# 2002 CENSUS OF TRIBAL JUSTICE AGENCIES IN AMERICAN INDIAN AND ALASKA NATIVE TRIBAL JURISDICTIONS

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#### **INTRODUCTION**

The Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS), U.S. Department of Justice, through Falmouth Institute and Policy Studies Inc., is conducting a census of tribal justice agencies in American Indian and Alaska Native tribal jurisdictions. This is the first comprehensive effort to identify which justice agencies are operating in tribal jurisdictions, what services those agencies provide, and what information they collect and keep. Once our analysis is completed, we will send a copy of the survey findings to all respondents.
