

Sexual Victimization Reported by Adult Correctional Authorities, 2019–2020 – Statistical Tables

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
n 2020, correctional administrators reported 36,264 allegations of sexual victimization in prisons, jails, and other adult correctional facilities (figure 1). This included allegations of inmate-on-inmate nonconsensual sexual acts, inmate-on-inmate abusive sexual contact, inmateon-inmate sexual harassment, staff-on-inmate sexual misconduct, and staff-on-inmate sexual harassment.¹ Of all the allegations reported in 2020, 2,351 were substantiated after investigation, the lowest number since 2014, when there were 2.350 substantiated incidents. The number of allegations rose 121% from 2013 to 2016, which was partly attributable to correctional authorities' continuing response to the 2012 release of the National Standards to Prevent, Detect, and Respond to Prison Rape. From 2016 to 2020, the number of allegations of sexual victimization remained relatively stable, ranging from 35,206 allegations in 2017 to 38,132 in 2019.

Highlights

- Correctional administrators reported 36,264 allegations of sexual victimization in 2020, a 5% decrease from 2019 (38,132) (table 1).
- The rate of total substantiated incidents of sexual victimization in 2020 (1.2 incidents per 1,000 inmates) was not significantly different from the rate for any year since 2014 (table 2).
- In 2020, there were 9,321 allegations of inmateon-inmate sexual harassment, 8,628 of staff sexual misconduct, 7,449 of staff sexual harassment, 6,370 of nonconsensual sexual acts, and 4,496 of abusive sexual contact (figure 3).
- During 2019–20, nearly 82% of inmate-on-inmate incidents were reported by the victim, while 38% of staff-on-inmate incidents were reported by the victim (tables 6 and 12).
- During 2019–20, more than 80% of staff perpetrators were employed for less than 5 years (table 16).
- Legal action was ultimately taken against the perpetrator of staff sexual misconduct in 53% of incidents in jails and 45% of incidents in prisons during 2019–20 (table 18).



Prison Rape Elimination Act and the National Standards to Prevent, Detect, and Respond to Prison Rape

Section 4(a)(1) of the Prison Rape Elimination Act of 2003 (PREA) requires the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) to "carry out, for each calendar year, a comprehensive statistical review and analysis of the incidence and effects of prison rape" (P.L. 108–79).

BJS has developed a multiple-measure, multiple-mode data collection strategy to fulfill the PREA requirements, including three surveys relating to victimization of inmates and youth held in juvenile correctional facilities. The Survey of Sexual Victimization (SSV) collects administrative data annually on the incidence of sexual victimization in adult and juvenile correctional facilities. The National Inmate Survey and the National Survey of Youth in Custody gather data on the prevalence of sexual assault as reported by inmates in prisons and jails and by youth held in correctional facilities.

In 2012, the U.S. Department of Justice published the National Standards to Prevent, Detect, and Respond to Prison Rape.² These standards included definitions of

This report provides statistics on allegations of sexual victimization and their outcomes for 2019 and 2020. Summary-level information is presented for 2019 and 2020 separately. Detailed information about substantiated incidents of sexual victimization is presented as aggregated estimates for 2019 and 2020, so the estimates reflect both years.

Findings are based on the Survey of Sexual Victimization (SSV), which the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) has conducted annually since 2004. The SSV is among the data collections that BJS conducts to meet the requirements of the Prison Rape Elimination Act of 2003. The survey is administered to all federal and state prisons; all facilities operated by the U.S. military and U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE); and representative samples of public and private jail jurisdictions, private prisons, and jails holding adults in Indian country. (See *Methodology*.)

Correctional administrators indicated how many instances of each victimization type were (1) substantiated or determined to have occurred, (2) unfounded or determined not to have occurred, (3) unsubstantiated or had insufficient evidence to make a final determination, or (4) under investigation at the time of data collection. terms related to sexual abuse, reporting and investigating allegations, and data collection. In 2013, the SSV was updated to better reflect these standards. Definitions were modified, questions about inmate-on-inmate and youth-on-youth sexual harassment were added, and incident forms for substantiated allegations were expanded to include more information.

When the standards were published, it was anticipated that the number of allegations would increase.³ There was a threefold increase in reported allegations in the 3 years following the release of the national standards. Such increases can indicate increased sexual abuse or inmates' or youth's increased willingness to report abuse. Likewise, an increase in substantiated incidents can mean a facility failed to protect inmates or youth from sexual abuse or investigated allegations more effectively.

BJS changes to reporting of sexual victimization

In contrast to prior reports, allegations and substantiated incidents of inmate-on-inmate sexual harassment are presented with the other two types of inmate-perpetrated victimization: nonconsensual sexual acts and abusive sexual contact. Estimates of total allegations and substantiated incidents are different from previously published statistics and are not directly comparable to SSV victimization estimates prior to 2013, which did not measure inmate-perpetrated sexual harassment, or to reports that presented inmate-on-inmate sexual harassment estimates separately.

To maintain continuity with estimates from 2012 and prior years, inmate-on-inmate sexual harassment was not presented with other types of victimization when it was added to the survey. Starting with the 2023 collection, the SSV will collect data on two types of inmate-perpetrated sexual victimization: sexual abuse and sexual harassment. To facilitate the ability to present trends across these victimization types, this report marks a transition to reporting data from 2013 onward in a way that better aligns with future data collections. Terms and definitions

The Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) uses uniform definitions for each sexual act and investigative outcome. Each sexual act is classified by the alleged perpetrator who carried out the incident (i.e., inmate or staff) and the type of act. In 2013, BJS modified the Survey of Sexual Victimization to align the definitions with national standards. BJS began collecting data on inmate-oninmate sexual harassment in 2013. These definitions are provided for the adult correctional facility administrators to reference when responding to the survey.

Inmate-on-inmate sexual victimization involves nonconsensual sexual acts or abusive contact with victims without their consent, or with victims who cannot consent or refuse, and sexual harassment perpetrated by one inmate against another. Respondents were not asked to specify a subcategory of attempted acts of inmate-oninmate sexual victimization. As a result, the specific type of act is unknown and is classified at the discretion of the adult correctional authorities. Some adult correctional authorities only record inmate sexual abuse allegations generally and may be unable to separately provide data for nonconsensual sexual acts and abusive sexual contact. Such allegations are categorized as determined by the responding authorities.

Nonconsensual sexual acts are the most serious victimizations and include:

- contact between the penis and the vulva or the penis and the anus, including penetration, however slight
- contact between the mouth and the penis, vulva, or anus
- penetration of the anal or genital opening of another person, however slight, by a hand, finger, object, or other instrument.

Abusive sexual contact includes intentional touching, either directly or through the clothing, of the genitalia, anus, groin, breast, inner thigh, or buttocks of any person. Situations in which the contact was incidental to a physical altercation are excluded.

Inmate-on-inmate sexual harassment includes repeated and unwelcome sexual advances; requests for sexual favors; or verbal comments, gestures, or actions of a derogatory or offensive sexual nature by one inmate directed toward another.

Staff-on-inmate sexual victimization includes sexual misconduct or sexual harassment perpetrated on an inmate by staff. Staff includes employees, volunteers, contractors, official visitors, or other agency representatives. Family, friends, and other visitors are excluded.

Staff sexual misconduct includes any consensual or nonconsensual behavior or act of a sexual nature directed toward an inmate by staff, including romantic relationships. Such acts include:

- intentional touching, either directly or through the clothing, of the genitalia, anus, groin, breast, inner thigh, or buttocks that is unrelated to official duties or with the intent to abuse, arouse, or gratify sexual desire
- completed, attempted, threatened, or requested sexual acts
- occurrences of indecent exposure, invasion of privacy, or staff voyeurism for reasons unrelated to official duties or for sexual gratification.

Staff sexual harassment includes repeated verbal comments or gestures of a sexual nature to an inmate by staff. Such statements include:

- demeaning references to an inmate's gender or sexually suggestive or derogatory comments about their body or clothing
- repeated profane or obscene language or gestures.

Substantiated incident means an allegation was investigated and determined to have occurred, based on a preponderance of the evidence (per 28 C.F.R. Part 115.72).

Unsubstantiated allegation means the investigation concluded that evidence was insufficient to determine whether or not the event occurred.

Unfounded allegation means the investigation determined that the event did not occur.

Under investigation means that correctional administrators were still investigating an allegation at the time of data collection.

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Section 1: Summary of allegations and substantiated incidents in adult correctional facilities, 2013–2020

Tables and figures in this section present annual estimates of allegations and substantiated incidents of sexual victimization reported on the summary-level form (SSV1 through SSV4) completed by responding agencies and facilities. (See *Methodology*.)


Key findings

- In 2020, about 6% of allegations were substantiated (2,351 of 36,264 allegations), compared to nearly 11% of allegations in 2013 (1,795 of 16,428 allegations) (figure 1).
- There were 21.3 allegations of sexual victimization per 1,000 prison inmates in 2020, which was a significant increase from 2013 (7.7 per 1,000 prison inmates) (table 1).
- The rate of substantiated incidents of sexual victimization in jails remained stable during this period, with no significant differences from 2013 (0.9 per 1,000 jail inmates) to 2020 (1.2 per 1,000 jail inmates (table 2).
- The rates of substantiated incidents of sexual victimization in 2020 were 5.0 per 1,000 inmates in military correctional facilities and 2.5 per 1,000 in facilities operated by ICE (table 2).
- The number of unfounded allegations doubled from 2013 (6,045) to 2015 (12,468), then remained between 12,000 and 14,000 each year through 2020 (figure 2).
- There were 435 substantiated incidents of staff sexual misconduct reported in state, federal, and private prisons in 2019 and 358 in 2020 (table 3).
- Allegations of all five types of sexual victimization increased sharply from 2013 to 2016. From 2016 to 2020, the number of allegations has fluctuated by less than 1,000 for each type (figure 3).
- Of the 2,351 substantiated incidents of sexual victimization in 2020, a total of 1,724 were perpetrated by other inmates (73%) and 627 were perpetrated by staff (27%) (table 4).
- In 2020, there were 2.4 times as many substantiated incidents of staff sexual misconduct (445) as of staff sexual harassment (183) (table 4).

Number of Allegations





Section 2. Characteristics of substantiated incidents of sexual victimization, 2019–20

Tables in this section present characteristics of substantiated incidents reported on the incidentlevel form (SSVIA). (See *Methodology*.) This form is completed by reporting agencies and facilities for all incidents that were determined to have occurred. Estimates for these tables are aggregated for 2019 and 2020.

Key findings

Inmate-on-inmate incidents

- A larger percentage of substantiated inmate-on-inmate nonconsensual sexual acts (52%) than abusive sexual contact (33%) or sexual harassment (34%) incidents occurred in the victim's cell or room (table 6).
- A higher percentage of substantiated inmateperpetrated sexual victimization incidents in jails (63%) than in prisons (36%) occurred in an area subject to video monitoring (table 7).

Victim and perpetrator characteristics

- In substantiated inmate-perpetrated incidents, females accounted for 35% of abusive sexual contact victims, 24% of sexual harassment victims, and 22% of nonconsensual sexual acts victims (table 8).
- In substantiated inmate-perpetrated incidents, males accounted for 81% of nonconsensual sexual acts perpetrators, 78% of sexual harassment perpetrators, and 67% of abusive sexual contact perpetrators (table 9).

Outcomes

- Substantiated inmate-on-inmate nonconsensual sexual acts resulted in an injury to the victim in approximately 20% of incidents and a major injury in 8% of incidents (table 10).
- Victims were provided counseling or mental health treatment in 52% of substantiated inmate-on-inmate sexual victimization incidents in prisons and 34% of those in jails (table 11).

Staff-on-inmate incidents

- A higher percentage of substantiated staff-on-inmate sexual harassment incidents (21%) than of sexual misconduct incidents (11%) occurred in a common area (table 12).
- Among substantiated incidents of staff-on-inmate sexual victimization, it was the victim who reported the incident in 69% of sexual harassment incidents, compared to 24% of sexual misconduct incidents (table 12).
- A larger percentage of substantiated staff-perpetrated sexual victimization incidents in jails (53%) than in prisons (30%) occurred in an area subject to video monitoring (table 13).

Victim and perpetrator characteristics

- In substantiated staff-on-inmate sexual victimization incidents, males made up 73% of sexual misconduct victims and 64% of sexual harassment victims (table 14).
- In substantiated staff-on-inmate sexual victimization incidents, females made up 67% of sexual misconduct perpetrators and 31% of sexual harassment perpetrators (table 15).
- The perpetrator of substantiated staff-on-inmate sexual victimization was a correctional officer or supervision staff member in 64% of incidents, a member of maintenance or facility support staff in 14%, and a member of medical or health care staff in 9% (table 16).

Outcomes

- Almost all (99%) substantiated staff-on-inmate sexual victimization incidents did not result in a physical injury to the victim (table 17).
- The victim underwent a medical examination in 23% of staff-perpetrated sexual misconduct incidents and 12% of staff-perpetrated sexual harassment incidents (table 17).
- Victims were provided counseling or mental health treatment in 45% of substantiated staff-perpetrated sexual victimization incidents in prisons and 33% of incidents in jails (table 18).
- Staff perpetrators of substantiated sexual victimization were more likely to be reprimanded or disciplined for incidents in jails (24%) than in prisons (15%) (table 18).

Measuring substantiated incidents of sexual victimization

Correctional authorities completed a substantiated incident form for any allegation of sexual victimization they investigated and determined to have occurred based on a preponderance of the evidence (per 28 C.F.R. Part 115.72). These substantiated incidents may have included multiple victims, multiple perpetrators, and events or behaviors that occurred repeatedly. In this report, the singular "victim" and "perpetrator" are used when describing characteristics of substantiated incidents because most involved one victim and one perpetrator, including about 93% of inmate-perpetrated abusive sexual contact and 91% staff-perpetrated sexual misconduct incidents (**table 5**). However, there was some variation across types of victimization. In almost 10% of incidents of inmate-on-inmate sexual harassment, there were multiple victims and a single perpetrator. Additionally, 10% of incidents of inmate-on-inmate nonconsensual sexual acts involved a single victim and multiple perpetrators.

By definition, some types of sexual victimization, such as sexual harassment, include repeated comments or gestures. The incident form did not collect information about the number of separate instances that were part of an allegation that was substantiated. However, correctional authorities were instructed throughout the form to select all characteristics that may have applied to the incident (for example, selecting multiple times of day or locations to describe when and where the incident took place). Section 3. Allegations and substantiated incidents in federal and state prisons, 2019 and 2020

Tables 19 to 22 include findings reported by the Federal Bureau of Prisons (FBOP) and all state departments of corrections for 2019 and 2020. These entities report an aggregated total of all allegations from facilities in their systems and the outcomes of investigation into these allegations. No significance testing was performed because data presented in these tables are a complete enumeration of allegations in federal and state prisons.

Key findings

- State prisons substantiated about 9% of allegations of both inmate-on-inmate abusive sexual contact (231 out of 2,509 allegations) and inmate-on-inmate sexual harassment (465 out of 5,066 allegations) in 2019 (table 19).
- In 2019, state prison authorities reported 360 substantiated incidents of staff-on-inmate sexual misconduct and 101 of staff-on-inmate sexual harassment (table 20).

- Of the 38 substantiated incidents reported in 2019 by FBOP authorities, 9 were inmate-perpetrated nonconsensual sexual acts, 7 were inmate-perpetrated abusive sexual contacts, 14 were inmate-on-inmate sexual harassment incidents, 7 were staff-on-inmate sexual misconduct incidents, and 1 was an incident of staff-perpetrated sexual harassment (tables 19 and 20).
- State prisons reported 135 substantiated incidents of inmate-on-inmate nonconsensual sexual acts, 164 substantiated inmate-on-inmate abusive sexual contacts, and 479 substantiated inmate-on-inmate sexual harassment incidents in 2020 (table 21).
- In 2020, the FBOP reported 24 substantiated incidents of inmate-perpetrated sexual victimization: 1 nonconsensual sexual act, 10 abusive sexual contacts, and 13 sexual harassment incidents (table 21).
- In 2020, state prisons reported 5,770 allegations of staff-on-inmate sexual misconduct and 325 (6%) of these allegations were substantiated (table 22).
- FBOP authorities reported four substantiated incidents of staff-on-inmate sexual misconduct and no substantiated incidents of staff-on-inmate sexual harassment in 2020 (table 22).

Methodology

The Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) began the Survey of Sexual Victimization (SSV, formerly the Survey of Sexual Violence) in 2004. Mandated by the Prison Rape Elimination Act of 2003 (PREA), this annual collection measures the incidence of prison sexual victimization. The survey is based on official administrative records of correctional systems and facilities and covers the Federal Bureau of Prisons (FBOP), all state prisons, all facilities operated by the U.S. military and U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), and a representative sample of local jails, jails in Indian country, and privately operated jails and prisons. The U.S. Census Bureau currently serves as the data collection agent for the SSV.

Summary-level data are collected using SSV forms 1 through 4. These forms collect numbers of reported allegations and their outcomes: allegations that were substantiated, unsubstantiated, unfounded, or under investigation at the time of the survey. Each form is designed for a specific type of facility (e.g., SSV2 is designed for state prisons).

Incident-level data are collected using the SSVIA. This form collects detailed information regarding each substantiated incident reported by a facility on the summary-level form, including victim and perpetrator outcomes, incident locations, and demographic information of victims and perpetrators.

Sampling designs

The following sections describe the sampling designs for the 2019 and 2020 SSV. See *Sexual Victimization Reported by Adult Correctional Authorities, 2016– 2018* (NCJ 255356, BJS, June 2021) for details about the sampling design for 2016 to 2018 and *Sexual Victimization Reported by Adult Correctional Authorities, 2012–15* (NCJ 251146, BJS, July 2018) for details about the sampling designs for 2013 to 2015. See appendix table 1 for information regarding all sampled facilities by type and status for 2019 and 2020.

Federal and state prisons

For each year, the survey included the FBOP and the adult prison systems for all 50 states. Administrators

for each prison system reported on allegations of sexual victimization and the outcomes of investigations into allegations. They reported only incidents that occurred within publicly operated adult prison facilities and excluded allegations involving federal or state inmates who were housed in other facilities, such as privately operated prisons or jails.

Privately operated federal and state prisons

For each year, 155 privately operated federal and state prison facilities were sampled from a frame of BJS's 2019 Census of State and Federal Adult Correctional Facilities. This frame was updated annually to include new privately operated facilities and to exclude facilities that had closed or were no longer privately operated. A certainty cutoff was used to select some privately operated prison facilities due to size. In 2019, facilities with an average daily population (ADP) of 321 or more adults were deemed to be certainties. In 2020, the certainty cutoff was revised so that facilities with an ADP of 305 or more adults were declared certainties. There were 75 facilities included as certainties in 2019 and 72 in 2020. The remaining facilities in each year were sorted by region (Northeast, Midwest, South, or West), state, and ADP. Facilities were then selected using systematic probability proportional to their size (PPS). In 2019, 80 facilities were selected, and 83 facilities were selected using this method in the 2020 SSV. In 2019, eight private prisons were no longer active and therefore did not complete the SSV. One of these facilities was out of scope, and seven had closed. Of the remaining 147 private prisons, 14 did not respond. In 2020, 16 private prison facilities were no longer active, 13 had closed, and 3 were deemed out of scope. There were seven active private prison facilities selected for the 2020 sample that did not respond to the survey. See appendix table 2 for private prisons that did not respond to the survey in each year.

Public jails

Samples of 700 publicly operated jails were drawn from BJS's 2019 Census of Jails (COJ) file frame each year. In 2019, there were 2,882 public jails from which the SSV sample was chosen. In 2020, an updated version of the 2019 COJ frame was used that had 2,870 public jails. In each year, the largest public jail jurisdiction in each state and the District of Columbia was selected with certainty. Any jurisdiction with an ADP of 1,000 or more adults was also selected with certainty. In 2019 and 2020, there were 105 jails selected with certainty under this criterion. The remaining public jail jurisdictions were grouped into three strata based on ADP. The 2019 SSV sample included 209 jails out of a possible 1,679 with an ADP of 0 to 91 adults, 144 of 466 jails with an ADP of 92 to 280 adults, and 196 of 586 jails with an ADP of 281 to 999 adults. The 2020 SSV sample used the same three strata based on ADP. In 2020, a total of 209 jails were sampled from 1,446 in the first stratum, 144 from 791 in the second stratum, and 196 from 482 in the third stratum.

Of the 700 public jails sampled in 2019, 5 were out of scope and 68 (10% of jails remaining in the sample) did not respond. Two of the 700 public jails in the 2020 sample had closed before data collection, 1 was out of scope, and 34 (5% of remaining jails) did not respond. See appendix table 2 for public jails that did not respond to the survey in each year.

Privately operated jails

In the 2019 and 2020 SSV, a sample of 15 private jails were selected from the COJ frame. In both years, private jails were selected with certainty if they had an ADP of 1,000 or more adults. In 2019 and 2020, 4 private jails were selected with certainty and the remaining 11 were sampled using PPS after sorting by region, state, and ADP. One private jail selected for the 2019 SSV was out of scope, and one was closed. Of the remaining 13 that were eligible, 12 responded to the survey. In 2020, 1 private jail was out of scope and all the remaining 14 responded to the survey. See appendix table 2 for private jails that did not respond to the survey in each year.

Indian country jails

A sample of 25 jails in Indian country was selected each year using BJS's Annual Survey of Jails in Indian Country as the frame. Only facilities that held adults exclusively or adults and juveniles were deemed eligible for this survey. Jails in Indian country that held only juveniles were eligible for the juvenile SSV data collection.

In 2019, eight facilities were sampled with certainty based on an ADP cutoff of 105 inmates. The remaining 17 facilities included in the sample were sorted by state and ADP and selected using PPS. In the 2020 SSV, the certainty cutoff was lowered to an ADP of 73 or more inmates, with 9 facilities included as certainties and 16 selected using PPS.

In 2019, no Indian country jails were out of scope for the SSV and four did not respond. In 2020, one Indian country jail selected for the sample was out of scope and the remaining jails responded. See appendix table 2 for jails in Indian country that did not respond to the survey in 2019.

Other correctional facilities

A census was taken of all military facilities operated by the U.S. Air Force, U.S. Army, U.S. Navy, and U.S. Marine Corps. Additionally, a census of all facilities operated by (or exclusively for) ICE authorities was conducted. (Officials from ICE update this list annually.) In 2019, 31 ICE facilities were included in the SSV and all responded. In 2020, there were 32 ICE facilities and 1 was determined to be out of scope. The remaining 31 provided data.

Weights and nonresponse adjustments

Survey responses were weighted to produce national estimates. Data from the FBOP, all state prison systems, U.S. military facilities, and ICE facilities were given a weight of 1.00 because they were selected with certainty and all responded. Public jails, private jails, Indian country jails, and private prison facilities were assigned an initial sampling weight equal to the inverse probability of selection. Nonresponse adjustment calculations differed for public jails and the other sampled facility types because they had different sampling designs. In each survey year, weights for responding public jail jurisdictions were adjusted for nonresponse by multiplying initial sample weights by the ratio of the sum of initial weights of active jurisdictions in each stratum to the sum of weights for participating jurisdictions. After applying the nonresponse adjustment, the sum of the final weights in each stratum equaled the sum of weights for active jails in each stratum.

Nonresponse adjustments for samples of private jails, private prisons, and jails in Indian country were based on the ratio of the sum of weights multiplied by the measure of size for each affected stratum. Within each stratum, the number of active jails or prisons was multiplied by the measure of size of each facility, then summed. The ratio of the first sum to the latter sum equaled the nonresponse adjustment factor for the affected stratum. Overall, after adjusting for nonresponse and summing across all strata, multiplying the adjusted final weight by the sum of the measure of size equaled the total number of inmates held in private jails, private prisons, and jails in Indian country.

Estimation calculations, standard errors, and tests of significance

When national estimates are derived from a sample, caution must be used when comparing one estimate to another or when comparing estimates over time. Although one estimate may be larger than another, estimates based on a sample have some degree of sampling error. The sampling error of an estimate depends on several factors, including the response rates, the amount of variation in the responses, and the size of the sample.

One measure of the sampling error associated with an estimate is the standard error. The standard error may vary from one estimate to the next. Generally, an estimate with a small standard error provides a more reliable approximation of the true value than an estimate with a large standard error. Estimates with relatively large standard errors are associated with less precision and reliability and should be interpreted with caution. Estimates and standard errors for summary-level tables (tables 1 through 4) were calculated using IBM SPSS Statistics Complex Samples functions. State and federal prisoner counts from the National Prisoner Statistics Program were used for the calculation of rates in the summary-level tables 1 and 2. All other correctional facilities provided ADP totals on the SSV summary forms that were used to calculate estimated rates.

Estimates and standard errors for incident-level tables (tables 5 through 18) were calculated with the *survey* package in R, which by default uses Taylor Series Linearization to estimate variance. For all aggregated incident-level tables, estimates were first calculated separately for each stratum and year using the *survey* package in R. Estimates were then summed across years to provide aggregated estimates for the reported years. Because there were sampling strata with only one substantiated incident, the "adjust" option in R was used to center singleton stratum data around the grand (population) mean to create a conservative variance estimator for estimates including the stratum. Standard errors are included in the appendix tables. These standard errors can be used to construct confidence intervals around survey estimates (e.g., numbers, rates, and percentages) and around differences between estimates. For example, table 1 shows an estimated 36,264 allegations of sexual victimization in 2020, and appendix table 6 shows a standard error of 541 for that estimate. The 95% confidence interval for the number of allegations is $36,264 \pm 1.96 \times 541$, resulting in a confidence interval of 35,204 to 37,324.

For small samples and estimates close to zero, the use of the standard error to construct the 95% confidence interval may not be reliable because the interval may contain zero. Therefore, estimates may not be distinguishable from zero. Such unreliable estimates were suppressed (shown as ^ in tables), and a note was included in the tables. Other estimates that should be interpreted with caution are those based on 10 or fewer sample cases or that had a coefficient of variation of greater than 50%. Such estimates were designated with an exclamation point in tables (!).

BJS conducted statistical tests to determine whether differences in estimated numbers, percentages, and rates in this report were statistically significant once sampling error was considered. For example, the difference between the total number of allegations of sexual victimization in 2020 (36,264 allegations) and 2019 (38,132 allegations) is statistically significant at the 95% confidence level. (See table 1.) In all tables providing detailed comparisons, differences that are significant at the 95% confidence level have been designated with a dagger (†), and differences significant at the 90% confidence level are indicated with a double dagger (‡). The comparison group has been designated with one asterisk (*). For types of adult correctional facilities that were included with certainty and have no standard errors associated with the estimates, all differences are real, and no significance markers are included. Statistical testing was also not performed if one of the estimates in the comparison was noted to be interpreted with caution (!).
