Nonresponse in the NCVS

Household noninterviews

- 1. Type A noninterviews
- 2. Type B noninterviews
- 3. Type C noninterviews

Type A noninterviews

- Type Anoninterviews occur when sample unit consist of persons who are eligible for interview, but none of the persons can be interviewed.
- Type A noninterviews are preventable.
- Census tries to prevent type A noninterviews

Type B noninterviews

- Type B noninterviews occur when units are vacant or occupied by persons who have usually reside somewhere else.
- Temporarily ineligible.
 - Could become eligible in the future.
 - Will be contacted again during the next wave of the NCVS.

Type C noninterviews

- Type C noninterviews occur when the sample address should be permanently removed from the NCVS sample
- Permanently ineligible for the NCVS.
 - The unit is removed from the sample and not contacted again.

Type Z noninterviews

- Type Z noninterviews occur when an interview is obtained from at least one but not all eligible household members.
- Relates to a household member, not the entire household.
- May be eligible in the future.
