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#### INTRODUCTION

The Criminal Justice Archive and Information Network (CJAIN) has been in operation since 1977 at the Inter-university Consortium for Political and Social Research. Funded currently by the Bureau of Justice Statistics in the Department of Justice (Grant No. 82-BJ-CX-K001), it is designed to provide three basic services to analysts, policymakers, and researchers in the criminal justice fields: 1) development of computer-readable data resources for the quantitative study of crime and the criminal justice system through archiving and dissemination; 2) technical assistance in selecting appropriate data and the computational hardware and software resources to use them in an efficient and effective manner; and 3) training in the methods of social science data analysis appropriate to analysis of data.

During the past nine years the CJAIN staff has assembled a large collection of data relevant to its mission in the ICPSR archive. For a variety of reasons, it has never been the intention of the project to acquire and process all possible data of relevance to crime and the criminal justice system at the ICPSR. Limitations on the availability of resources would never have permitted such an ambitious undertaking. Some data are currently housed in other archives where access is open and available; acquisitions of such data would simply involve a duplication of effort. Furthermore, some data are archived at locations in which a specially-trained staff is available to provide advice, consultation, and special tabulations where considerations of protection of the confidentiality of individuals is an issue.

Much of the information about the availability of data from these other sources has not been available to researchers in an assembled form. The DIRECTORY of CRIMINAL JUSTICE DATA in the UNITED STATES is designed to serve as such a central resource for analysts, policymakers, and researchers in the criminal justice field. It is a guide to quantitative, computerreadable resources relevant to the study of crime and the criminal justice system, indicating their availability, general content, and where additional information can be obtained about the detailed characteristics of specific data collections. As is the case with any well-documented computer-readable data collection, complete information about the contents of a collection, the research design under which it was collected, and other relevant processing information can be found in its codebook. The reader will have to request such information from the institution from which the data are available. A list of all such sources is appended to the Directory. The Directory is actually a living document of sorts in that it also exists in computer-readable form as a SPIRES subfile on The University of Michigan computing system (MTS), where it can be accessed remotely for computerized searches. This second published version of the Directory contains descriptions of 671 date collections which existed in the subfile as of February, 1986. Future printed versions of the Directory will be published as the size of the computer-readable database grows.

In this regard, the CJAIN staff would appreciate receiving information about the existence and availability of other computer-readable data relevant to the study of crime and the criminal justice system. This information will be added to the SPIRES database as it is received, and it will be published in subsequent versions of the Directory.

Any project of this magnitude must necessarily involve the contributions of several staff members. The principal investigator for the CJAIN project is Dr. Michael W. Traugott, Director of Resource Development for the ICPSR. Dr. Victoria Schneider has had direct supervisory responsibility for the staff working on the Directory project which has included Robert Adler, Phil Sinco, Brian Roddy, and Julio Borquez. Mr. Adler has recently taken on the responsibility for updating the SPIRES subfile which is the basis for this publication. The project Officer at the Bureau of Justice Statistics has been Dr. Pat Langan.

#### USING SPIRES TO SEARCH THE CJ DATA DATABASE

#### INTRODUCTION

CJAIN maintains an online version of the printed directory you are presently reading. The online directory, entitled CJ DATA, is a SPIRES subfile (otherwise known as a database) which resides on The University of Michigan's Amdahl mainframe computer. The database will be updated continuously to provide researchers with a current catalog of criminal justice data collections.

This section will briefly introduce users to SPIRES (Stanford Public Information Retrieval System) and the procedures for retrieving information through searches of the CJ DATA database. This discussion is not intended to be a complete description of the SPIRES system, but rather to enable the user to start to use the database quickly. SPIRES is a database management system which was originally developed by members of the Data Base Systems Group of the Stanford Center for Information Processing. SPIRES may be used to search, retrieve, and display records from the database in a simple and straightforward manner without extensive knowledge of a particular programming language. Use of SPIRES, which runs on the Michigan Terminal System (MTS), requires familiarity with some of MTS's technical conventions. SPIRES maintains online introductory materials to help the user learn about the system while running it. These can be examined with the TUTORIAL, HELP, and EXPLAIN commands that can be issued once the user is in SPIRES. By using telecommunication networks such as TELENET, TYMNET or AUTONET, the remote user may gain access to the CJ DATA database at the University of Michigan via the MERIT Computer Network. TELENET and the other networks provide access to the Michigan computer with a local telephone call and for a small surcharge to the regular computing charges.

#### ORGANIZATION OF INFORMATION IN SPIRES DATABASES

A SPIRES subfile or database is made up of a body of information organized into two kinds of records: "goal records" and "index records." A typical goal record in the CJ DATA database is a collection (study) description containing a number of elements. These elements include study title, principal investigator(s), study abstract, keywords, and more.

Index records can be used to find goal records containing particular types of information. Just as you look in a book's index for references to pages containing a certain word, SPIRES looks in a subfile's indexes to identify goal

records containing certain words. A SPIRES database may contain one or more indexes. Study title, keyword, and principal investigator name are among the indexes in the CJ DATA database.

It is important to realize that the indexes found in CJ DATA are "word" indexes. This means it is the individual words in, say, a study's title that are indexed rather than the single string of characters that make up the entire title. With "word" indexes the search term (or value) should not be longer than one "word." If, for example, you wished to find studies whose title contained the phrase "juvenile delinquency" you would search the title index for "juvenile" and then narrow the result by searching for "delinquency".

SPIRES goal records are made up of units of information which are called elements. Some of the elements in a record may be PI name, study title, or keyword. Within each goal record is an element which uniquely identifies each goal record from all other records in the subfile. This element is called the goal record key.

#### CONVENTIONS

The following pages identify and describe some of the basic commands and features available in SPIRES and examples using these commands are provided. In the examples the commands to be typed in by the user are printed in lower case letters, while SPIRES and MTS responses and prompts are in upper case. Quotation marks around a term usually indicate that the term within the "" is to be typed in exactly as it appears. (Therefore, this document may occasionally take liberties with standard punctuation rules.) In most examples, square brackets ([]) are used to indicate that a command, operator, or type of term is optional. Also, when describing contents of either indexes or elements, the words "values" or "terms" will be used interchangeably. Both refer to the contents of the index or element.

The examples in this section were generated from the CJ DATA database. However, since the database continues to change as more records are added, the user may not be able to obtain the exact same result numbers when issuing the same commands used in the illustrations. This is to be expected and should not cause alarm.

#### GETTING STARTED - SIGNING ON TO MTS

Remote users of CJ DATA can take advantage of local telephone rates when using CJ DATA by routing their calls through TELENET or any of the other telecommunications networks. Before reaching the University of Michigan Computer you will be automatically connected to a regional network named MERIT. You must inform MERIT that you wish to use the "UM" host computer.

The ICPSR staff has prepared two documents which deal with initiating access to the Michigan Terminal System. These are "Accounting and Services for the Remote User" and "MTS via TELENET for the Beginning User." Both are available upon request.

When you have reached the University of Michigan Computer, you are ready to sign on as though you are a local user. You must show that you have a valid account at the Computing Center and you must be able to identify yourself as an authorized user of the resources.

#### ENTERING AND EXITING SPIRES

After you sign on to the University of Michigan computer through MERIT, SPIRES may be initiated by typing the command "\$run \*spires" and hitting the <carriage return> key. MTS will acknowledge with "#EXECUTION BEGINS" and display a short message about SPIRES. Then you will be prompted with "->" and SPIRES will now be ready to receive additional commands from you. (Please note that MTS prompts with "#" while SPIRES prompts with "->".) A summary of the commands issued from the signon to MTS and invoking SPIRES is as follows:

#\$signon ccid #password #\$run \*spires #EXECUTION BEGINS -> A SPIRES session can be terminated by typing "stop" or temporarily suspended by an MTS command. When an MTS command is issued, a record is kept of the point at which you left SPIRES. The command "\$restart" resumes the SPIRES session at that point. However, once the "stop" command has been issued, SPIRES cannot be re-entered with "\$restart".

When a SPIRES session is completed, typing "stop" returns you to MTS. The "#" signals that the computer is accepting MTS commands. For example:

->stop	[you terminate the SPIRES session]	
<b>#EXECUTION</b>	TERMINATED [MTS acknowledges]	
#\$.79, \$.81T	[costs are displayed]	
	[you are now in MTS command mode]	
#\$signoff	[in order to leave MTS, you	

must give the signoff command]

#### **ON-LINE AIDS**

There are a number of online aids available to users during a session. Whenever you are using SPIRES and you are not sure what to do next, you can issue the HELP command:

->help

SPIRES will make suggestions about what you can do based on the commands that you have issued prior to the HELP command.

Another online SPIRES aid is the EXPLAIN command. Whenever SPIRES produces a term or phrase you do not understand, you can ask SPIRES to clarify it by using the EXPLAIN command. Almost 2,000 explanations and descriptions of SPIRES commands, codes, subfiles and features are available.

->explain [term]

SPIRES maintains a large inventory of manuals available to users online and which can also be routed to the printer. By issuing the command "explain documentation" users can get information at their terminal about the manuals available and a description of the contents of each as well as instructions for obtaining copies.

The TUTORIAL command starts an online demonstration, including explanations and examples of SPIRES commands and responses. Simply giving the TUTORIAL command gets the user a tutorial on tutorials. The appropriate tutorial can then be selected as follows:

->tutorial [tutorial name]

#### SELECTING A SPIRES DATABASE

Before you can work with a database in SPIRES, you need to communicate to SPIRES which database you will need from the set of public subfiles that are available. The SHOW SUBFILES command will list all the databases available:

#### ->show subfiles

In order to work with a given database, a SELECT command must be given to instruct SPIRES to load that subfile.

->select CJ DATA

->

[the returned "->" prompt shows that the CJ DATA subfile is ready to use.]

Please note that you must specify "CJ DATA" and not only "CJ" or "DATA" in order to properly identify this subfile to SPIRES.

#### THE "IN ACTIVE" PREFIX

SPIRES has an attractive option which allows a user to save all or any part of a session by placing the commands and search results in a file. By simply inserting the "in active" phrase before a command, the user can instruct SPIRES to place the information into a file that is referred to as the "active file." Later in the session the user can examine, save, manipulate or print the contents of the active file. To specify which file you wish SPIRES to consider the "active file" issue the following:

->use filename [where "filename" is the name of the MTS file to be used as the active file.]

By default, the SPIRES active file is set to -SPIRES, a temporary MTS file whose contents remain available to the user throughout a given session on MTS, unless destroyed or emptied before signoff. The file disappears when the MTS session is terminated.

To place SPIRES commands and/or search results into the active file use the following:

->in active [clear|continue] [command]

The "clear" option will cause the system to clear an active file before placing data into it. The "continue" option will cause the information to be appended

to the end of the file. If neither "clear" nor "continue" have been indicated, SPIRES assumes that the previous information in the file is to be destroyed.

#### PRE-SEARCH COMMANDS

There are several commands which give you a better sense of the organization of material in the CJ DATA database. Among the most common pre-search commands are "show indexes," "show subfile size," "show elements" and "browse."

#### 1. SHOW INDEXES

The records in a SPIRES subfile are indexed to enable users to search the file more easily and more economically. The command "show indexes" will show which indexes are available for searching and the acceptable abbreviations for each index. The indexes in CJ DATA are below:

#### ->show indexes

GOAL RECORDS: COLLECTION SIMPLE INDEX: AD, ADDED SIMPLE INDEX: UP, UPDATED SIMPLE INDEX: T, TITLEWORD, TW SIMPLE INDEX: K, KEY, KEYTERMS, KW SIMPLE INDEX: P, PIAUTH, PINAME, PIWORD, PN, PW SIMPLE INDEX: C, CLASS, CLASSWORD, CW, TOPICLASS, TOPICWORD

#### 2. SHOW SUBFILE SIZE

SPIRES subfiles may range in size from thousands of goal records to only a few. The CJ DATA database is at present relatively small, but it will be continuously updated and expanded as more studies are added. You can determine the size of the subfile at any given time by issuing the command "show subfile size". For example:

->show subfile size -THE SUBFILE HAS 671 RECORDS

#### 3. SHOW ELEMENTS

For certain uses of a SPIRES subfile, such as displaying only parts of records or information from a given element. it is useful to know the data elements that comprise the subfile selected. The "show elements" command produces a listing of the data element names. A list of the elements in the CJ DATA database and a brief description of each is also found on page xxxii. The form of the command is:

->show elements

#### 4. BROWSE

The "browse" command allows you to peruse the possible values for the indexes before initiating a search. After you type the command "browse" followed by any of the index terms, SPIRES responds by displaying a partial alphabetic list of the values of a given index, and then asks whether you want to see additional values for the index. You can continue the listing by responding "yes" or you can terminate it by typing "no".

It is also possible to further identify a specific area that you want browsed alphabetically. Modifying the "browse" command with "first" or "last" allows you to examine the first or the last values for an index. Two examples will illustrate:

->browse first titleword ABC ABORTION ABUSE ACTIVITY ADMINISTRATION ADOLESCENTS ADULT ADULTS AFRICA AGE -MORE?n ->browse last piname WHITE WICE WILLARD WILLIAM WILLIAMS WOLFGANG WRIGHT YANKELOVICH YEAGER YORK -MORE?y UNREST URBAN VAN VERA VERBA WAGNER WALKER WAR WASHINGTON WHITAKER -MORE?n

Occasionally you may have a value such as "societal" and may want to see what other values can be found around it. This is especially true if you want to see how many different variations may exist for a given term before constructing a search request. You can modify the "browse" command so that it searches for the term and the values that are found right before and after the term. For example:

->browse keyterms societal SELECTIVE SENTENCE SERVICE SERVICES SOCIAL SOCIOECONOMIC STATE STATISTICS TREATMENT TRIAL -MORE?n

#### SAMPLE CJ DATA SEARCHES

Given the nature of the CJ DATA database, many of the searches are likely to be conducted on the basis of words in the title, principal investigator names, or subject terms (i.e. keyterms) and as such, represent situations where indexes may be fruitfully employed to locate pertinent data collections. Below are two examples of how these search requests may be structured:

Example 1: Searching for a Specific Title

>in active find titleword family
-SPIRES ACTIVE FILE SET TO: -SPIRES
-RESULT: 2 COLLECTIONS
->in active type title
->type title

TITLE = YANK 76 FAM 8084: 1976 FAMILY STUDY;

TITLE = SASKATCHEWAN UNIFIED FAMILY COURT EVALUATION;

In this example, the user has looked for "family" as a word in a study title, placed the results of the search into an active file, and then displayed the titles of the retrieved collections on the screen. Please note that first the information was typed in the active file with the "in active type" command and subsequently displayed to the terminal with the "type" command. Additionally, the user has requested that only the contents of the "title" element be displayed in the records that are typed. (See page xxxii for a full list of elements and aliases in the CJ DATA database).

Example 2: Searching for a Study by Principal Investigator's Name

->find piname williams -RESULT: 3 COLLECTIONS ->type

REC01 = 4901; DATE-ADDED = Dec. 13, 1985; DATE-UPDATED = Dec. 18, 1985; TITLE = PUBLIC ATTITUDES TOWARD THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM AND CRIMINAL VICTIMIZATION IN NORTH CAROLINA, 1971; INVESTIGATOR = Richardson, R., O. Williams, T. Denyer, S. McGaughey, and D. Walker.; SUMMARY = A survey measuring the attitudes of 1,145 North Carolina citizens toward frequency of criminal victinization, the reporting of crime by alleged victims, and public contact with criminal justice agencies.;

TOPIC = 16. Victimization;

KEYWORDS = victim/correctional facilities/perception of crime/law enforcement/agency/state/community;

SUMMARY = A study involving the retrieval of data in the criminal court files of 83 North Carolina counties. Data include such items as date of violation and arrest, original charge, final charge, plea, verdict and sentence.;

TOPIC = 03. Courts;

KEYWORDS = plea bargaining/sentence/arrest/disposition/court/ state/offender;

In the previous example all of the studies by principal investigators named Williams have been located and the three records found have been displayed.

#### SYNTAX OF A SPIRES SEARCH COMMAND

To start searching you must issue several SPIRES commands: which subfile you want SPIRES to search, which index you want to use in the search, which values you want SPIRES to find in that index and how you want to display the records retrieved by the search. The mechanics of selecting a subfile and identifying some of its characterization have been described above. You are now ready to go on to locating the information you want by constructing a search request.

Search requests can be made using the indexes that have been created for the subfile you selected or they can be made on the entire goal records. Both methods of searching will be described below. Searching using the index records will be presented in more detail since that is a simple and yet versatile technique and because it is more economical than sequential searching of the goal records.

When you issue a search request, SPIRES scans the index(es) you name for values that match the criteria you specify in the search request. SPIRES then reports the number of goal records meeting those criteria. These retrieved goal records are the "search result." Search requests can be simple or complex, cheap or expensive, depending on how carefully you construct them.

The SPIRES command "show search terms" displays those indexes that contain valid search terms for a particular subfile. One of the simplest commands for these searches is "find". As subsequent examples illustrate, the search command with "find" can be very simple, but it can also become quite complex. SPIRES provides the means to search for combinations of terms including searches that employ the Boolean operators "and", "or" and "and not". All SFIRES search commands have the basic structure:

"find"	"piname"	[string, pr fix, suffix,] [with, having, word, = ]	"smith"	[and, or, and not]
command verb	index name	relational operators	search term	logical operators

#### SIMPLE SEARCH REQUESTS

Once you have specified a SPIRES subfile, in this case the CJ DATA database, and have identified the indexes in the subfile, you can search the database by giving the command verb "find" followed by a value for any of the

indexes. In a simple search, "find" must be followed by an index (e.g., "titleword", "piname", or "keyterms") and a value for that index. The commands for three simple searches might appear as follows:

Run 1

->find t time -RESULT: 40 COLLECTIONS

Run 2

->find p johnston -RESULT: 9 COLLECTIONS

Run 3

#### ->find k family -RESULT: 26 COLLECTIONS

Users who search the CJ DATA database on a regular basis may want to search only those records that have been added to the database either before or after a certain date. This can be accomplished easily by beginning the search sequence with a search request that selects only those records that meet certain date criteria:

->find added after 1/1/86 -RESULT: 2 COLLECTIONS

->find added before 1/1/86 -RESULT: 669 COLLECTIONS

#### **RELATIONAL OPERATORS**

Relational operators express the relationship between one or more of the indexes and the specified value for the index(es) in the search statement. There are four kinds of relational operators: equality, inequality, range, and content.

1. Equality

The simplest of the relational operators is the equality (=) operator. It is used to search an index for a value that is equal to the one specified in the search request. In the examples of simple searches above, the equality operator is assumed to be part of the value for the search term. That is, the following three search requests are equivalent:

->find k family ->find k=family ->find k = family

Equality is the default relational operator.

2. Inequality

The inequality operators are: ">", "<", ">=", "<=". Example:

->find updated <= January 1, 1986

3. Range

Range operators are those words corresponding in meaning to the inequality symbols or signs. They include: 1) "after", and 2) "before". For example:

->find add.d before 1/1/86

4. Content

The last set of relational operators are referred to as content operators. They include: 1) "string", 2) "with", 3) "having", 4) "prefix", 5) "suffix", and 6) "word". The most frequently used content operator is the string operator. With it, you can designate a string of characters as the value for an index and SPIRES will retrieve records which contain the specified characters contiguously and in the order written. If you were to issue the command "find k string age", the system would retrieve all studies whose keywords contained the letters "age" occurring in that order and not separated by blanks.

->find k string age -RESULT: 63 COLLECTIONS

The result would include studies with the keywords "images," "aged," "agencies," and "management."

#### LOGICAL OPERATORS

The logical operators "and", "or", and "and not" connect search expressions and thus broaden or narrow the field of a search. The "and" operator specifies that the search result must satisfy the criteria on both sides of the logical operator. The "and not" operator limits the search field by specifying that one criterion but not another must be met. "Or" specifies that either criterion must be satisfied. Unlike many programming languages which evaluate "and" before "or", SPIRES evaluates logical operators in search commands from left to right.

#### COMPOUND SEARCH REQUESTS

Compound searches can be accomplished in two ways. You may specify more than one value for an index, and/or more than one index in a single "find" command. Alternatively, you may perform an iterative search where you specify additional information after obtaining an initial search result.

1. The Compound "find" Command

It is possible to specify multiple search criteria in a single "find" command by joining the search expressions with logical operators. The syntax of the compound "find" command is:

->find [index value] [logical operator] [index value]....

The compound "find" allows you to specify more than one criterion for a single index or to specify criteria for more than one index:

->find k national and crime and attitude

This result would consist of collections that include "national," "crime," and "attitude" as keywords.

->find k crime and piname williams

The result would be collections with "crime" as a keyword but only those by principal investigators named Williams.

Note that when you are specifying one index with multiple values, as in the first example, you need only specify the index once and the system will assume that the additional values are for that index. When you are specifying more than one index, however, you must attach the appropriate index name. For example, the command:

->find k police and johnston

will not yield a valid result since the system will be trying to locate "johnston" as a keyword. The command is correctly entered as two separate search

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expressions "keyterms police" and "piname johnston" connected by the logical operator "and" and prefixed by "find" as follows:

->find k police and p johnston

It is important to avoid ambiguity in the compound search since the system may evaluate your request differently than you intended. For example, if you want to locate a collection whose principal investigator is Johnston and whose keyword list includes either "political" or "attitude" you might incorrectly type:

#### ->find p johnston and k political or attitude -RESULT: 194 COLLECTIONS

The system would evaluate your request from left to right and retrieve studies conducted by Johnston having the keyword "political," or any studies having the keyword "attitude." The left-to-right order for evaluating expressions has caused the problem. The appropriate entry would be:

->find k political or attitude and p johnston -RESULT: 9 COLLECTIONS

The use of parentheses is another way to order the logical operations to be performed in a meaningful fashion. In the incorrect search request above, parentheses could have been used to obtain the appropriate result. The use of parentheses in the example below serves to clarify the focus of the search:

->find p clarke and (k family or attitude) -RESULT: 1 COLLECTIONS

Here the system retrieved all studies conducted by Clarke which include either "family" or "attitude" as keywords.

You may also nest parentheses. SPIRES will evaluate expressions contained in parentheses algebraically beginning with the innermost set. For example:

->find k attitude or (fear and not (p johnston or jackson)) -RESULT: 248 COLLECTIONS

The system retrieved all studies which included the keyword "attitude" and all studies having the keyword "fear" which are not conducted by Johnston or Jackson.

#### 2. Iterative Compound Searches

Compound searches may also be done iteratively. That is, after a "find" command has been issued and a result obtained, you may specify additional search criteria in successive commands. Iterative searching requires the presence of a search result and allows you to enlarge or contract that result. This procedure has the advantage of retaining the intermediate results of a series of searches. For example:

->find k attitude -RESULT: 186 COLLECTIONS ->and fear -RESULT: 50 COLLECTIONS ->and not economy -RESULT: 48 COLLECTIONS ->and p gallup -RESULT: 4 COLLECTIONS ->and k crime -RESULT: 3 COLLECTIONS

This search began with all studies pertaining to attitudes. It was then narrowed to include those studies which deal with fear but not the economy. The search was futher restricted to studies by the Gallup organization, and then finally narrowed to studies which directly pertain to crime.

#### THE BACKUP COMMAND

When a search yields a zero result or for some reason the user would like to return to the result from a previous search, this may be accomplished by "backing up" to the previous result rather than executing the search sequence again. When you issue the "backup" command, SPIRES substitutes the current result of your search with the preceeding result. The system will backup automatically when you have reduced the number of studies in a result to zero through iterative searching. Note that you cannot issue two consecutive "backup" commands, nor can you issue the "backup" command until at least two results (the current result and a preceeding one) have been returned. Some examples will illustrate:

->find k murder

-RESULT: 39 COLLECTIONS ->or prison

-RÉSULT: 66 COLLECTIONS

->or rights

-RESULT: 177 COLLECTIONS

->backup

-RESULT: 66 COLLECTIONS

->backup -BACKUP NOT POSSIBLE

->find t string sex -RESULT: 3 COLLECTIONS ->backup -BACKUP NOT POSSIBLE

#### SEARCHES WITH INCOMPLETE INFORMATION

It is possible to carry out a SPIRES search with less than complete information. A truncated value search allows you to obtain a valid search result without knowing, for example, the full name of the principal investigator or the specific keywords. For such a search, the "find" command verb is followed by the incomplete value of the index. Truncation is performed by placing a "#" sign at the end of the search term.

The advantage of truncated value searching is that it allows you to search with only an approximate value for a specific index. For example, "drugs" is a keyword in the SPIRES subfile CJ DATA database, whereas "drug" is not. The search command "find k drug" produces a result of 0 collections. However, when you give the search command "find k drug#" the system retrieves records whose keyword list includes "drugs," or "drugged," etc.

->find k drug -ZERO RESULT

->find k drug# -RESULT: 143 COLLECTIONS

#### SEARCHING UNINDEXED INFORMATION

Occasionally a user may want to see information that has not been indexed in the database. In CJ DATA, for example, the user might want to see the distributor, funding agency, or some similar element that has not been indexed. SPIRES has two ways in which the user can do such a search: "global for" and the "also" command. Since in these searches all information in each goal record is examined in sequence to det\_rmine if it meets the search criteria, this method of searching is more time consuming and expensive.

The "global for" commands are really an entire array of commands and warrant their own SPIRES manual. Given the complexity of these commands and the amount of information needed to successfully use this search method, we will not describe these commands here but only alert the user to their existence. Users who do wish to learn more about "global for" processing can consult the appropriate manuals for further information. Introductory information about "global for" can be found in the SPIRES Guide to Data Base Development primer. Experienced users may want to consult the "SPIRES Searching and Updating," the "Sequential Record Processing in SPIRES: Global For," and the "SPIRES File Definition" manuals.

The "also" command helps you to narrow an existing search result by using unindexed criteria. This command can only operate on an existing search result. What this means is that at least one "find" command using an indexed element must have been issued prior to the "also" or "also not" commands. Searches that are part of an earlier search result may be done iteratively, using the "also" and "also not" commands. Like the "and" command, "also" can only narrow the search. The "also" and "also not" commands enable you to specify values for unindexed elements using the equality and inequality operators, and content operators such as "string". Additionally, the "also" and "also not" command words must begin the command statement. They cannot be embedded in a line.

In the CJ DATA database, the collection's TITLE (TI) is an indexed element, while related PUBLICATIONS (PUB) is an unindexed element. If, for example, the object of a search is all studies containing the keyword "juvenile" which may have a publication with "criminal" as one of the components of the publication title, the procedure would be as follows:

->find t juvenile -RESULT: 14 COLLECTIONS ->also pub string criminal -RESULT: 9 COLLECTIONS

Note, however, that when an unindexed element is part of the search request, the name of the element must be used since there is no index term for that element. In the above example, "pub" is the name of the element for publications. In order to obtain a list of the elements found in a subfile, issue the command "show elements" described earlier. A list of CJ DATA elements is also found on page xxxii. You will see that, in the example above, the value for element "pub" ("criminal") is prefaced with the word "string". "String" tells SPIRES to search the publications element for the string "criminal". If "string" is not given in this instance, the user would never find "criminal" because SPIRES will be looking for a value in the publications element consisting of the single word, "criminal". That is, if the "string" operator is not included in the search request SPIRES will retrieve only those records which have a publications element whose entire string of characters matches the search term, character for character.

#### DISPLAYING THE RESULTS OF A SEARCH

When you have specified search criteria and the system has returned a result, you will generally want to examine the records retrieved. The "type" command allows the user to display the records that were retrieved as a result of any given search. The amount of information that is displayed can be controlled by the user. The user can let SPIRES display the entire record or can limit the information to just certain elements. You limit what is displayed by qualifying the "type" command verb with a list of the specific elements that you wish to examine. The element list which follows the "type" command ("ti" and "pi" in the example below) will restrict the display so that only the specified elements and not the full display will be printed.

->fin k juvenile and p johnston -RESULT: 2 COLLECTIONS ->type ti pi

TITLE = MONITORING THE FUTURE: A CONTINUING STUDY OF THE LIFESTYLES AND VALUES OF YOUTH, 1976; INVESTIGATOR = Bachman, J.G., L.D. Johnston, and P. O'Malley.;

TITLE = MONITORING THE FUTURE: A CONTINUING STUDY OF THE LIFESTYLES AND VALUES OF YOUTH, 1980: INVESTIGATOR = Bachman, J.G., L.D. Johnston, and P. O'Mallev.;

You may continue to search the subfile iteratively after you have issued a "type" command. Also, you can save the typed display in your active file by prefixing "type" with "in active".

The syntax of the "type" command is:

"pi", "ti"

list

"type" command verb

element number of records to skip before typing

[skip = n]

mutually exclusive options

[keep or pause]

[clean] eliminates

extra lines in display

#### **OPTIONS WITH THE TYPE COMMAND**

#### 1. Skip

Occasionally the user may want to skip a number of records before displaying the remaining records of the search result. The "skip=n" option of the "type"

command can be used to do this. The "skip=n" specifies that "n" records should be passed over before the display starts.

->type skip=50

The "skip" option is useful when you are interrupted in the process of viewing the results of a search and do not wish to display all of the records again, or at any other time you do not wish to view all of the records. In the following example:

->find k violence -RESULT: 111 COLLECTIONS ->type skip=99

SPIRES will display only the last 12 records of the search result.

2. Pause

The "type" command's "pause" option instructs the system to stop after displaying each record until the <carriage return> key is struck. This is especially helpful with video terminals that lack a scroll-back feature.

When you employ the pause option, the list of elements to be typed in the display must precede the word "pause." That is, "pause" must be the last word in a command expression. Using the earlier example:

->find k violence -RESULT: 111 COLLECTIONS ->type skip=99 pause

#### 3. Keep

When "keep" is appended to the "type" command, the system will prompt you with "KEEP?" after the display of each record in a search result. A response of "yes" will cause SPIRES to retain the record in the current search result; "no" will drop the record from the search result. In this way, you can modify the results of a search as you examine each record.

->type skip=5 keep

Note that the "keep" and "pause" options may not appear in the same "type" command expression, since "keep" necessarily pauses between individual records.

#### 4. Clean

When you display search results using the "type" command, the display will automatically contain a blank line between each record. If you are storing the search results in your active file using the "in active type" command, the records will be separated with a line of asterisks (\*\*\*\*), and a semi-colon (;) will appear at the end of each record. Although these lines are helpful for visually separating records, they add unnecessary lines to a large display or an active file. "Clean" eliminates these extra lines.

The syntax of the "type" command requires that "clean" follow the command verb, element list, and any of the other options you wish to use.

-RESULT: 14 COLLECTIONS ->type ti pi skip=11 keep clean

#### SEQUENTIAL ORDERING OF SEARCH RESULTS

The typed results of a search request often appear to be randomly ordered. You may specify the order in which results are printed by the system by employing the "sequence" command. The sequential stacking of search results can be performed on indexed as well as unindexed elements. To order records of a search result sequentially you must first decide the element on which you want the results to be organized. Next you type "sequence" followed by the name of the organizing element. SPIRES will inform you that it has arranged the results in sequence by returning "STACK:" and will indicate the number of studies in the result.

->find k appeal

-RESULT: 5 COLLECTIONS

->sequence ti

-STACK: 5 COLLECTIONS ->type ti pi

TITLE = CIVIL LITIGATION IN THE UNITED STATES, 1977-1979; INVESTIGATOR = Trubek, D.M., and J.B. Grossman.;

TITLE = LAW ENFORCEMENT ASSISTANCE ADMINISTRA-TION PROFILE DATA, [1968-1978];

INVESTIGATOR = United States Department of Justice. Office of Justice Assistance, Research, and Statistics.;

TITLE = NATIONAL SURVEY OF COURT ORGANIZATION, 1971-1972;

INVESTIGATOR = United States Department of Justice. Bureau of Justice Statistics.;

TITLE = STATE COURT STATISTICS, 1978-1980; INVESTIGATOR = National Center for State Courts. Court Statistics and Information Management Project.;

TITLE = STATISTICS FOR COURTS OF APPEALS (JS-34); INVESTIGATOR = Administrative Office of the United States Courts. Statistical Analysis and Reports Division.;

If the user finds a difference in the result totals between the number of studies located and the number stacked, that is usually explained by the fact that some of the studies may not have values for the element used for sequencing. If each study has a value for the sequencing element, there is no change in the result totals between the studies located and those sequenced.

#### SHOW SEARCH

The "show search" command allows you to review the steps you have taken in the search process. This feature of SPIRES is helpful when you are using a video terminal which does not scroll back, or when you lose track of the criteria which you had specified in order to arrive at a particular result. The "show search" command, however, does not print out the results you generated in the course of the search. The "type" command will display these results.

-RESULT: 3 COLLECTIONS ->show search FIND K EMPLOYMENT AND URBAN AND DRUGS

#### ABBREVIATIONS IN SPIRES

SPIRES commands or search terms can usually be shortened using the first three letters of the command or another acceptable abbreviation. Terms with three or fewer letters when unabbreviated cannot be abbreviated, nor can specific values for indexes. For example, when searching for studies whose principal investigator is the Institute for Social Research, "ISR" is not understood by the system as an abbreviation. Some examples of common terms and their abbreviations:

> bac = backup exp = explain fin = find in act = in active sel = select sho = show tut = tutorial typ = type

#### ROUTING SEARCH RESULTS TO THE MTS PRINTER

In addition to (or instead of) displaying a search result at the terminal using the "type" command, the user may want to route the search result to the MTS printer. This is nearly always the case with large search results wherein the user would be required to wait at the terminal for a display of, say, 100 records.

Keeping in mind that the name of the default SPIRES active file is -SPIRES, the following search will place all the result records in -SPIRES. -SPIRES can then be routed to the printer:

->find p smith and k juvenile or t crime -RESULT: 49 COLLECTIONS ->in active type ->stop #list -spires \*print\* \*PRINT\* ASSIGNED RECEIPT NUMBER 609669 \*PRINT\* RELEASED TO CNTR, 22 PAGES

Remote users of MTS can make arrangements with the University of Michigan Computing Center to have copies of printout mailed to them. They should inquire about this service when they request an account with the Center. A number of capabilities also exist whereby users can download information from the -SPIRES file to their local microcomputers.

#### MISCELLANEOUS DETAILS

When the FUNDING.AGENCY field lists multiple agencies for a particular data collection it may not be clear which of the grant numbers listed in the GRANT.NUMBER field correspond to which agency. To help resolve any confusion please keep in mind that each agency issues grant numbers that conform to a fairly distinctive pattern and that the grant numbers are entered in their field in the same order in which the funding agencies were entered in FUNDING.AGENCY. In addition, if one of the agencies provided more than one grant in support of the data collection, that agency's grant numbers are listed in ascending order. For example:

FUNDING.AGENCY = United States Department of Health and Human Services. National Institute of Mental Health./United States Department of Justice. National Institute of Justice.; GRANT.NUMBER = MHZ7568, MHZ7593, and 76NIAX0006;

Also, please note that users cannot directly search the database for the keyword "ex-offender." In order to locate those studies to which "ex-offender" has been assigned, follow these steps:

- Search the database for the keyword "offender":
   ->find k offender
- (2) Place the result in the active file:->in active clear type
- (3) Edit the active file:->edit
- (4) Scan the active file for "ex-offender" (note that ":" is the edit prompt): :scan@all@anycase/file #ex-offender#
- (5) Position yourself at the last line in which "ex-offender" was located: :print [linenumber]
- (6) Scan backward in the file for the immediately previous REC01 number: :scan@anycase/back #REC01 = #
- (7) Position yourself at the line in which the previous "ex-offender" was found::print [linenumber]
- (8) Again scan backward for the immediately previous REC01 number: :scan@anycase/back #REC01 = #
- (9) Repeat steps (7) and (8) until you have identified the REC01 number for each record to which the keyword "ex-offender" has been assigned.

#### CONCLUDING REMARKS

This document can give only a brief general introduction to SPIRES and to the CJ DATA subfile in particular. More detailed information about SPIRES is available through the Stanford Center for Information Processing, Campus Computing Facility, Stanford University or through the University of Michigan Computing Center, Ann Arbor, Michigan 48109.

#### **GLOSSARY OF SPIRES TERMS**

#### HOW TO USE THIS DIRECTORY

This Directory is intended to make available by conventional means the information contained in the CJ DATA database. It is organized into five sections.

The first section on page xxxvii contains a list of the principal investigators (a total of 225) cited in the Directory. They are arranged in alphabetical order. Scanning the list, the reader can readily locate a specific investigator.

The second section, DATA COLLECTION DESCRIPTIONS, is a listing of all 671 records or data collections as they presently appear in the CJ DATA database. If one were to use SPIRES to retrieve all 671 records, the the result would be identical to the one appearing on pages 1-270, with the exception that the records have been put into order by topical category, and alphabetically by principal investigator within each topic.

Section three, located on page 271, is a list of all keywords used to describe the data collections in the Directory. There are a total of 115 keywords. If the reader does not have a particular investigator in mind but wishes to locate all the data collections available in the Directory on a particular topic, this may be accomplished by examining the list of keywords. Once one or more keywords have been selected as descriptive or related to the topic in question, the reader should turn to the KEYWORD INDEX (section four) beginning on page 273.

Section four contains all the keywords used to describe the data collections in the Directory. They are arranged in alphabetical order. The reader should locate the keyword he or she has chosen. Listed below the keyword are the titles of the data collections which have been described by the keyword and the page on which the description of the data collection appears.

Section five, the final section located on page 433, is simply a summary of all the sources distributing data collections listed in the Directory. There are a fairly small number of sources as many distributors offer a sizeable number of data collections.

The following is a list in alphabetical order of the Principal Investigators cited in the DIRECTORY of CRIMINAL JUSTICE DATA COLLECTIONS. consequences for the lives of women. The survey was carried out by the Market Opinion Research Corporation between October and December, 1977, using a telephone interview scheme. Questionnaire preparation and initial pretesting, along with all sampling and telephone number preparation, was conducted at Northwestern. The three cities selected for study were Chicago, Philadelphia, and San Francisco. A total of ten neighborhoods were chosen from these cities along a number of dimensions-ethnicity, class, crime, and levels of organizational activity. In addition, a small city-wide sample was drawn from each city. General topics covered include how individuals band together to deal with crime problems, individual responses to crime such as property marking or the installation of locks and bars, and the impact of fear of crime on day-to-day behavior, for example, shopping and recreational patterns. Respondents were asked several questions which called for self-reports of behavior, these include questions about events and conditions in their home areas, their relationship to their neighbors, who they know and visit around their homes, and what they watch on TV and read in the newspapers. Also included were a number of questions measuring respondents' perceptions of the extent of crime in their communities, whether they knew someone who had been a victim, and what they had done to reduce their own chances of being victimized. Data are available in both OSIRIS and card-image formats, with machine-readable documentation. There are approximately 200 variables for each of the 5,121 cases.

In the event a new crime has been committed, any new sentences or sanctions connected with these violations are shown on the reports. If there is no violation or the person under supervision is removed from supervision before his term is completed because of satisfactory behavior, this is also documented.

PROMIS assigns two numerical ratings to each case: one signifying the gravity of the crimes through the measurement of the amount of harm done to society, and the other signifying the gravity of the prior record of the accused. These ratings make it possible to select the more important cases for intensive. pre-trial preparation and to assure even-handed treatment of cases with similar degrees of gravity. A complementary feature of PROMIS is the automation of reasons for decisions made or actions taken along the assembly line. Reasons for dismissing cases prior to trial on their merits can be related to earlier cycles of postponement for various reasons and the reasoning behind intake and screening decisions. The PROMIS dataset also includes information about the defendant, case characteristics and processes, charge, sentencing and continuance processes, and the witness/victims involved in the case. PROMIS was first used in 1971 in the United States Attorney's Office for the District of Columbia.
