BJS makes every effort to report numbers that are consistent in interpretation with those of the past and between separate jurisdictions in the present. Data collection rules and reporting protocols that fit historical statistics and that impose the least burden on respondents are used.

Some jurisdictions depart from the reporting conventions, and some categories for counting have shifted over the years. Users who try to draw conclusions from such numbers by comparing years or jurisdictions must take into account special circumstances and changes. Footnotes, table notes, explanatory notes, and other material highlighting the tables must be consulted for a full understanding of the data.

History of U.S. corrections statistics

In 1850 the Federal Government, in cooperation with the States as a part of the Seventh Decennial Census, initiated a count of prisoners in 32 States and in the territories of Minnesota, New Mexico, Oregon, and Utah. Between 1850 and 1870, U.S. marshals administered the census of prisoners as part of a special schedule of social statistics. The 1880 report indicated there were 61 prisoners in State institutions per 100,000 residents. By 1890 Nevada had the highest per capita rate among the States, 203, and Wyoming had the lowest at 16. In that same year New York had 136 prisoners per 100,000 residents, and California had 169.

In 1910 the introduction of the indeterminate sentence was described in prisoner statistics; 21% of State prisoners on January 1 had received such sentences. The 1923 report said that more than a half of the prison admissions that year were under indeterminate sentences and observed that such sentences resulted in wide ranges between minimum and maximum sentences and disparities in setting release dates. In 1926 the Bureau of the Census began the annual collection of prisoner statistics, and the report for that year described the goal of the effort as the collection of data to "show the application of penal policies for various classes of offenders and in different parts of the country." That first annual report in 1926 provided information by jurisdiction on admissions, releases, sentences and time served, inmates under sentence of death, recidivism, and crowding-issues of major concern today.

During the past 63 years the partnership between the Federal Government and the States and localities in collecting corrections data has grown and prospered. In 1950 the program was transferred from the Bureau of the Census to the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) in the Department of Justice and in 1971 to the predecessor agency of the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS), the National Criminal Justice Information and Statistics Service of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA). LEAA added the statistical series on local jails (1970), Probation (1979), and parole (1976).

All of the major reporting series and projects of the corrections unit, Bureau of Justice Statistics, are outlined under "Data sources" below. The Bureau of the Census serves as the data collection agency for these series. When Congress created the Bureau_of.the Census in the late 19th century, it charged the agency with the responsibility to account for prisoners. That involvement has continued intermittently and in various forms until the present, as shown in the following chronology that sketches the evolution of the statistical reports grouped in this volume:

1904. *Prisoners and Juvenile Delinquents, 1904* reported movements rather than individuals. Prison officials served as enumerators.

1923. *Prisoners*, *1923* presented adults separate from juveniles.

1926. Prisoners in State and Federal Prisons and Reformatories began as an annual report that continued until 1946. the report included a special section on prisoners under sentence of death. From 1946 to 1970 the Bureau of Prisons published the annual figures. The Law Enforcement Assistance Administration followed for 9 years until BJS was created in 1980. (The Bureau of the Census has acted as collecting agent since 1972.) **1947.** The Bureau of Prisons began separate annual reports on prisoners under sentence of death. The LEAA and then BJS continued the reports until 1984. The Bureau of Justice Statistics will continue to publish annual bulletins about the death penalty and persons sentenced to death; more detailed statistics will appear in the corrections volume.

1965. The National Council on Crime and Delinquency (NCCD), a nongovernmental organization, started the Uniform Parole Reports project under Federal contract.

1970. LEAA conducted its first 1-day count of jails.

1974. LEAA, with the Bureau of the Census, surveyed a national random sample of offenders in State prisons. The survey, repeated in 1979 and 1986, collected information about personal background and criminal history and inquired about drug and alcohol use.

1976. The NCCD and LEAA annual reports covered parole data beginning in 1976.

1978. The Bureau of the Census counted inmates in U.S. jails; the Bureau repeated the complete enumeration in 1983.

1981. The first annual report on parole and probation appeared, published by BJS for 1979. This Department of Justice agency will continue issuing summary reports, reserving detailed data for the corrections statistics volume.

1982. The Bureau of the Census completed the first annual jail sample survey for BJS. Bulletins containing data from the sample survey will be supplemented by the corrections volume.

Definitions of common terms used in tables

Custody. To have custody of a prisoner, a State must hold that person in one of its facilities. Early statistical reports gave custody counts that largely have been replaced by jurisdiction counts of State prison populations. A State may have custody of a prisoner over whom another State maintains jurisdiction. For example, State A's prison burns, and State Z houses the A inmates temporarily. State Z has custody; State A has jurisdiction. The tables present both kinds of counting procedures, with jurisdiction counts being more complete; States that report only on custody are noted.

Detention status. This term distinguishes between inmates, usually in jail, who were convicted or who were awaiting judgement.

Discretionary parole. A release from prison to supervision is discretionary when it is decided by a board or other authority.

Good Time. When correctional authorities deduct time from a prison or jail sentence, often to reward or to encourage good behavior, they give *good time*. When the good time is tied to a specific action, such as working in a prison industry or performing a meritorious deed, it is called "earned."

Hispanic Origin. A person of Hispanic origin may be of any race; however, a few States treat the ethnic category as a racial one. reporting officials usually rely on self-definition, but some States classify according to surname.

Jurisdiction. Jurisdiction refers to a unit of government or to the legal authority to exercise governmental power. According to the latter meaning, the prisoners under a State's jurisdiction may be in the custody of local jails. (See "Custody.")

Mandatory Parole. Mandatory parole results from statutory and correctional guidelines, and no judgment by a panel or board is required for release of a prisoner to supervision outside of prison.

Maximum sentence length. Some jurisdictions sentence offenders to a range of years; the larger number in that range is the most that a prisoner may serve on a sentence. Often, good time is subtracted from the maximum sentence. When the tables report on prisoners with sentences longer or shorter than a year, the maximum sentence is used where applicable.

Movement. In corrections, a movement is an admission to or a release from a status—prisoner, parolee, or probationer. A transfer between facilities does not, unless specifically noted, count as a movement.

One-day count. For a 1-day count a jurisdiction or facility is asked to report how many people were on its roll on a certain day. The *average dally population* is a year's total number of people on the roll each day, divided by the number of days. The methods of counting in aggregate do not yield estimates of either the number of persons in a status during a year or the average amount of time persons remain in a status.

Race. Classification by race often depends on the reporting program and the State. A few States reported two categories: white and nonwhite. a few others categorized Hispanic offenders as belonging to "Other race." Numbers of persons with certain racial backgrounds were sometimes estimated. **Reporting time.** The prison, probation, parole, and capital punishment figures are from December 31, 1989, unless otherwise noted. The Bureau of the Census surveyed jails on June 30, 1989; they previously took a complete census of jails on June 30, 1988.

Revisions. Many States revise the yearend number reported for the previous year. Those revisions are made in the total, not the detail. For example, the number of blacks, whites, and members of other races for 1988 were not changed by a State in 1989 to equal its revised 1988 total.

Youthful offender status. State legislatures create the youthful offender status through statutes that provide for special sentencing, commitment, or record sealing procedures for young adult offenders adjudicated in a criminal court, as opposed to a juvenile court. The offenders may be above the statutory age limit for juveniles but below a specified upper age limit.

NPS-8B,8C. Complete survey of States to determine any significant changes in statutes or case law relating to the death penalty.

NPR-1. Yearend count, admissions, and releases of persons on probation by jurisdiction.

UPR-1. Yearend count, admissions, and releases of persons on parole by jurisdiction.

CJ-5. Annual sample survey of local jails to estimate the population of jails in jurisdictions holding a daily average of more than 100 people.

CJ-5A. Annual sample survey of local jails to estimate the population of jails in jurisdictions holding a daily average of fewer than 100 people.

CJ-42. Census every 5 years of all State-operated, community based correctional facilities to record their characteristics.

CJ-43. Census every 5 years of all State prison facilities to record their characteristics.

CJ-3. Census every 5 years of all jail facilities to record their characteristics.

NPS-8. Characteristics of persons admitted to, under, or released from, a sentence of death during the year.

NCRP-1B. Individual record data on each offender released from prison during the year, covering data contained in NCRP-1A, offenses and sentences since admittance, time spent in halfway houses, time served, and category of discharge.

NCRP-1C. Individual record data on each offender discharged from parole supervision, covering data contained in NCRP-1A and -1B, parole discharge, and category of discharge.

Series based on interviews of sampled prisoners

SIJ-43. Survey every 5 years of a random sample of inmates in jail to determine criminal history, drug and alcohol use, and personal background.

NPS-25. Survey every 5 years of a random sample of prison inmates to determine criminal history, drug and alcohol use, and personal background.

Special studies of recidivism

BJS has conducted two major studies of the arrests and convictions of offenders after they are released from prison.

Recidivism I. This project analyzed arrests and convictions of a cohort of offenders paroled from prison in 20 States. It has incorporated into the parole records FBI data on each parolee's contacts with criminal justice agencies. The selected offenders were 18 to 22 years of age when they were released from prison in 1978.

Recidivism II. This data collection program permits analysis of criminal justice contacts through 1986 for a sample of 16,000 prisoners released from prison in 11 States in 1983. The effort merges FBI, State, and local police records with correctional records.

Explanatory notes

The 1989 survey was the sixth annual collection sponsored by the Bureau of Justice Statistics and conducted by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. This survey follows a similar effort made by the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration during the 1970's.

The sample surveys yield estimates of the national jail population for those years that lack a complete enumeration. Full censuses were done on February 15, 1978; June 30, 1983; and June 30, 1988.

The 1989 survey, conducted on June 30, included 1,128 jails in 809 jurisdictions—counties, municipalities, or townships that administer 1 or more jails. A jurisdiction with an average daily inmate population of 100 or more in the 1988 census automatically entered the survey. Such units of government, referred to as certainty jurisdictions, accounted for 822 jails and 322,314 inmates, or 81% of the total estimated inmate population.

Administrators of jails in jurisdictions with large jail populations reported the number of inmates held because of crowded facilities elsewhere, the jail capacity, and the reasons for court orders, if any. The other jurisdictions in the survey belonged to a stratified random sample of jurisdictions with an average daily inmate population of less than 100 in the 1988 census. The survey excludes five types of facilities from the count:

- lockups that house persons for less than 48 hours
- Federal facilities
- State facilities
- privately operated facilities
- the combined jail-prison systems of Alaska, Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Rhode Island, and Vermont.

Data were obtained through mailed questionnaires. Two followup mailings and phone calls elicited a response from 100% of the sampled jails not in a certainty jurisdiction (a jurisdiction with such a large population that it has 100% certainty of entering the sample). Ninety-nine percent of the facilities in jurisdictions with large jail populations responded.

Explanatory notes by jurisdiction

Because many States update their population counts, the January 1, 1989, numbers may differ from those previously published for December 1988.

Federal

The probation population December 31, 1988, differs from January 1, 1989, because of statistical adjustment.

Alabama

The State estimated all data.

Intensive probation supervision includes those under electronic monitoring (table 3.11).

Alaska

The State's intensive probation supervision program was in the testing phase and was not fully implemented.

The State could not give detail for entries.

Arizona

The probation population December 31, 1988, differs from January 1, 1989, because of corrected counts for pending cases.

Arkansas

The State estimated all data.

"Other" (tables 3.5 and 3.6) are administrative cases.

California

The probation population December 31, 1988, differs from January 1, 1989, because of probation departments conducting caseload inventory counts and adjustments after December 31, 1988.

In California, probation is a county function. These data, collected by the California Department of Justice, cover convicted defendants who are active supervised cases of county probation departments.

The State was unable to give specific data on race, ethnicity, type of offense, status of probation, and exits.

California estimated the number of men and women on probation.

Colorado

The State estimated the data for exits, "incarceration with new/current sentence" (table 3.6).

For offense type DWI is included in misdemeanor (table 3.10).

Connecticut

The probation population December 31, 1988, differs from January 1, 1989, because of a caseload adjustment.

Detail for entries and exits was not available.

The State estimated the data for race and ethnicity.

Delaware

Delaware estimates all data.

For offense type, DWI is included under "misdemeanor" (table 3.10).

Active supervision includes all absconders (table 3.4).

District of Columbia

The probation population December 31, 1988, differs from January 1, 1989, because of a revised count.

Exits, "incarceration with current sentence" includes "Incarceration with new sentence" (table 3.6).

The jurisdiction had previously reported cases as inactive, which are now reported under absconder status.

Florida

The probation population December 31, 1988, differs from January 1, 1989, because of the addition of cases from the Pretrial Intervention Program.

Supervision status "absconders" are included under inactive supervision (table 3.4).

"Other" (table 3.3) are those sentenced from prison to probation.

Georgia

The probation population December 31, 1988, differs from January 1, 1989, because of updates in data records.

"Other entries," includes abandonment and bastardy, interstate compact cases, and suspended sentences (table 3.5). "Other exits," includes abandonment and bastardy, special termination, and transferred out of State.

Georgia is in the process of transferring abandonment and bastardy cases to the Department of Human Resources. The termination of these cases is reflected in exits "other" (table 3.6).

"Other offense type," consists of suspended sentences and abandonment/ bastardy (table 3.10).

"Other probation status," includes abandonment/bastardy and unknowns.

All data exclude probationers who have been sent to another State for supervision and includes those supervised in Georgia from other States.

Hawaii

The probation population December 31, 1988, differs from January 1, 1989, because of caseload adjustments.

Intensive probation supervision includes those under electronic monitoring (table 3.11).

Idaho

The probation population December 31, 1988, differs from January 1, 1989, because of caseload adjustments.

"Discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant" includes absconders (table 3.6). Some types of exits were not reported.

Illinois

No detailed breakout was available for entries, exits, race, ethnicity, and probation status.

The number of males and females on probation was estimated.

"Absconded" and "Discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant" are estimated (table 3.6).

Kansas

The probation population December 31, 1988, differs from January 1, 1989, because of caseload adjustments.

Exits, "incarceration with new sentence," includes "incarceration with current sentence" (table 3.6).

Kentucky

The population counts exclude inactive cases.

Methodology

The 1989 Survey of Inmates in Local Jails was conducted for the Bureau of Justice Statistics by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. Through personal interviews during July, August, and September 1989, data were collected on individual characteristics of jail inmates, current offenses and sentences, characteristics of victims, criminal histories, jail activities and programs, prior drug and alcohol use and treatment, and health care services provided while in jail. Similar surveys of jail inmates were conducted in 1972, 1978, and 1983.

Sample Design

The sample for the 1989 survey was selected from a universe of 3,312 jails that were enumerated in the 1988 National Jail Census. The sample design was a stratified two-stage selection. In the first stage, six separate strata were formed based on the size of the male and female populations. In two strata all jails were selected; in the remaining four strata, a systematic sample of jails was selected proportional to the population size of each jail. Overall, a total of 424 local jails were selected. In the second stage, interviewers visited each selected facility and systematically selected a sample of male and female inmates, using predetermined procedures. As a result, approximately 1 of every 70 males were selected, depending on the stratum; 1 of every 14, 15, or 70 females were selected. A total of 5.675 interviews were completed, yielding an overall response rate of 92.3%.

Based on the completed interviews, estimates for the entire population were developed using weighting factors derived from the original probability of selection in the sample. These factors were adjusted for variable rates of nonresponse across strata and inmate characteristics. Further adjustments were made to control the survey estimates to counts of jail inmates obtained from the 1988 National Jail Census and the 1989 Sample Survey of Jails.

Hawaii

Category estimates: Jurisdiction and custody totals are actual counts. Admissions, releases, race, and Hispanic origin are estimated from information from Hawaii's Comprehensive Offender Monitoring and Program Assessment System.

New court commitments: May include a small number of probation violators or escapees returned to prison with or without new sentences as well as returns from appeal or bond.

Other releases: Include 5 administrative discharges and 5 of unknown type.

Total inmate population: Custody and jurisdiction counts include inmates in prisons and jails, which form an integrated system in Hawaii.

Unknown race: Includes Puerto Ricans, prisoners of other Hispanic origin, and inmates who identified more than one racial background; however, prisoners of part-Hawaiian ancestry were counted as Asians or Pacific Islanders.

Idaho

Conditional release violators with new sentences: Include some parole violators with new sentences.

Other conditional release violators without new sentences: Include some parole violators without new sentences. Also include some returned violators with charges pending.

Other admissions: Contain the difference between total admissions and the number in other admissions categories. Include transfers and prisoners returning from a release on medical furlough, writ, appeal, or bond.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Other releases: Contain the difference between total releases and the number in other categories of releases. Include transfers and prisoners leaving for a release on medical furlough, writ, appeal, or bond.

Hispanic prisoners: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

Indiana

Population, admissions and releases counts: Based on custody data. Jurisdictional population: Exclude 633 male inmates awaiting pickup from local jails. Conditional release violators with new sentences: Include parole violators with or without new sentences and other conditional release violators without new sentences.

Other conditional releases: Releases to regulated community assignment.

lowa

Mississippi

Other admissions: Inmates awaiting a parole revocation hearing as well as returns from appeal or bond.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Other conditional releases: Include supervised earned releases, Governor's suspensions of sentence, and Emergency Powers Act releases.

Other releases: Inmates who went back to prison pending a parole revocation hearing that subsequently returned them to community supervision.

Missouri

New court commitments: Include some shock probation commitments. May also include other conditional release violators returned to prison. Parole violators without new sentences: Include some parole violators with new sentences.

Enter "NR" (Not Reported) in the item, if your State had the type of inmates described by the item but you cannot determine the number of such inmates your State had in 1989. If you cannot determine the number of inmates separately by item, report the combined count in one of the items, enter "NR" in the remaining items **and** specify in the notes space on pages 2, 4, or 6 **all** of the items represented by the combined count. INSTRUCTIONS

COVERAGE

In this report, you are asked to report populations and movements of all adults and youthful offenders adjudicated through the adult court and sentenced to a maximum of at least one year and one day and admitted to or released from the **jurisdiction** of your State prison system, even though they may be housed in another state or in a Federal institution or in a county facility. For example, you should report the admission or release of prisoners sentenced for offenses in your State but housed in another state for safekeeping. You should report the admission or release of state inmates held in local jails as a direct result of overcrowding in state facilities if these inmates are considered to be under your State's **jurisdiction** while they serve in local jails. You should not report the admission or release of inmates your State was merely housing for other states.

JURISDICTION POPULATION ON JANUARY 1

The jurisdiction population on January 1, 1989 (Item 1) should equal the number of inmates with over 1 year maximum sentence on December 31, 1988 (Item 5a). Revise Item 5a for 1988 if appropriate.

ADMISSIONS

- a. New court commitments Include all inmates who were admitted with all new sentences, that is, these inmates were not **readmitted** for any sentences. This category includes probation violators entering prison for the first time on the probated offenses. Do not include parole violators with new sentences as new court commitments.
- b. Parole violators with new sentences include ali parolees returned with new sentences.
- c. Other conditional release violators with new sentences — Include all conditional release violators (other than parole violators) returned with new sentences, for example, returns from shock probation, from supervised mandatory release, etc.
- d. Parole violators only, no new sentences Include all parolees returned only for formal revocations of parole which were not accompanied by new sentences. If the parole was not formally revoked, that is, the parolee was held only temporarily pending a hearing, no admission occurred for NPS purposes.
- e. Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences — Include all conditional release violators (other than parole violators) recurred only for formal revocations of conditional release which were not accompanied by new sentences. If the conditional release was not formally revoked, that is, the conditional release violator was held only temporarily pending a hearing, no admission occurred for NPS purposes.
- f. Transfers from other jurisdictions Include all inmates transferred to your State's jurisdiction to continue sentences already in force. Do not report the admission if your State does not acquire jurisdiction. Do not report movements from prison to prison within your State.
- g. AWOL returns, with or without new sentences include all returns from AWOL. AWOL is defined as failure to return from authorized temporary absences such as work furlough, study release, mercy furlough, or other authorized temporary absence.
- h. Escapee returns, with or without new sentences — Include all returns from escape. Escape is defined as unlawful deperture from a state correctional facility or from the custody of state correctional personnel.

ADMISSIONS - Continued

- Returns from appeal/bond Include all inmates reinstated to correctional jurisdiction from longterm jurisdictional absences on appeal or bond. Do not report returns from short-term movements (that is, less than 30 days) to court (that is, where the state retains jurisdiction).
- j. Other admissions Include all other admissions not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these admissions in the "Notes" section on page 2.

RELEASES

Unconditional — An unconditional release occurs only if the released inmate cannot be reimprisoned for any sentence for which he was in prison.

- Expirations of sentence Include all inmates whose maximum court sentences minus credits have been served.
- b. Commutations Include all inmates whose maximum sentences have been changed (lowered) to time served to allow immediate unconditional release.
- c. Other unconditional releases Include all other unconditional releases not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these releases in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.

Conditional — A conditional release occurs if the released inmate, upon violating the conditions of his release, can be imprisoned again for any of the sentences for which he was in prison.

- d. Probations Include all inmates who have been placed under probation supervision and conditionally released. Include all shock probation releases.
- Supervised mandatory releases include all inmates who must, by law, be conditionally released. This type of release may also be called mandatory conditional release.
- f. Paroles Include all inmates conditionally released to parole. Enter only releases officially entitled "parole."
- g. Other conditional releases include all other conditional releases not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these releases in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.

Death

- h. Executions Self-explanatory
- i. Illnesses/natural causes Self-explanatory
- J. Suicides Self-explanatory
- k. Accidental injury to self Include all inmates who accidentally caused their own deaths (for example, a fall from a ladder, mishandling electrical equipment).
- Death caused by another person include all inmates whose deaths were caused accidentally or intentionally by another inmate or prison personnel.
- m. Other deaths include all other deaths not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these deaths in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.

Other Releases

- n. AWOLS Include all failures to return from an authorized temporary absence such as work furlough, study release, mercy furlough, or other authorized temporary absence.
- Escapes from confinement Include all unlawful departures from a state correctional facility or from the custody of state correctional personnel.
- **p. Transfers to other jurisdictions** Include all inmates who were transferred from your State's jurisdiction to another to continue sentences already in force. Do not report the release if your State does not relinquish jurisdiction. Do not report movements from prison to prison within your State.
- q. Releases to appeal/bond Include all inmates released from correctional jurisdiction to longterm jurisdictional absences on appeal or bond. Do not report short-term movements (that is, less than 30 days) to court where the state correctional system retains jurisdiction.
- r. Other releases Include all other releases not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these releases in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.

JURISDICTION POPULATION DECEMBER 31

Include all inmates under your State's **jurisdiction** on December 31, regardless of the location of the inmates. Do not include other jurisdictions' inmates (for example, inmates from other states, pre-trial detainees) merely housed in your prisons. These inmates, however, are enumerated in item 6, "Custody Population."

CUSTODY POPULATION DECEMBER 31

Include all inmates in your State's **custody**, that is, housed in your State correctional facilities on December 31. Do not include state inmates housed outside state prison facilities (these are reported under "Jurisdiction Population," item 5). Include other jurisdictions' inmates (for example, inmates from other states, the courts, local jails) housed in your State's facilities.

OVERCROWDING DECEMBER 31

Include all inmates housed in local jails on December 31, as a direct result of overcrowding in your State's prisons. Do **not** include inmates held in local jails for other reasons, (for example, work release, court appearance, etc.). If you enter a number (other than "O") or "NR" in item 7a, mark the "Yes" or "No" box in item 7b to indicate whether or not these inmates are included in 5d, "Total Inmate Population — Jurisdiction Population December 31." If you mark "No," explain in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.

RACE

- White A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.
- (2) Black A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa.
- (3) American Indian or Alaskan Native A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
- (4) Asian or Pacific Islander A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian Subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.
- (5) Other Any other races not covered by the above categories. Please specify the other races in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.
- (6) Not known Any inmate whose race is unknown should be included here.

ETHNIC ORIGIN

- Hispanic A person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.
- (2) Not Hispanic A person not covered by the above category.
- (3) Not known Any one whose ethnic origin is unknown should be included here.

Explanatory notes by jurisdiction

Some States revise their caseload counts from year to year because of audits, late reporting, or altered reporting practices; hence, the January 1989 counts may not match the December 1988 counts reported earlier.

Federal

The previously reported yearend 1989 count was revised due to statistical adjustments.

Absconders are included in the population counts.

Alabama

All data are estimated. Absconders are included in the population counts.

Alaska

Absconders are placed in an inactive caseload but are included in the population counts.

Alaska included parolees supervised out-of-State among those under active supervision (table 6.3).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Arizona

The State revised the previously reported yearend 1988 count to exclude juvenile cases.

For adults entering parole, "other" includes 330 interstate compact cases (table 6.4).

For adults leaving parole, "other" includes 10 early discharges (table 6.5).

Arizona estimated the data for sex, race, Hispanic origin, and length of sentence. "Unknown" race includes 653 Mexican Americans (table 6.7).

Absconders are included in the population counts.

Arkansas

Discharged absconders in 1988 were no longer kept in the caseload and were not reported in the yearend counts. In December 1989, Arkansas had 288 absconders, 108 of whom had absconded during the year.

Arkansas is phasing out the inactive supervision status and is replacing it with annual reporting. Inactive supervision status included 53 inactive and 23 annual reporting (table 6.3).

"Unknown" race consists of 9 Cuban and 2 Mexican parolees as well as 1 person with unspecified race (table 6.7).

California

"Other" entries consists of 295 California Youth Authority (CYA) parolees and 25 released from awaiting delivery or non-institution locations (table 6.4).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). "Other" exits includes 17,703 State-reported suspensions to CYA parole, parolees at large, and other releases.

Absconder supervision status reflects only those for the CYA's (table 6.3). For the State, absconders were placed on an inactive caseload and were omitted from the yearend parole population count. "Unknown" race consists of 2,609 American Indian, Alaskan Native, Asians, or Pacific Islanders that could not be shown separately and 3 Filipinos (table 6.7).

The number of parolees under intensive supervision and electronic monitoring (table 6.9) does not include locally supervised parolees.

Colorado

Active supervision includes those parolees supervised out of State. Absconders are placed in an inactive caseload and omitted from the population counts.

Entries and exits include an unknown number of interstate compact cases.

The population counts exclude interstate compact cases.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). Colorado does not classify transfers to other jurisdictions as exits.

"Unknown" race consists of 23 prisoners whose race was unspecified (table 6.7).

Connecticut

For "Unknown" race, the State included 52 Hispanic parolees and 3 persons of unspecified race (table 6.7).

The total yearend parole population includes absconders, 6 of whom were changed to absconder status during the year.

Delaware

The State estimated all data.

The December 31, 1988, parole population differs from January 1,1989, because 1988 figures were estimated.

Active supervision status includes absconders (table 6.3). Current absconders are placed indefinitely on an inactive caseload and are included in the total yearend population counts.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revoked parole, with charges pending, or with a new sentence were counted as having been discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant (table 6.5). Parolees transferred to other States were similarly counted. All persons sent back to prison or jail, parole revocation pending, were counted as having returned to prison with parole revoked.

The State did not supervise persons released from prison after less than 1 year of incarceration.

District of Columbia

Absconders are never discharged. There is a warrant kept for them as long as they remain in that status. Of the 905 absconders reported, 657 were changed to absconder status during 1989.

American Indian, Alaskan Native, Asians and Pacific Islanders are included in either black or white race. "Unknown" race includes 49 persons of unspecified race (table 6.7).

Florida

For adults entering parole "other" consists of 555 data adjustments (table 6.4).

All categories of adults leaving parole except discharged absconders were reported in "successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with new charges pending are counted as returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). For adults leaving parole "other" consists of 65 data adjustments.

Current absconders are placed indefinitely on an inactive caseload and omitted from the total yearend parole population count.

Florida estimated the data for race and ethnicity.

Georgia

Total parole population includes parolees supervised out-of-State. The active supervision status includes absconders (table 6.3).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

Georgia estimated data for race.

Hawaii

"Other" entries consists of 158 parolees from other States (table 6.4).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with new charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with a new sentence (table 6.5). Returned to prison or jail, parole revocation, includes an undetermined number of technical violators. "Other" exits include 84 suspended parolees.

Absconders are included in the population counts.

Idaho

The State revised the previously reported yearend 1988 count.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with new charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail, parole revocation pending (table 6.5).

The State estimated race and ethnicity.

Absconders are included in the population counts.

Illinois

Illinois estimated all demographic data from the percentage distribution of 14,550 parolees under active supervision. It had no demographic information on absconders and parolees supervised out-of-State; therefore, data for sex, race, Hispanic origin, entries, and exits are estimates.

The State monitors only those parolees with sentences of 1 year or more.

"Discharged as absconder" and "discharged to detainer, warrant" are included in "successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

For "unknown" race the State reported 1,071 Hispanic parolees and 68 persons of unspecified race (table 6.7).

Indiana

Current absconders were terminated from parole and were not included in the yearend population count. All of the 106 absconders reported under supervised status were changed to absconder status during 1989.

lowa

lowa monitors only those parolees who have a sentence of a year or more.

Current absconders were terminated from parole and were not included in the yearend parole population count.

"Discharged to detainer, warrant" is included in either "successfully completed parole" or "discharged as absconder" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with a new sentence, revocation, or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

Kansas

The parole population increased in part due to a State law effective August 1, 1989, which liberalizes the granting of "good time" for State prison inmates.

"Discharged as absconder" and "discharged to detainer, warrant" are included in "successfully completed parole" (table 6.5) All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were not considered to be exits. "Other" exits include discharged absconders (212), expiration of sentence (255), and out-of-State exits (157).

Kansas estimated data for race and Hispanic origin.

Kansas monitored 362 absconders apart from the regular parole caseload and did not include them in the yearend counts. Of the 212 parolees who absconded in 1989, an unknown number remained in that status at yearend.

Kentucky

Kentucky reported inactive cases in the active supervision category (table 6.3).

For adults entering parole "discretionary" releases include mandatory releases (table 6.4). "Other" includes 407 interstate transfers.

For adults leaving parole those successfully completing parole include releases from active supervision, final discharges, and closed cases (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Kentucky did not report demographic data or sentence length data.

Louisiana

The State estimated all data.

Louisiana reported absconders and outof-State parolees as under "active supervision" (table 6.3).

"Discharged as absconder" and "discharged to detainer, warrant" are included in "successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

Maine

Maine abolished parole in 1976. There are now 30 pre-1976 parolees under supervision, with 30 in prison who will eventually be eligible for parole.

Maryland

For "other" status of supervision Maryland reported 562 parolees in some form of custody (table 6.3).

Absconders are included in the total yearend parole population counts. Of the 1,070 absconders reported, 153 were changed to absconder status during 1989.

"Unknown" race consists of 20 persons of unspecified race (table 6.7).

Massachusetts

Massachusetts estimated sex, race, and ethnicity.

Discretionary release from prison includes all mandatory releases (table 6.4).

"Discharged as absconder," "discharged to detainer, warrant," "transferred to another State," "death," and "other" are included in "Successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

All active parolees are supervised. For "unknown" race, Massachusetts included 560 Hispanic and 32 Cape Verdian parolees (table 6.7).

Michigan

For "other" exits from parole, Michigan reported one parolee discharged by court (table 6.5).

"Unknown" race consists of 39 persons for whom Michigan did not specify race (table 6.7).

Absconders are included in the population counts.

Minnesota

"Unknown" entries includes 442 persons on work release (table 6.4).

"Discharged as absconder," "discharged to detainer, warrant," and "transferred to another State" are included in "successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

For "unknown" race the State reported 31 Spanish-speaking parolees and 9 others (table 6.7).

Absconders are included in the population counts.

Mississippi

Mississippi placed absconders indefinitely in an inactive caseload and omitted them from the yearend parole population counts.

"Other" entries include 6 work release cases.

Mississippi reported mandatory releases in "discretionary" releases (table 6.4).

Missouri

All data exclude 608 parolees from local jails.

The previously reported yearend 1988 count was revised because of data adjustments.

Discharged as absconder" is included in "successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. All persons sent back to prison or jail with charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with a new sentence.

"Unknown" race includes 35 persons for whom Missouri did not specify race (table 6.7).

Absconders are included in the population counts.

Montana

Montana estimated all demographic information from past populations. It also estimated the number of persons leaving parole. "Other" exits consists of 2 pardons and 3 commutations.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). Montana did not report the number of persons transferred because it does not maintain records for parolees who leave the State.

"Unknown" race includes 3 persons for whom Montana did not specify race (table 6.7).

Absconders are included in the population counts.

Nebraska

Nebraska does not discharge absconders (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

Nebraska estimated the data for sex, race, ethnicity, supervision status, and sentence length.

"Unknown" race includes 21 Hispanic parolees (table 6.7).

Absconders are included in the population counts.

Nevada

The State revised the previously reported yearend 1988 count. The data reported no longer represent estimates of the parole population; the figures are actual counts.

"Discharged as absconder" is included in "successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. "Death" is included in successfully completed parole.

New Hampshire

The State places absconders on an inactive case list and does not report them in the yearend counts. It monitors only those parolees with sentences of a year or more.

"Unknown" race includes a combination of 24 non-whites and blacks (table 6.7). White race includes American Indians, Alaskan Natives, Asians, and Pacific Islanders.

New Jersey

New Jersey reported those absconding from parole as being under active supervision (table 6.3).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). "Other or unknown status" includes 219 who were recalled by court or who were discharged by paroling authority decree.

New Mexico

The previously reported yearend 1988 count was revised because of statistical adjustments.

Data for entries, exits, sex, race, ethnicity, and supervision status were estimated.

Absconders are placed indefinitely in an inactive caseload.

Discretionary parole entries and reinstatements to parole were reported under mandatory parole entries (table 6.4).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). "Discharged to detainer, warrant" was also counted under revocation.

"Unknown" race includes Asians and Pacific Islanders (table 6.7).

New York

"Discharged as absconder" and "discharged to detainer, warrant" are included in "successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). Persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation pending were counted as having been returned with a new sentence. Persons sent back to prison or jail with charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

"Unknown" race includes 10,634 Hispanic parolees (table 6.7).

North Carolina

The large increase in the parole population was due to State legislation enacted to ease prison crowding.

For adults entering parole, "other" adjusts categories to the total (table 6.4).

North Carolina does not dismiss absconders; instead, warrants are issued for life or until the absconder is found.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). Those discharged to detainer or warrant were also counted as parole revocations.

"Unknown" race consists of 39 persons of unspecified race (table 6.7).

Absconders are included in the population counts.

North Dakota

The December 31, 1988, parole population differs from January 1, 1989, because of conversion to an automated reporting system.

The State counted absconders as being under active supervision (table 6.3).

"Unknown" race consists of 5 parolees of unspecified race. (table 6.7).

Ohio

Ohio places absconders indefinitely in an inactive caseload and omits them from the yearend count.

For adults entering parole "other" includes 416 parolees supervised in other States (table 6.4).

"Discharged to detainer, warrant" is included in "successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). For adults leaving parole "other" includes 165 interstate compact cases closed for reasons other than final release.

Ohio did not report data for sex, race, Hispanic origin, or sentence length.

Oklahoma

Oklahoma estimated data for exits.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). Transfers to other parole jurisdictions are not considered to be exits; rather, they continue in the administrative caseload. "Unknown" race consists of persons for whom Oklahoma did not specify race (table 6.7).

Absconders are included in the population counts.

Oregon

The State revised the previously reported yearend 1988 count to include absconders not reported and administrative adjustments.

Mandatory releases from prison and reinstatements to parole were reported as discretionary releases from prison (table 6.4).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with a new sentence, with their parole revoked, or with revocation or charges pending as well as discharged to custody, detainer or warrant were counted as "other" (table 6.5).

Discharged absconder includes cases closed because of absconding (432), although the parole authority retains jurisdiction if/when offenders are caught.

"Unknown" race consists of 348 Hispanics or persons of unspecified race as well as persons identified as having parents of different races (table 6.7).

Pennsylvania

"Other" type of entry includes 14,821 parolees released from jails (table 6.4).

"Other" exits include 2,709 adjustments (table 6.5).

Pennsylvania reported "discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant" in "other" (table 6.5). The number of absconders, who are maintained in the active parole caseload, was not known. "Unknown" race includes 1,886 Hispanic parolees and 453 of unspecified race. (table 6.7).

Rhode Island

Under status of supervision, 3 parolees were supervised out-of-State. (table 6.3). "Other" includes the following: 19 persons detained on warrants at the Rhode Island Adult Correctional Institution, 5 persons in Federal prison, 10 persons supervised by the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, and 2 persons in the Federal Witness Protection Program.

For adults entering parole "other" includes 8 persons who were reparoled after revocation of the original parole and who either had no new sentence or had a new sentence of less than six months (table 6.4).

For adults leaving parole "discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant" consists of 4 parolees serving other sentences out of State. "Other" includes 2 absconders whose parole was revoked *in absentia* (table 6.5).

South Carolina

"Other" includes 13 pardoned parolees. "Unknown" race includes American Indians, Alaskan Natives, Asians, and Pacific Islanders (table 6.7).

"Adult parolees" not covered in this report were 850 youthful offenders.

Total yearend parole population includes absconders.

South Dakota

The State estimated data for exits, sex, race, and ethnicity.

Absconders are not discharged and are included in the yearend populations.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Tennessee

Reinstatement entries are included with discretionary and mandatory releases from prison (table 6.4). "Other" entries include 593 parolees supervised out-of-State.

Discharged absconders and those discharged to detainer or warrant were counted as having successfully completed parole (table 6.5). All persons returned to prison or jail, whether with a new sentence or with charges or revocation pending, were reported as parole revocations.

Data for supervision status were estimated.

Tennessee supervised only parolees with sentences of 1 year or more.

Texas

The State estimated data for sex, race, ethnicity, and exits.

"Other" supervision status consists of 4,875 detainers (table 6.3).

Texas reported all categories of exits except successful completion as "other or unknown status" (table 6.5).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with new sentences, revocation pending, or new charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

"Unknown" race includes 20,084 Hispanic parolees (table 6.7). White and black race include American Indians, Alaskan Nativos, Asians, and Pacific Islanders.

Absconders are placed indefinitely on an inactive caseload and included in the total yearend parole population count.

Utah

Of the 106 absconders, 67 were changed to absconder status in 1989 (table 6.3).

Utah does not count as an exit from parole returning to prison or jail with parole revocation pending (table 6.5).

Vermont

All persons sent back to prison or jail with charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

The yearend parole population does not include absconders.

Virginia

The parole population on December 31, 1988, differs from January 1, 1989, because of the exclusion of instate transfers.

For adults entering parole "other" includes 393 transfers from other States, Virginia cases returned to Virginia from other States, and unknown types of entry (table 6.4).

For adults leaving parole "discharged to custody, detainer or warrant" includes all those returned to incarceration; "other" includes intrastate transfers, terminations of out-of-State cases, and exits of unknown type (table 6.5).

The State classifies race as white and non-white (all races other than white).

Virginia estimated the data for sex, race, and status of supervision.

Absconders are omitted from the population counts.

Washington

Persons committing offenses after July 1, 1984 are not parole eligible.

Washington estimated the January 1 count, exits, and the December 31 count.

"Other" race consists of Hispanics and persons for whom Washington did not specify race (table 6.7).

Washington places absconders in an inactive caseload and includes them in the yearend counts. For adults entering parole "other or unknown type" includes reinstatements and parolees who had absconded from parole and had returned (table 6.4).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with a new sentence.

Of the 1,752 absconders reported, 895 were changed to absconder status during 1989.

West Virginia

"Other or unknown" entries includes 100 transfers (table 6.4).

The State estimated exits.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). Those who were discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant were counted as having completed parole successfully. "Other or unknown status" of exit adjusts categories to the total.

Absconders are included in the yearend parole population. All absconders were found, and West Virginia had none at yearend 1988.

Wisconsin

The parole population on December 31, 1988, differs from January 1, 1989, because of editing yearend data tape.

Parolees with inactive supervision are included under active supervision, and those out of State are included as absconders or under active supervision (table 6.3). For adults leaving parole all absconders and parolees discharged to detainer or warrant were counted as having successfully completed parole (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with a new sentence or with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

"Unknown" race consists of 142 persons for whom Wisconsin did not specify race (table 6.7).

The number of parolees under intensive supervision and electronic monitoring includes an unknown number of probationers.

Wyoming

The parole population on December 31, 1988, differs from January 1, 1989, because of data received after the survey was completed.

The State estimated all data.

Wyoming could not report absconders apart from active supervision status (table 6.3). Absconders are placed in the interstate compact caseload.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with a new sentence or with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Explanatory notes

The statistics reported for capital punishment may differ from data collected by other organizations. The differences occur for a variety of reasons.

 Inmates under sentence of death are originally added to the National Prisoner Statistics (NPS) counts when they enter correctional facilities rather than when judges pronounce sentence.

Following the year when prisoners are first counted, their admissions or releases as a result of court order are attributed to the year for the sentence or court order. For example, a prisoner sentenced in November 1987 and entering prison custody in January 1988 would be counted as an admission in the 1988 report; the 1989 report would count him or her as being under sentence of death at yearend 1987. Similarly, a prisoner whose sentence is overturned in 1987 but who remains in the count until 1989 when the court's decision is reported would be subtracted from the 1987 and 1988 reports.

 NPS counts of persons under sentence of death are always for the last day of a calendar year and thus will differ from more recent counts.

Correctional Populations in the United States, 1988, failed to include 18 inmates who either were reported late to the NPS program or were not in the custody of State correctional authorities at yearend 1988: Florida (1), Georgia (1), Missouri (1), Nevada (1), Pennsylvania (4), Ohio (2), Oklahoma (7), and Tennessee (1). Twenty-five inmates had sentences to death removed in 1988 but were not reported: Alabama (1), Arizona (4), California (1). Florida (9), Georgia (1), Illinois (3), Louisiana (1), Mississippi (1), North Carolina (1), Pennsylvania (1), South Carolina (1), and Tennessee (1).

In 1989, five male prisoners of the Armed Forces were under a military death sentence for murder.
