Enforcement Assistance Administration followed for 9 years until BJS was created in 1980. (The Bureau of the Census has acted as collecting agent since 1972.)

- 1947. The Bureau of Prisons began the separate annual reports on prisoners under sentence of death. The LEAA and then BJS continued the reports until 1984. The Bureau of Justice Statistics will continue to publish annual bulletins about the death penalty and persons sentenced to death; the more detailed statistics will appear in the corrections volume.
- 1965. The National Council on Crime and Delinquency (NCCD), a nongovernmental organization, started the Uniform Parole Reports project under Federal contract.
- 1970. LEAA conducted its first 1-day count of jails. LEAA also began the national census of jail facilities. The census was repeated in 1978, 1983, and 1988.
- 1974. LEAA, with the Bureau of the Census, surveyed a national random sample of offenders in State prisons. The survey, repeated in 1979 and 1986, collected information about personal background and criminal history and inquired about drug and alcohol usage.
- 1976. The NCCD and LEAA annual reports covered parole data beginning in 1976.
- 1978. The Bureau of the Census counted prisoners in U.S. jails; the Bureau repeated the complete enumeration in 1983.
- 1979. The first annual report on parole and probation appeared, published by BJS. This Department of Justice agency will continue issuing summary reports, reserving detailed data for the corrections statistics volume.
- 1982. The Bureau of the Census completed the first annual jail sample survey for BJS. Bulletins containing data from the sample survey will be supplemented by the corrections volume.

Definitions of common terms used in the tables

Custody. To have custody of a prisoner, a State must hold that person in one of its facilities. Early statistical reports gave custody counts that largely have been replaced by jurisdiction counts of State prison populations. A State may have custody of a prisoner over whom another State maintains jurisdiction. For example, State A's prison burns, and then State Z houses the A inmates temporarily. State Z has custody; State A has jurisdiction. The tables present both kinds of counting procedures, with jurisdiction counts being more complete; States that report only on custody are noted.

Detention status. This term distinguishes between prisoners, usually in jail, who were convicted or who were awaiting judgment.

Discretionary parole. A release from prison to supervision is discretionary when it is decided by a board or other authority.

Goodtime. When correctional authorities deduct time from a prison or jail sentence, often to reward or to encourage good behavior, they give goodtime. When the goodtime is tied to a specific action, such as working in a prison industry or performing a meritorious deed, it is called "earned."

Hispanic origin. A person of Hispanic origin may be of any race; however, a few States treat the ethnic category as a racial one. Reporting officials usually rely on selfdefinition, but some States classify according to surname.

Jurisdiction. Jurisdiction refers to a unit of government or to the legal authority to exercise governmental power. According to the latter meaning, the prisoners under a State's jurisdiction may be in the custody of local jails. (See "custody.")

Mandatory parole. Mandatory parole results from statutory and correctional guidelines, and no judgment by a panel or board is required for release of a prisoner to supervision outside of prison.

Maximum sentence length. Some jurisdictions sentence offenders to a range of years; the larger number in that range is the most that a prisoner may serve on a sentence. Often, goodtime is subtracted from the maximum sentence. When the tables report on prisoners with sentences longer or shorter than a year, the maximum sentence is used where applicable.

Movement. In corrections, a movement is an admission to or a release from a status-prisoner, parolee, or probationer. A transfer between facilities does not, unless specifically noted, count as a movement.

One-day count. For a 1-day count a jurisdiction or facility is asked to report how many people were on its roll on a certain day. The average daily population is a year's total number of people on the roll each day, divided by the number of days. The methods of counting in aggregate do not yield estimates of either the number of persons in a status during a year or the average amount of time persons remain in a status.

Race. Classification by race often depends on the reporting program and the State. A few States reported two categories: white and nonwhite. A few others categorized Hispanic offenders as belonging to "other race." Numbers of persons with certain racial backgrounds were sometimes estimated.

Reporting time. The prison, probation, parole, and capital punishment figures are from December 31, 1988, unless otherwise noted. The Bureau of the Census conducted a census of jails on June 30, 1988; they previously took a complete census of jails on June 30, 1983.

Revisions. Many States revise the yearend number reported for the previous year. Those revisions are made in the total, not the detail. For example, the numbers of blacks, whites, and members of other races for 1987 were not changed by a State in 1988 to equal its revised 1987 total.

Youthful offender status. State legislatures create the youthful offender status through statutes that provide for special sentencing, commitment, or record-sealing procedures for young adult offenders adjudicated in a criminal court, as opposed to a juvenile court. The offenders may be above the statutory age limit for juveniles but below a specified upper age limit.

NPS-1B. Advance yearend count of prisoners; emergency releases because of prison crowding; rated, operational, and design capacities of prison facilities.

NPS-8A. Yearend count of persons in prison under sentence of death.

NPS-8B,8C. Complete survey of States to determine any significant changes in statutes or case law relating to the death penalty.

NPR-1. Yearend count, admissions, and releases of persons on probation by jurisdiction.

UPR-1. Yearend count, admissions, and releases of persons on parole by jurisdiction.

CJ-5. Annual sample survey of local jails to estimate the population of jails in jurisdictions holding a daily average of more than 100 people.

CJ-5A. Annual sample survey of local jails to estimate the population of jails in jurisdictions holding a daily average of fewer than 100 people.

Special studies of recidivism

BJS has conducted two major studies of the arrests and convictions of offenders after they are released from prison.

Recidivism I. This project analyzed arrests and convictions of a cohort of offenders paroled from prison in 20 States. It has incorporated into the parole records FBI data on each parolee's contacts with criminal justice agencies. The selected offenders were 18 to 22 years of age when they were released from prison in 1978.

Recidivism II. This data collection program permits analysis of criminal justice contacts through 1986 for a sample of 16,000 prisoners released from prisons in 11 States in 1983. The effort merges FBI, State, and local police records with correctional records.

Explanatory notes

1988 National Jail Census

All figures for June 30, 1988, are derived from the 1988 National Jail Census. For further information, refer to the explanatory notes in the section on the census of local jails in 1988 and to the corresponding CJ-3 questionnaire.

1987 Annual Survey of Jails

The 1987 survey was the fifth annual collection sponsored by the Bureau of Justice Statistics and conducted by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. This series follows a similar effort made by the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration during the 1970's.

The sample surveys yield estimates of the national jail population for those years that lack a complete enumeration. Full censuses were done on February 1, 1978, June 30, 1983, and June 30, 1988.

The 1987 survey, conducted on June 30, included 1,135 jails in 866 jurisdictions-counties, municipalities, or townships that administer 1 or more jails. A jurisdiction with an average daily inmate population of 100 or more in the 1983 census automatically entered the survey. Such units of government, referred to as certainty jurisdictions, accounted for 611 jails and 224,811 inmates, or 76% of the total estimated inmate population.

Administrators of jails in jurisdictions with large jail populations reported the number of inmates held because of crowded facilities elsewhere, the jail capacity, and the reasons for court orders, if any. The other jurisdictions in the survey belonged to a stratified random sample of jurisdictions with an average daily inmate population of less than 100.

The survey excludes five types of facilities from the count:

- lockups that house persons for less than 48 hours
- Federal facilities
- State facilities
- privately operated facilities
- the combined jail-prison systems of Alaska, Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Rhode Island, and Vermont.

Data were obtained through mailed questionnaires. Two followup mailings and phone calls elicited a response from 95% of the sampled jails not in a certainty jurisdiction (a jurisdiction with such a large population that it has 100% certainty of entering the sample). Ninety-seven percent of the facilities in jurisdictions with large populations responded.

Explanatory notes by jurisdiction

Because many jurisdictions update their population counts, the January 1, 1988, numbers may differ from those previously published for December 31, 1987.

Alabama

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because of cases that were included in 1988 but not in 1987.

Alabama was unable to show status of probation separately (table 3.3).

Alaska

Alaska was unable to show movement data.

The jurisdiction was unable to show status of probation separately

Alaska's intensive probation supervision program was in the testing phase and thus was not fully implemented.

California

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because probation departments conducted caseload inventory counts and adjustments after December 31, 1987.

In California, probation is a county function. These data, collected by the California Department of Justice, cover convicted defendants who are active supervised cases in county probation departments.

The jurisdiction was unable to give specific data on entries, race, ethnicity, type of offense, status of probation, and type of exit.

California estimated the number of men and women on probation.

Colorado

Colorado estimated the exit data for "incarceration with new sentence" and "incarceration under current sentence" (table 3.6).

For offense type, DWI is included under "misdemeanor" (table 3.10).

Connecticut

"Other exits" includes "discharged absconders," "discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant," "incarceration with new sentence," "incarceration under current sentence," and "death" (table 3.6).

Connecticut estimated the data for race, ethnicity, and type of offense.

Delaware

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because of an estimated 1987 population figure.

Delaware estimated all numbers in the detailed categories.

"Active supervision" includes all absconders (table 3.4).

For offense type, DWI is included under "misdemeanor" (table 3.10).

District of Columbia

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because the 1987 figure did not include the inactive bench warrant caseload.

For exits, "incarceration under current sentence" includes "incarceration with new sentence" (table 3.6).

The District of Columbia estimated the data for sex, race, ethnicity, and type of offense.

Florida

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because of adjustments made to the population counts.

"Inactive supervision" includes all absconders (table 3.4).

Florida estimated the data for sex and race, and these data are based on the fiscal year ending June 30.

The jurisdiction estimated the data for ethnicity (table 3.9).

For offense type, DWI is based on 31.8% of the new cases assigned to the Salvation Army for misdemeanant probation (table 3.10).

Georgia

"Other probation status" includes abandonment and bastardy as well as unknowns (table 3.3).

"Other entries" includes abandonment and bastardy, interstate compact cases, and suspended sentences (table 3.5).

"Other exits" includes abandonment and bastardy, special terminations, and cases transferred out of State. Georgia is in the process of transferring abandonment and bastardy cases to the Department of Human Resources. The termination of these cases is reflected under "other exits" (table 3.6).

"Other offense type" includes suspended sentences as well as abandonment and bastardy (table 3.10).

All data exclude probationers who have been sent to another State for supervision and include those supervised in Georgia from other States.

Nlinois

Illinois estimated the data for sex, race, ethnicity, and type of offense.

Indiana estimated all numbers in the detailed categories.

Kansas

For exits, "incarceration with new sentence" includes "incarceration under current sentence" (table 3.6).

Kentucky

The population counts exclude inactive cases.

"Completion of probation" includes release from active supervision, release by court order, expiration of sentence or probation, and closed cases. "Other exits" includes dismissed cases (table 3.6).

Louisiana

Louisiana estimated most of the data.

Maine

Maine estimated most of the data.

Maryland

"Other supervision status" includes "delinquent in custody" (table 3.4).

"Other exits" includes "unsatisfactory closings" (table 3.6).

All absconders are not included in the population counts.

Massachusetts

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because of the number of cases supervised out of State and data entry changes.

Absconders are removed from such status after 30 days.

"Unknown offense type" includes felonies and misdemeanors (table 3.10).

Michigan

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because the earlier numbers reflected the total offender population under supervision in 1987, not just the probation population.

Michigan estimated all numbers in the detailed categories.

Minnesota

The December 31, 1987, count does not include cases supervised by the Alternative Sentencing or Case Manager Programs.

Minnesota estimated the number of exits and the numbers in the sex and race categories.

Missouri

Missouri estimated the January 1, 1988, count.

"Other exits" includes 21 transfers, 1,405 closings, and other exits (table 3,6).

Montana

Montana estimated all numbers in the detailed categories, relying on actual counts from the past.

Nebraska

Because Nebraska included juveniles in their statistics, the approximate numbers are based on percentages of totals.

Nevada

"Other entries" includes "probation without incarceration" and "probation with prison or jail sentence" (table 3.5).

Nevada estimated all data.

New Mexico

New Mexico does not count in its active caseload probationers supervised out of State and absconders.

"Other exits" includes semiactive, interarea transfers (table 3.6).

New York

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because more current data were available after the 1987 survey was completed.

North Carolina

For exits, "incarceration under current sentence" includes "incarceration with new sentence" (table 3.6).

North Carolina estimated some numbers in the detailed categories.

Ohio

Absconders and probationers supervised out of State are included in the inactive case counts (table 3.4).

Oregon

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because of the late entry of admissions and closures.

Oregon estimated some numbers in the detailed categories.

Rhode Island

"Probation without incarceration" includes "probation with prison or jail sentence" (table 3.5).

South Carolina

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because of corrections to the management information system.

Texas

"Other exits" includes "discharged absconders," "discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant," and "incarceration with new sentence" (table 3.6).

Utah

Revoked or discharged cases of probation are included under "completion of probation" (table 3.6).

Vermont

Vermont's probation system has no absconder status.

Virginia

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because of computer data updates and editing.

"Probation without incarceration" includes "probation with prison or jail sentence" as well as 499 "restored to supervision," 1,148 "received from other States," and 71 "returned from other States" (table 3.5).

Explanatory notes

The 1988 Census of Local Jails was the fifth enumeration of local confinement facilities since 1970. As in previous censuses, the U.S. Bureau of the Census conducted the mail canvass for the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS).

The 1988 census included 3,316 locally administered jails that held inmates beyond arraignment (usually for more than 48 hours) and that were staffed by municipal or county employees. Eight jails that were privately operated under contract for local governments were also included.

Excluded from the census were physically separate drunk tranks, lockups, and other holding facilities that did not hold persons after they had been formally charged, as well as all Federal and State facilities, including the combined jail-prison systems of Alaska, Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Rhode Island, and Vermont. Five locally operated jails in Alaska were included.

The facility universe was derived from the National Justice Agency List, maintained by the Bureau of the Census for BJS. Following revision of the 1983 questionnaire and pretests, the final census form was mailed to 3,448 facilities during the week of August 1, 1988. Fortyfour jails were added to the initial mailing, and 176 were deleted, leaving a final count of 3,316 facilities. Extensive followup by the Bureau of the Census staff and State statistical analysis center directors resulted in a 100% response.

The race of Hispanic inmates and Hispanic staff was not completely reported. The census results were not subject to sampling error. Other types of errors, such as respondent misinterpretation and mistakes in processing and data presentation, were kept to a minimum through repeated manual and computer edit checks.



Hispanic prisoners and prisoners of unknown race: Include 74 men and 1 woman, Hispanics, categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

Unsentenced prisoners: Include 92 holds for the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service and 43 holds for the U.S. marshal.

Mississippi

New court commitments: Include a small number of shock probation violators.

Other admissions: Inmates awaiting a parole revocation hearing as well as returns from appeal or bond.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Other conditional releases: Include supervised earned releases. Governor's suspensions of sentence. and Emergency Powers Act releases.

Other releases: Inmates who went back to prison pending a parole revocation hearing that subsequently returned them to community supervision.

Missouri

Missouri revised the previously reported December 31, 1987, population of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

New court commitments: Include some shock probation commitments. May also include other conditional release violators returned to prison.

Parole violators without new sentences: Include some parole violators with new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Race: Numbers estimated.

Montana

Montana revised the previously reported December 31, 1987, population of male inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Parole violators without new sentences: Include some other types of conditional release violators with new sentences.

Nebraska

Parole violators without new sentences, men: Include some parole violators with new sentences.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Other admissions, female: Inmate housed in State mental facility, custody movement only.

Transfers, female: Inmate housed in State mental facility, custody movement only.

Nevada

New court commitments: May contain a small number of returns from appeal or bond.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Hispanic prisoners: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

New Hampshire

New court commitments: Include some prisoners returned from appeal or bond and may include other conditional release violators with or without new sentences.

Parole violators without new sentences: Include parole violators who receive new sentences after readmission to prison.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

New Jersey

New Jersey revised the previously reported December 31, 1987, population of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

New court commitments: May include some transfers from other jurisdictions.

Other admissions: Inmates housed in county facilities to ease crowding who have not yet been entered into the department's information system.

Other conditional release violators without new sentences: Prisoners returned (some with new sentences) from the intensive supervision program, an experimental program operated by the Administrative Office of the Courts. The program provides a sanction that in severity lies between incarceration and probation. The category may also include some conditionally released prisoners returned with new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other conditional releases: Prisoners released to the intensive supervision program.

Total custody population and categories for admissions and releases: Include 483 men held in jails to ease prison crowding.

Other race: Hispanic inmates who are not classified as white or black.

New Mexico

New Mexico revised the previously reported December 31, 1987, population of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Parole violators without new sentences: May include parole violators with new sentences.

Other admissions: Include diagnostic evaluation admissions.

Other conditional releases: Releases to community corrections program.

New York

New court commitments: Include parole violators and other conditional release violators with new sentences.

Transfers from and to other jurisdictions: Transfers from and to the Department of Mental Hygiene for psychiatric treatment.

Other admissions: Types of admission unknown at the time of data collection.

Unspecified causes of death: Causes unknown at the time of data collection.

Other releases: Types of release unknown at the time of data collection.

Hispanic prisoners and race: All Hispanic inmates, white and black, are categorized as white.

North Carolina

Population, admissions and releases counts: Based on custody data.

Parole violators with new sentences: Include some parole violators without new sentences and some other conditional release violators with or without new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Sentencing information, partially suspended sentences: Some prisoners serve sentences in which the term in prison is partially suspended, to be completed under probation. They were categorized with inmates sentenced to 1 year or more only when the prison portion of their sentences exceeded 12 months. Although the maximum sentences of all such prisoners were more than 1 year, nearly all of them were included with those prisoners having sentences of 1 year or less. As a result, the counts of population, admissions, and releases of inmates with more than 1 year maximum sentences are understated, and the population count of inmates with maximum sentences of 1 year or less is overstated.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Paroles: Include some supervised mandatory releases.

Other releases: Residual not accounted for in other categories; used to adjust the movement data to the yearend total.

Category estimates, sentencing: Population totals are actual; however, sentence length populations, more than 1 year or 1 year or less, are estimated.

North Dakota

New court commitments: Include some parole violators with new sentences.

Other conditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Ohio

Ohio revised the previously reported December 31, 1987, population of male inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Sentencing information: The yearend total of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year includes some inmates with sentences of 1 year or less.

New court commitments: Include some other conditional release violators with new sentences.

Transfers: Include only prisoners transferred between prison and Ohio's Forensic Unit.

Other unconditional releases: Sentences vacated by courts.

Other conditional releases: Extended furloughs from prison to parole supervision, as in preparole and medical furloughs.

Race and Hispanic origin: Actual counts only of jurisdictional inmates in Ohio's custody.

Oklahoma

Category estimates, admissions by sex: Numbers of men and women in each admission category are estimated.

New court commitments: Include an undetermined number of conditional release violators with or without new sentences.

Sentencing information: The counts of population, admissions, and releases of inmates with sentences of more than 1 year may include a very small number of inmates with sentences of 1 year.

Other admissions: Include 4 inmates inadvertently dropped from the count and 1 unknown type of admission.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other unconditional releases: Include legislative cap releases (Senate Bill 445).

Other releases: Types of release unknown at the time of data collection.

Race and Hispanic origin: Numbers estimated.

Hispanic prisoners: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

Oregon

Oregon revised the previously reported December 31, 1987, population of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Parole violators without new sentences: Include some returned parolees whose revocation status was unknown at the time of admission.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Inmates recommitted after a court-ordered release.
Other unconditional releases:

Court-ordered releases.

Unspecified causes of death: Death certificates were not received for 2 inmates who died while on furlough.

Race and Hispanic origin: Numbers estimated.

Pennsylvania

Parole violators with or without new sentences: Include 1,254 men and 39 women returned to State incarceration by the Board of Probation and Parole. They entered on their original sentences and not as technical or convicted parole violators. Their count was divided between violators with new sentences and violators without new sentences according to the ratios of actual convicted or technical parole violators. Thus, 527 men and 22 women were categorized as parole violators with new sentences, and 727 men and 17 women were categorized as parole violators without new sentences.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases and offenders who paid fines.

Other conditional releases: Inmates released to the jurisdiction of the Department of Parole and Community Corrections under the Emergency Powers Act.

Tennessee

Tennessee revised the previously reported December 31, 1987, population of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Parole violators with new sentences: Include parole violators without new sentences and other conditional release violators with or without new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Releases to parole: Include some mandatory releases to supervision.

Prisoners housed in jails to ease prison crowding: The 1,610 inmates classified as men include some women.

Unknown race: Includes all inmates who are not classified as white or black.

Texas

Population, admissions and releases counts: Based on custody data.

Parole violators with or without new sentences: All parole violators reported as having new sentences.

Other conditional release violators with or without new sentences: All conditional release violators reported as having new sentences.

Other admissions and other releases: Include an adjustment for inmates counted as being released even though they remained in the jurisdiction of a prison. Include prisoners returning from or leaving for long-term bench warrants and medical furloughs.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Unspecified causes of death: Causes unknown at the time of data collection.

Race: Texas used two categories, white and nonwhite.

Hispanic prisoners: Classified as prisoners of unknown race.

Utah

Utah revised the previously reported December 31, 1987, population of male inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Other unconditional releases: Include inmates whose sentences were terminated by the Board of Pardons.

Other releases: Types of release unknown at the time of data collection.

Vermont

Parole violators with or without new sentences: May include an undetermined number of other conditional release violators returned.

Combined prison and jail populations: Numbers reflect the population of an integrated jail and prison system. "Lockups" operated by some cities and counties are excluded.

Population counts: Made December 15, 1988.

Race: Numbers estimated, with less than 0.5% of the men classified as nonwhite.

Virginia

New court commitments: May include a small number of prisoners returning from appeal or bond.

Parole violators without new sentences: Include an undetermined number of parole violators with new sentences.

Transfers from other jurisdictions: Include inmates admitted to begin Virginia sentences or to continue Virginia sentences. Thus, transfers from other jurisdictions may be slightly overstated, and new court commitments may be slightly understated.

Unspecified causes of death: Unspecified in the Virginia data system for some deaths.

Other releases: Types unknown at the time of data collection.

Prisoners housed in jails to ease prison crowding: Include those with outstanding warrants and those being held in jail.

Unknown race: Includes all inmates who are not classified as white or black.

Washington

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Hispanic prisoners and prisoners of unknown race: Prisoners of unknown race include Hispanics and inmates with mixed racial origins.

West Virginia

Population, admissions and releases counts, men: Based on custody data.

New court commitments, men: Include parole violators and other conditional release violators with new sentences.

Conditional releases, probations, men: Include some releases to court jurisdiction of inmates declared unfit to remain in a particular minimum security facility.

Other releases: Court-ordered releases for which conditions, if any, are unknown.

Jurisdiction population total, men: Excludes some inmates awaiting pickup from jails where they were housed solely to ease prison crowding.

Racial composition: Estimated.

Wisconsin

Wisconsin revised the previously reported December 31, 1987, population of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Transfers from other jurisdictions: An undetermined number of inmates may be included in other admissions categories,

Other conditional releases: Special Action early releases.

Other releases: Court-ordered releases for which conditions, if any, are unknown.

Wyoming

Population, admissions and releases counts: Based on custody data.

New court commitments: May include a small number of administrative turnovers—the start of a consecutive sentence.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Unconditional releases, expirations of sentence: May include a small number of administrative turnovers—the end of one sentence to be followed by another.

Other releases: Releases to detainers.

Race and Hispanic origin: The totals are actual; the counts of men and women in each category are estimated.

COVERAGE

Some jurisdictions revise their caseload counts from year to year because of audits, late reporting, or altered reporting practices; therefore, the January 1, 1988, numbers may differ from those previously published for December 31, 1987.

Alabama

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because of the late reporting of 23 local early discharges and the addition of 24 at the start of 1988.

For adults entering or leaving parole, Alabama provided no details (tables 6.4 and 6.5).

The jurisdiction did not report the data for sex and sentence length. "Unknown ethnicity" includes Hispanic parolees (table 6.6).

The jurisdiction estimated the number of white and black parolees at 40% and 60%, respectively.

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because of 300 mandatory parolees who were not previously reported.

Alaska included parolees supervised out of State under "active supervision" (table 6.3).

All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Arizona

"Other entries" includes 274 interstate compact cases (table 6.4). "Other discharges" includes 7

early discharges (table 6.5).

Arizona estimated the data for sex, race, Hispanic origin, and sentence length.

"Unknown race" includes 763 Mexican-Americans and Mexicans (table 6.7).

Arkansas

Discharged absconders in 1987 were no longer kept in the caseload and were not reported in the yearend population counts. In December 1988, Arkansas had 181 absconders, 68 of whom had absconded during

Arkansas is phasing out "inactive supervision" and replacing it with "annual reporting." "Inactive supervision" includes 86 "inactive" and 48 "annual reporting" (table 6.3).

California

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because of late adjustments to the beginning count.

"Absconded from supervision" includes only California Youth Authority (CYA) parolees. Other absconders in California were placed in an inactive caseload and were omitted from the yearend population counts (table 6.3).

Entries increased since 1987 because of approximately 11,000 mandatory releases from prison. "Other entries" includes 240 CYA parolees and 33 released from awaiting delivery or from noninstitutional locations (table 6.4).

All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. The 937 "other discharges" adjust categories to the total (table 6.5).

"Unknown race" consists of 2,233 American Indians, Alaska Natives, Asians, and Pacific Islanders as well as 18 Filipinos who could not be shown separately (table 6.7).

Colorado

Parolees who had absconded or who were supervised out of State were reported under "active supervision" (table 6.3).

All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. Colorado does not report transfers to other States as discharges (table 6.5).

Colorado_estimated the data for adults leaving parole, sex, and race.

"Unknown race" includes 33 Cubans and Mexicans (table 6.7).

Connecticut

"Unknown race" includes 59 Hispanic parolees and 2 persons of unspecified race (table 6.7).

The yearend population counts include absconders, 10 of whom were changed to absconder status during 1988.

Delaware

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because the 1987 figures were estimated.

"Active supervision" includes absconders. Current absconders are placed indefinitely in an inactive caseload and are included in the yearend population counts (table 6.3).

All persons returned to prison or jail with a new sentence, with parole revoked, or with charges pending were reported as having been discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant. Parolees transferred to other States were similarly counted. All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Delaware estimated the data for sex, race, Hispanic origin, and status of supervision.

The jurisdiction did not supervise persons released from prison after less than 1 year of incarceration.

District of Columbia

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because of the subtraction of 175 parolees supervised from other States who were accidentally included in the 1987 report. Only District parolees are now included in the counts.

The jurisdiction estimated the data for mandatory releases from prison, persons supervised out of State, parolees returned to prison or jail with a new sentence, and those whose parole was revoked.

Absconders are never discharged. There is a warrant kept for them as long as they remain in that status. Of the 653 absconders reported, 185 were changed to absconder status during 1988.

The race of American Indians, Alaska Natives, Asians, and Pacific Islanders was reported as either black or white. "Unknown race" includes 39 persons of unspecified race (table 6.7).

Idaho

"Other entries" includes 1,509 absconders who reentered the parole system without prison (table 6.4).

All categories of adults leaving parole except "discharged as absconder" were reported under "successfully completed parole." All persons returned to prison or jail with new charges pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. "Other discharges" includes 227 data adjustments (table 6.5).

Current absconders are placed indefinitely in an inactive caseload and are omitted from the yearend population counts.

Florida estimated the data for race.

Georgia

The yearend population counts include parolees supervised out of State. "Active supervision" includes absconders (table 6.3).

All persons returned to prison or jail with charges pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

Georgia estimated the data for sex and race.

Hawaii

Hawali reported data for the fiscal year July 1, 1987, to June 30, 1988.

"Other supervision status" includes 32 parolees from other States.

"Other entries" includes 32 parolees from other States and an adjustment residual of 228 (table 6.4).

All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. All persons returned to prison or jail with charges pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with a new sentence. "Returned to prison or jail with parole revoked" includes an undetermined amount of technical violators. "Other discharges" includes 166 suspended parolees (table 6.5).

Of 166 absconders reported, 65 were changed to absconder status during 1988.

All persons returned to prison or jail with charges pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with revocation pending (table 6.5).

Idaho estimated the data for sex and status of supervision.

Illinois

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because the 1988 figure reflects the number of prison cases supervised in Illinois, plus absconders and cases supervised out of State on December 31, 1987. The 1987 figure did not accurately reflect these data.

"Other entries" includes 623 parolees transferred from other States.

Illinois estimated all demographic data from the percentage distribution of 14,733 parolees under active supervision. The jurisdiction had no demographic information on absconders and parolees supervised out of State; therefore, the data for sex, race, Hispanic origin, and status of supervision are estimates.

Illinois monitors only parolees with a sentence of 1 year or more.

The yearend population counts include 1,071 absconders, 769 of whom were changed to absconder status during 1988 (table 6.2).

"Discharged as absconder" and "discharged to detainer, warrant" are included under "successfully completed parole." All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

"Unknown race" includes 981 Hispanic parolees and 9 persons of unspecified race (table 6.7).

Indiana

Current absconders were terminated from parole and were not included in the yearend population counts. All of the 229 absconders reported with supervision status were changed to absconder status during 1988.

Indiana estimated the number of American Indians, Alaska Natives, and Hispanic Americans (table 6.7). Iowa monitors only parolees with a sentence of 1 year or more.

Current absconders were terminated from parole and were not included in the yearend population counts.

"Discharged to detainer, warrant" is included under either "successfully completed parole" or "discharged as absconder." All persons returned to prison or jail with a new sentence or with revocation or charges pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Kansas

"Discharged as absconder" and "discharged to detainer, warrant" are included under "successfully completed parole." All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were not reported as discharges. "Other discharges" includes 188 discharged absconders, 242 expirations of sentence, and 79 out-of-State discharges (table 6.5).

The jurisdiction estimated the data for race and Hispanic origin.

Kansas monitored 374 absconders apart from the regular parole caseload and did not include them in the yearend population counts. Of the 188 parolees who absconded in 1988, an unknown number remained in that status at yearend.

Kentucky

Kentucky reported inactive cases under "active supervision" (table 6.3).

"Discretionary entries" includes mandatory entries. "Other entries" includes 406 interstate transfers (table 6.4).

"Successfully completed parole" includes releases from active supervision, final discharges, and closed cases. All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Kentucky did not report demographic or sentence length data.

Maine

Maine abolished parole in 1976. There are now 41 pre-1976 parolees under supervision, with 35 in prison who will eventually be eligible for parole.

Maryland

"Other supervision status" includes 690 parolees in some form of custody (table 6.3).

Absconders are included in the yearend population counts. Of the 836 absconders reported, 145 were changed to absconder status during

Michigan

"Other discharges" includes 2 parolees discharged by court (table 6.5).

"Unknown race" includes 23 persons of unspecified race (table 6.7).

Minnesota

"Unknown entries" includes 329 persons on work release (table 6.4).

"Discharged as absconder," "discharged to detainer, warrant," and "transferred to another State" are included under "successfully completed parole." All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked

"Unknown race" includes 40 Spanish-speaking parolees and 4 persons of unspecified race (table 6.7).

Mississippi

The jurisdiction placed absconders indefinitely in an inactive caseload and omitted them from the yearend population counts.

Mississippi reported mandatory entries as discretionary entries. "Other entries" includes 1 work release and 8 supervised earned releases (table 6.4).

"Unknown race" includes 4 Hispanic parolees as well as persons of unspecified race (table 6.7).

Missouri

"Other supervision status" includes 215 parolees in custody (table 6.3).

"Discharged as absconder" is included under "successfully completed parole." All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. All persons returned to prison or jail with charges pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with a new sentence (table 6.5).

"Unknown race" includes 27 persons of unspecified race (table 6.7).

Montana

Montana estimated all demographic data from past populations as well as the number of persons leaving parole.

All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. Nebraska

"Unknown race" includes a combination of 24 nonwhites and blacks. "White race" includes American Indians, Alaska Natives, Asians, and Pacific Islanders (table 6.7).

New Jersey

"Active supervision" includes absconders (table 6.3).

All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. "Other or unknown status" includes 14 persons recalled by court or discharged by paroling authority decree (table 6.5).

New Mexico

Absconders are placed indefinitely in an inactive caseload.

Discretionary entries and reinstatements were reported as mandatory entries. "Other entries" includes 121 parolees from other States (table 6.4).

All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. Those discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant were also reported as parole revocations. "Other or unknown status" includes 489 closed, semiactive, and out-of-State cases (table 6.5).

"Unknown race" includes Asians and Pacific Islanders (table 6.7).

New York

"Discharged as absconder" and "discharged to detainer, warrant" are included under "successfully completed parole." Persons returned to prison or jail with revocation pending were reported as having been returned with a new sentence, and those returned with charges pending were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

"Unknown race" includes 9,065 Hispanic parolees (table 6.7).

New York did not report parolees from county jails (245 in 1988).

North Carolina

"Other entries" adjusts categories to the total (table 6.4).

North Carolina does not dismiss absconders; instead, warrants are issued for life or until the absconder is found.

All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were reported as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. Those discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant were also reported as parole revocations (table 6.5).

"Unknown race" includes Asians and Pacific Islanders (table 6.7).

North Dakota

The December 31, 1987, count differs from the January 1, 1988, count because of a recent conversion to an automated system of reporting.

North Dakota has a new statute that "freezes" time to be served for discharged absconders and for those discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant. The statute affected no one in 1988.

"Active supervision" includes absconders (table 6.3).

"Unknown race" includes 2 Hispanic parolees (table 6.7). There are parolees within the prison system who have to serve consecutive sentences and who are not included in this report.

Of the 3 absconders reported with supervision status, all were changed to absconder status during 1988 (table 6.3).

Ohio

Ohio places absconders indefinitely in an inactive caseload and omits them from the yearend population counts.

"Other entries" includes 186 parolees supervised in other States (table 6.4).

"Discharged to detainer, warrant" is included under "successfully completed parole." "Other discharges" includes 112 interstate compact cases closed for reasons other than final release (table 6.5).

Ohio did not report the data for sex, race, Hispanic origin, and sentence length.

Oklahoma

Oklahoma estimated the data for sex, race, and Hispanic origin.

"Unknown race" includes Asians, Pacific Islanders, and 28 Hispanics as well as 2 persons of unspecified race (table 6.7).

A small number of parolees with a sentence of less than 1 year may be included under "1 year or more" (table 6.8).

Oregon

Mandatory releases from prison and reinstatements were reported as discretionary releases from prison (table 6.4).

"Discharged as absconder" includes 63 parolees discharged while on absconder status and 379 cases closed due to absconding, although the parole authority retains jurisdiction if/when the offenders are caught. All persons returned to prison or jail with a new sentence, with their parole revoked, or with revocation or charges pending as well as those discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant were reported under "other discharges" (table 6.5).

"Unknown race" includes 205 Hispanics and persons of unspecified race as well as persons reported as having parents of different races (table 6.7).

Explanatory notes

The statistics reported for capital punishment may differ from data collected by other organizations. The differences occur for a variety of reasons:

- Inmates under sentence of death are originally added to the National Prisoner Statistics (NPS) counts when they enter correctional facilities rather than when judges pronounce sentence.
- Following the year when prisoners are first counted, their admissions or releases as a result of court order are attributed to the year for the sentence or court order. For example, a prisoner sentenced in November 1986 and entering prison custody in January 1987 would be counted as an admission in the 1987 report; the 1988 report would count him or her as being under sentence of death at yearend 1986. Similarly, a prisoner whose sentence is overturned in 1986 but who remains in the count until 1988 when the court's decision is reported would be subtracted from the 1986 and 1987 reports.
- NPS counts of persons under sentence of death are always for the last day of a calendar year and thus will differ from more recent counts.

Correctional Populations in the United States, 1987, failed to include 19 inmates who either were reported late to the NPS program or were not in the custody of State correctional authorities at yearend 1987: Florida (1), Georgia (1), Missouri (1), Nevada (1), Ohio (3), Oklahoma (7), Pennsylvania (4), and Tennessee (1). Twenty-five inmates had sentences to death removed in 1987 but were not reported: Alabama (1), Arizona (4), California (1), Florida (9), Georgia (1), Illinois (3), Louisiana (1), Mississippi (1), North Carolina (1), Pennsylvania (1), South Carolina (1), and Tennessee (1).

In 1988, 5 male prisoners of the Armed Forces were under a military death sentence for murder.


