

PART 1: SURVEY OF INMATES OF STATE CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES, 1974

#### STUDY DESCRIPTION

The Survey of Inmates of State Correctional Facilities, 1974 was one of a series of data-gathering efforts undertaken during the 1970's to assist policymakers in assessing and overcoming any deficiencies in the nation's correctional institutions. During that decade, an unprecedented growth in the number of people subject to custody imposed increasingly heavier demands on already strained institutions. Intensified by overcrowding, the deterioration in living conditions among the incarcerated helped spur public authorities, especially the judiciary, to take remedial action. Decisions rendered by state and federal courts have required the adoption of measures to alleviate overcrowding and otherwise improve living conditions in correctional facilities. Against this background, the Bureau of Justice Statistics has conducted surveys of federal, state, and local correctional facilities to determine existing conditions and to predict future needs.

The Survey of Inmates of State Adult Correctional Facilities, 1974 was conducted in conjunction with The Census of State Correctional Facilities, 1974. The survey was designed to gather information on social and economic characteristics, criminal and correctional background, adjudication experience, and prison routine. Within these broad areas, particularly detailed information was obtained on preincarceration employment and income, frequency of drug use, offense, length of sentence, and parole patterns of repeat offenders. There are 432 variables for each of the 9,040 inmates interviewed for the survey.

#### DATA COLLECTION PROCEDURES

The survey was conducted by personal interview, with most interviews carried out during late January and early February 1974. All interviewing was completed by February 22.

The original survey specifications required a sample totaling 10,000 inmates (9,040 interviews are included in this dataset) or approximately 1 in every 18 offenders under the jurisdiction of State correctional authorities. As a first step in designing the sample, a total of 710 facilities thought to be holding such offenders was stratified according to the following five categories of size as measured by the estimated number of persons held: less than 20, 20-199, 200-399, 400-899, and 900 or more.

All facilities that had an estimated 900 or more inmates were included in the sample. To assure proper representation in the sample of institutions within the four smaller size ranges, these were further stratified on the basis of a combination of three criteria: [1] type of facility (prison for adults, community correctional center, work-release center, prison or road camp, reception or pre-release center, and others), [2] regional location, and [3] specific estimated size. These procedures yielded a sample consisting of 190 facilities. Once the institutional sample was drawn, the inmate sample was determined by a set of ratios designed to assure an overall sampling rate of 1 inmate in every 18 as shown in the following tabulation:

Weighting adjustments compensated for cases in which inmates were unavailable or ineligible for interview, as well as for those in which data were drawn from institutional records.

#### WEIGHTING INFORMATION

Data records obtained by interviewers were assigned final weights, which were the product of the following four elements: [1] A basic weight of 18 was applied, reflecting each inmate's probability of being included in the sample; [2] The sampling rate was adjusted from that which was originally prescribed for those institutions in which the presurvey population estimates differed to a significant degree from the actual population present at the time of the interview. A duplication control factor was applied solely to the data records of inmates from these institutions; [3] A nonpersonal interview adjustment was made, designed to compensate for data derived from institutional records rather than through interviews. This adjustment was made separately for males and females within seven noninterview clusters comprising states or groups of states.

With respect to the clusters of males, the non-interview data cells were defined by four variables--type of institution (adult and other), race (black and non-black). type of offense, and age (24 and under and 25 and over). For females, the noninterview data cells were defined by age and type of offense. For any given data cell, the noninterview adjustment was defined as the ratio of the weighted number of personally interviewed prisoners plus non-personally interviewed prisoners in all relevant data cells: [4] The final factor was that of the ratio estimate. an adjustment that brought the survey-derived inmate count into accord with a total enumeration of prisoners, as determined by the January 31, 1974. Census of State Correctional Facilities. This factor was defined as the ratio of the census count of prisoners within each of the four geographical regions to the weighted, survey-derived estimate of prisoners for the corresponding region. The appropriate ratio adjustment was applied to each personally interviewed prisoner's data record.

#### FILE STRUCTURE

The Survey of Inmates of State Correctional Facilities, 1974 are available from the ICPSR in two formats: a card image file and an OSIRIS dataset. The card image file contains several decks per case in a format based on 80 column punched cards. The data are sorted by case with all decks for a case together in ascending order.

The OSIRIS dictionary gives the format and other information for each variable in the OSIRIS data file. The dictionary or dictionary-codebook file is used in conjunction with the OSIRIS software package. The OSIRIS data file is constructed with a single logical record for each case. There are 433 variables on 9.040 cases.

The OSIRIS data file can be accessed directly through software packages or programs which do not use the OSIRIS dictionary by specifying the tape locations of the desired variables. These tape locations are given in the OSIRIS dictionary-codebook.

#### ICPSR PROCESSING INFORMATION

The study was processed according to the standard ICPSR processing procedures. The data were checked for illegal or inconsistent code values which, when found, were recoded to OSIRIS missing data values. No consistency checks were performed. Statements bracketed in "<" and ">" signs in the body of the codebook were added by the processors for explanatory purposes. The archival processing of this study was done by David Schreiber.

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#### CODEBOOK INFORMATION

The example below is a reproduction of information appearing in the machine-readable codebook for a typical variable. The numbers in brackets do not appear but are references to the descriptions which follow this example.

- 1. Male
- 2. Female
- [1] Indicates the variable and reference numbers. A variable and reference number are assigned to each item in the study. In this codebook which documents the archived dataset these numbers are identical. Should the data be disseminated in a different structure, new variable numbers may be assigned or created. The reference number would remain unchanged and correspond to those in this codebook.
- [2] Indicates the abbreviated (24 character maximum) variable label used within OSIRIS to identify each variable. An expanded version can be found in the Variable Description List.
- [3] Indicates the designation of missing data. In this example, code values equal to 9 are missing data (MD=9). Alternative statements for other variables

are "MD=? OR GE ?", "MD GE ?", or "NO MISSING DATA CODES". Some analysis software packages (including the ICPSR-supported package) require that certain types of data which the user desires to be excluded from analysis be designated as "missing data" e.g., inappropriate, unascertained, unascertainable, or ambiguous data categories. Although this value is defined as within the missing data category, this does not mean that users should not or cannot use this code value in a substantive role if they so desire.

- [4] Indicates the sequential location and width of this variable within the record when the data are stored on magnetic tape. In this example the variable named "Sex" is one column wide and located in the 24th column within the record.
- [5] Indicates the location by deck and column(s) of this variable when the data are stored on cards or in card image format.
- [6] Indicates the full text of the variable description supplied by the original collector of the data. The numbers and letters that may appear at the beginning are question numbers from the survey forms.
- [7] Indicates an additional comment or explanation appended to the variable description.
- [8] A variable which has a footnote associated with it is denoted by the message, "SEE NOTE(S) X" where X is the number of the footnote referenced.
- [9] Indicates the code values occurring in the data for this variable.
- [10] Indicates the textual definitions of the codes.

PART 2: CENSUS OF STATE ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES, 1974

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#### STUDY DESCRIPTION

The Census of State Adult Correctional Facilities, 1974 was one of a series of data-gathering efforts undertaken during the 1970's to assist policymakers in assessing and overcoming any deficiencies in the nation's correctional institutions. During that decade, an unprecedented growth in the number of people subject to custody imposed increasingly heavier demands on already strained institutions. Intensified by overcrowding, the deterioration in living conditions among the incarcerated helped spur public authorities, especially the judiciary, to take remedial action. Decisions rendered by state and federal courts have required the adoption of measures to alleviate overcrowding and otherwise improve living conditions in correctional facilities. Against this background, the Bureau of Justice Statistics has conducted surveys of federal, state, and local correctional facilities to determine existing conditions and to predict future needs.

The Census of State Adult Correctional Facilities, 1974 was conducted in conjunction with the Survey of Inmates of State Adult Correctional Facilities, 1974. The Census of State Adult Correctional Facilities, 1974 was designed to gather a wide range of information on all Federal Correctional Facilities operating in 1974. The type of information collected includes:

> INMATE DEMOGRAPHICS - sentenced and unsentenced, by security classification, and by sex of inmate

STAFF DEMOGRAPHICS - by full and part time staff, by paid and unpaid staff, by type of position, by educational level, by age, and by salary

FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS - number of cells by number of inmates cells designed for, by facilities found in cells, medical facilities available, and by facilities available for inmate use

PROGRAMS FOR INMATES - by group offering programs, by type of program, and by work and study release

INMATE IQ INFORMATION - by type of test, by score

The survey was conducted by mail, with follow-up telephone queries for facilities failing to complete the questionnaires. The response rate was 100% There are 388 variables for each of the 592 facilities interviewed for the survey.

#### FILE STRUCTURE

The Census of State Adult Correctional Facilities, 1974 data are available from the ICPSR in two formats: a card image file and an OSIRIS dataset. The card image file contains one set of cards per case known as a deck. The deck format is based on 80 column punched cards. The data are sorted by case with all decks for a case together in ascending order.

The OSIRIS dictionary gives the format and other information for each variable in the OSIRIS data file. The dictionary or dictionary-codebook file is used in conjunction with the OSIRIS software package. The OSIRIS data file is constructed with a single logical record, for each case. There are 388 variables on 592 cases.

The OSIRIS data file can be accessed directly through software packages or programs which do not use the OSIRIS dictionary by specifying the tape locations of the desired variables. These tape locations are given in the OSIRIS dictionary-codebook.

#### ICPSR PROCESSING INFORMATION

The study was processed according to the standard ICPSR processing procedures. The data were checked for illegal or inconsistent code values which, when found, were recoded to OSIRIS missing data values. No consistency checks were performed. Statements bracketed in "<" and ">" signs in the body of the codebook were added by the processors for explanatory purposes. The archival processing of this study was done by David Schreiber.
