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
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Evaluation of Appropriate Weighting Methodology for the School Crime Supplement in the Seven Largest States

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This report evaluates a methodology to produce estimates of bullying in the seven most populous states from data collected in the National Crime Victimization Survey's School Crime Supplement (SCS). Because the SCS sample was not designed to produce state-level estimates, the SCS data were reweighted based on counts of students from administrative records in the Department of Education's Common Core Data (CCD) collection. These recalibrated weights were used to produce estimates of bullying in California, Florida, Illinois, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Texas from 2007 to 2013. Those estimates were then compared to estimates produced using the original SCS weights. This report describes how recalibrating the original SCS weights to the CCD student counts led to representative bullying estimates for public-school students in the seven states.

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SECTION 1. BACKGROUND

The Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) and National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) co-designed the School Crime Supplement (SCS) to the National Crime Victimization Survey (NCVS). The SCS is a nationally representative sample of approximately 6,500 students ages 12 to 18 in public and private elementary, middle, and high schools. The supplement collects information about victimization, crime, and safety in schools, and it asks about topics such as—

- alcohol and drug availability
- fighting, bullying, and hate-related behaviors
- carrying guns or weapons
- gangs at school.

The SCS has traditionally been used to calculate national estimates of crime, violence, and safety at school (Zhang et al., 2016). However, subnational estimates allow for a better understanding of local patterns and trends. The SCS includes an adequate sample of public school students within the seven most populated states (California, Florida, Illinois, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Texas) to support state-level estimations. Policymakers and practitioners may be interested in information about crime and safety in these states due to the large number of students, socioeconomic diversity, and changing demographics of students and families. In 2015, these seven states served approximately 11.7 million students and accounted for approximately 45% of public school students in grades 6 through 12 nationwide.

Because BJS did not select or weigh the NCVS and SCS design to produce state-level estimates, researchers did not know whether the original SCS weights would produce estimates that accurately represent the population of public school students in each state. The Common Core Data (CCD) collected by the Department of Education provide the most accurate state-level counts of public school students. This report examines the performance of state-level SCS weights by comparing SCS estimates to those derived using the CCD. In particular, BJS planned to use 2007–15 SCS data to examine bullying prevalence rates for public school students enrolled in grades 6 through 12 (ages 12 through 18) in the seven largest states. This report is

organized around two sets of analyses conducted to determine whether the original SCS weights were acceptable for state-level bullying estimates or needed to be recalibrated based on the CCD:

- 1. Researchers compared SCS and CCD state-level estimates of public school student counts and the percent distributions of students by demographic characteristics (e.g., sex, race, Hispanic origin, grade) to determine whether the SCS weights produce population estimates that align with CCD population estimates (see *Section 2*).
- 2. Next, the SCS weights were recalibrated based on the CCD to make the SCS weights more representative of the population of public school students at the state level. Researchers assessed differences in bullying prevalence rates calculated with original SCS weights and those calculated with recalibrated weights (see *Section 3*).

Findings from the analyses informed conclusions and recommendations for producing SCS bullying measures within the seven largest states (see *Section 4*). SCS public use datasets do not include geographic identifiers needed to identify states, so SCS microdata located at the U.S. Census Bureau were used for all analyses. The Census Data Review Board reviewed results to ensure that no confidential information was disclosed.

SECTION 2. ASSESSING THE REPRESENTATIVENESS OF THE SCHOOL CRIME SUPPLEMENT WEIGHTS IN THE SEVEN LARGEST STATES

2.1 Overview of Representativeness Assessment

The Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) designed the National Crime Victimization Survey (NCVS) and School Crime Supplement (SCS) to produce national estimates. Even with a design focused solely on national estimates, the primary sampling units within a subnational area may produce unbiased estimates for that area. However, a nonrepresentative sample selection may lead to *conditional bias* at the subnational level. Conditional bias refers to the contribution to the standard error of an estimate caused by differences between the weighted sample and the population of interest in variables correlated with the variable being estimated (Royall, 1971). Prior research has shown that the NCVS sample in the seven largest states exhibits conditional bias when national weights are applied at the subnational level (Shook-Sa et al., 2015), so SCS state-level samples may also exhibit conditional bias.

First, to evaluate whether the original SCS weights can be used to calculate state-level estimates, the representativeness of the SCS weights within the seven largest states was assessed. SCS weighted distributions of key student-level demographic characteristics were compared to Common Core Data (CCD) control totals. Both the weighted sums (e.g., number of male students according to SCS weighted data compared to the CCD) and percent distributions (e.g., percentage of male students according to each dataset) within key demographic domains were examined. The population of interest included all students ages 12 through 18 in grades 6 through 12 who attended public school for at least part of 2007, 2009, 2011, and 2013.

2.2 Calculating Common Core Data Estimates for Comparison with the School Crime Supplement

The Department of Education collects data on all public elementary and secondary schools in the United States through the CCD survey. The annual CCD survey is a set of five surveys sent to state education departments. State-level administrative records provide data on characteristics of schools, school districts, students, and staff. Student-level data include enrollment counts by grade level, sex, race, and Hispanic origin. School-level data are aggregated and released annually at the state, school district, and school levels. In all survey years used in this analysis, all 50 states and the District of Columbia provided reports of

enrollment counts for their schools to the CCD. The Department of Education performs extensive quality reviews to correct or confirm any counts that appear out of range (based on other reported counts in the same and previous years) and to ensure consistency across school-, district-, and state-level files. In addition, the department of education performs imputation for missing data values on the state-level file (Keaton, 2010, 2012, 2014).

In the seven largest states, CCD public school student population estimates for the 2006-07, 2008-09, 2010-11, and 2012-13 school years were compared to SCS estimates in 2007, 2009, 2011, and 2013. Because the representativeness assessment aimed to compare the CCD enrollment counts and percent distributions with the SCS weighted counts and percent distributions by characteristics of the students, comparable CCD estimates were calculated for all possible overlapping student-level characteristics. Characteristics were identified as available in both the SCS and the CCD (table 2-1). Therefore, this set of characteristics was used to evaluate the representativeness of SCS weights.

Table 2-1. Characteristics compared in the School Crime Supplement and Common Core Data

- Sex (male, female)
- Grade level (6-8, 9-10, 11-12)
- Race/Hispanic origin (Hispanic, non-Hispanic white, non-Hispanic black, non-Hispanic other)
- Sex, by grade level

- Sex, by collapsed race (Hispanic, non-Hispanic white, non-Hispanic black, non-Hispanic other)
- Grade level, by collapsed race
- Sex, by grade level and further collapsed race (Hispanic, non-Hispanic white, non-Hispanic black, non-Hispanic other)*

State-level CCD files were used to calculate CCD estimates for 2010-11 and 2012-13 school years. In prior years, CCD state-level files did not include student enrollment counts by sex, so the school-level files were aggregated at the state level to calculate 2006-07 and 2008-09 estimates. During 2006-07 and 2008-09, inconsistencies existed between enrollment counts by sex, race, Hispanic origin, and grade level because schools could report race and Hispanic origin at only five levels (Hispanic, non-Hispanic white, non-Hispanic black, non-Hispanic American Indian or Alaska Native, and non-Hispanic Asian or Other Pacific Islander). This classification

system did not allow some students to be reported (e.g., persons of two or more races, Native Hawaiians), leading to inconsistencies in the overall and detailed counts and comparability issues with SCS data. Additional categories were added in the 2010-11 and 2012-13 CCD. Although race distribution comparisons were included in the representativeness evaluation for 2006-07 and 2008-09 to confirm that CCD and SCS race estimates were incompatible during these years, they were excluded from the weight calibration models (see *Section 3*).

Weight adjustment modeling (see *Section 3.2*) requires internal consistency across all CCD counts (i.e., detailed enrollment counts correctly sum to overall enrollment counts). Adjustment factors were calculated and applied to the overall enrollment count in each state to make counts internally consistent. The overall enrollment count in each state s (E_S) was calculated as the sum of students in grades 6 through 12. At the most detailed level (sex by grade level by detailed race and Hispanic origin), the percent distribution for each level (i) was calculated and multiplied by the total enrollment count in the state:

$$E_{iS} = E_S \times p_i$$

where E_{iS} is the estimated enrollment count in state s for characteristic level i; E_S is the estimated enrollment count in state s, and p_i is the proportion of students in characteristic level i.

For example, to calculate the estimated enrollment count for females in grades 6 to 8 who identify as Hispanic in California in the 2006-07 CCD (E_{iS}), researchers divided the enrollment count for Hispanic females in grades 6 to 8 (347,142) by the sum of the enrollment counts across all of the counts of sex by grade level by race and Hispanic origin (3,370,127). This proportion (0.103 = p_i) was then multiplied by the total enrollment count in the state of California (3,454,720 = E_S). After estimated enrollment counts for all of the detailed levels were calculated, higher-level estimates were calculated by summing the detailed counts. For example, the estimated enrollment count for females was obtained by summing all detailed female counts. This process ensured that all counts were internally consistent.

2.3 Representativeness Evaluation

To assess how well SCS weights represent the population of public school students in grades 6 through 12 within the seven largest states, researchers compared SCS weight totals by

key demographic characteristics to the CCD control totals. Comparisons were made separately for each data year (2007, 2009, 2011, and 2013) within each of the seven states for the characteristics listed in table 2-1. In the development of national SCS weights, data were not weighted based on CCD but were weighted to be nationally representative of the school-age population. For this reason, a comparison of national SCS to CCD weight sums served as the benchmark. Differences between national SCS and CCD weight sums should be relatively minimal. Some differences emerged where researchers did not specifically control for certain factors in the national weight calibration models (e.g., grade level), and larger differences appeared at the state level where no sampling or weight controls were in place to ensure representativeness.

As previously discussed, the CCD include only counts of public school students, and the target population for BJS's bullying report was limited to public school students. The SCS sample was therefore limited to students in grades 6 through 12 who attended public school (including students who were partially home schooled during the year). This eligible population represented approximately 80% of respondents on the SCS file at the national level. Within each state, SCS and CCD population estimates for public school students were compared. For each characteristic analyzed, significance testing was conducted to determine whether SCS and CCD estimated totals were significantly different at the 95% confidence level (see *Appendix B*). These significance tests assumed that SCS and CCD estimates are independent and that CCD estimates have no variation. These assumptions are appropriate given that CCD and SCS data are collected independently, and CCD data are based on true counts from administrative records and are not collected from a random sample.

An examination of the tables shows relatively few significant differences nationally and across the states, and a higher number of significant differences were found for population counts than for percent distributions. Whether SCS and CCD estimates are significantly different is dependent on two factors: (1) the magnitude of the difference between SCS and CCD estimates, and (2) the standard error of SCS estimates (i.e., power of the statistical test). More significant differences exist at the national than the state level because of the higher power of national tests and the resulting ability to detect smaller differences between the SCS and CCD. The magnitude of the national differences is small relative to state-level estimates. Rather than

making comparisons across states based on the number of significant differences, this report instead examines the magnitude of differences between SCS and CCD estimates by comparing estimated coverage ratios and average deviations by the characteristics of interest.

To assess the differences between SCS weighted and CCD totals across all years and states, researchers calculated coverage ratios and average deviations. First, coverage ratios assessed the overall representativeness of SCS weights and evaluated whether SCS weighted counts of public school students were equivalent to, overestimated, or underestimated the CCD estimates of student populations in each state. The overall SCS weighted sum of all students in grades 6 through 12 within each state, aggregated across the 4-year periods, was compared to the aggregated CCD estimates within each state. The estimated coverage ratio was calculated by dividing the SCS weight sum by the CCD estimate. If the weight sums are equal, meaning that the SCS and CCD provide the same population estimate, the coverage ratio equals 1. Coverage ratios less than 1 indicate that the SCS weights underrepresent the population, and coverage ratios more than 1 indicate that the population is overrepresented, based on the current SCS weights.




Figure 2-1. Estimated coverage of the School Crime Supplement sample, by state, 2007–2013

The overall SCS weight sums were similar to the CCD counts, with coverage ratios ranging from 0.76 in Florida to 1.17 in Ohio (**figure 2-1**; appendix table C-1). However, in three states (California, Florida, and Texas), coverage ratios were significantly less than 1. In one state (Ohio), coverage ratios were significantly more than 1. This outcome suggests that the SCS significantly underrepresented or overrepresented students in some states. As expected, the coverage ratio for the national SCS was close to 1 (0.92), but because of the large sample size (and resulting narrow confidence interval), this difference was significantly less than 1. Examination of the overall coverage ratios showed that the SCS weight sums were similar to the number of students in the target population in each state, but significant differences existed for several states.

Researchers also examined whether SCS weights produced accurate counts for subgroups of students. For example, the total SCS count for a state may be correct, but it may overestimate the number of female students and underestimate the number of male students. Student coverage by sex, race, Hispanic origin, and grade level was examined using both the coverage ratios and the average deviation calculations.

Using average deviation scores, researchers assessed the magnitude of deviations between SCS weighted and CCD estimates across all subdomains. Despite possible significant differences between SCS and CCD estimates on individual characteristics, the differences may be small in percentage points. For example, in California in 2007, the SCS and CCD estimated significantly different percentages of sixth- to eighth-grade students, but this difference was 5.1% (42.5% compared to 37.4%). The magnitude of these differences within each state (aggregated across years) was assessed by calculating the average deviation between the weighted SCS distribution and the CCD distribution across each level of sex, race, Hispanic

origin, and grade level. The average deviation across all characteristics was calculated as follows:³

$$DEV_S = \frac{\sum_{y,c} ABS(P_{CCD(s,y,c)} - P_{SCS(s,y,c)})}{n},$$

where $P_{CCD(s,y,c)}$ is the CCD proportion in characteristic c for state s and year y; $P_{SCS(s,y,c)}$ is the weighted SCS estimated proportion in characteristic c for state s and year y; $y = \{2007, 2009, 2011, 2013\}$; $c = \{\text{male}; \text{female}; \text{grades 6 to 8, 9 to 10, and 11 to 12; Hispanic; non-Hispanic white, black, and other}\}$; and n = the total number of estimates.


The average deviation measure ranges from 0% to 100%. Average deviations close to 0 indicate few differences in the two data sources across the comparison variables, whereas larger average deviations indicate larger distributional differences.

Across all states, on average, deviations were 3.5% or less, meaning that the SCS weighted and CCD subpopulations distribution estimates were, on average, within 3.5% of one another. When the average deviations across states were compared, SCS weighted student distributions aligned with the CCD estimates in some states (**figure 2-2**; appendix table C-2). SCS weighted distributions deviated the most from CCD distributions in Pennsylvania, averaging 3.5%, and were most closely aligned in California, averaging 2.3%. As expected, the SCS weighted national distribution tracked with the CCD, having an average deviation of 1.1%.⁴

⁴Average deviations can also be calculated to compare across years, pooling data across states (e.g., were average deviations in state-level SCS and CCD percent distributions larger in earlier years than later years?). Results revealed that during 2007 and 2013, SCS weighted distributions aligned slightly more closely with the CCD than during 2009 and 2011 (appendix figure C-1, appendix table C-3).





States with larger average deviations had larger degrees of misrepresentation of subpopulations within the state, but overall state-level average deviations scores do not illustrate which populations were the most misrepresented. The CCD and SCS discrepancies that drive the state-level average deviations became apparent when estimated coverage ratios were evaluated across demographic characteristics. Coverage ratios illustrate how well the SCS weighted counts of public school students match CCD counts for each subpopulation of interest across states, and they allow for an examination of the variation in how well the subgroups are represented.




Figure 2-3. Estimated coverage of the School Crime Supplement sample, by state and race/Hispanic origin, 2007–2013

The alignment of SCS and CCD totals varied by race and Hispanic origin (**figure 2-3**; appendix table C-4). For example, in California, coverage ratios ranged from 0.78 to 0.87 across students from different race and Hispanic origin subgroups, suggesting little variation in coverage among these groups, but slight undercoverage of all subgroups (3 in 4 race and Hispanic origin subgroups had coverage ratio confidence intervals below 1). However, in Ohio and Pennsylvania, large differences in coverage existed across race and Hispanic origin groups. Both states overrepresented the non-Hispanic other race group (coverage ratios of 1.47 in Ohio

and 2.17 in Pennsylvania) and slightly underrepresented the non-Hispanic black race group (0.77 in Ohio and 0.81 in Pennsylvania).⁵

There were also differences in SCS weighted and CCD counts by grade level. As with the overall coverage estimates, most grade-level coverage estimates were less than 1 (for all three grade levels). However, there were apparent differences in coverage ratios within each state when comparing across grade levels. In most states, the SCS weighted totals produced higher representation of students in grades 11 to 12 than in the lower grade levels relative to the CCD

the SCS weight sum (the numerator) but were excluded from the denominator in 2007 and 2009.




Figure 2-4. Estimated coverage of the School Crime Supplement sample, by state and grade level, 2007–2013

⁵Differences between CCD estimates and SCS weight sums by race and Hispanic origin were expected in 2007 and 2009. As previously discussed, the CCD did not include Native Hawaiian, Other Pacific Islander, or two or more race classification categories in 2007 and 2009. For this reason, a lower proportion of the population was classified in the non-Hispanic other race group during these years than in 2011 and 2013. In the coverage tables, this is apparent from the large jumps in the CCD estimated proportion in the non-Hispanic other race group from 2009 to 2011 (e.g., the CCD proportion in the other race group increased from 1.7% in 2009 to 5.3% in 2011 in Ohio, whereas the SCS weight sums increased from 2.2% to 4.7%) (see *Appendix B*). This definitional difference also led to high coverage ratios for the non-Hispanic other race group, as persons in the excluded categories were counted in

estimates (i.e., students in lower grade levels were more underrepresented than those in grades 11 to 12) (**figure 2-4**; appendix table C-5).




Figure 2-5. Estimated coverage of the School Crime Supplement sample, by state and sex, 2007–2013

Representation did not vary significantly between males and females within each state. In most states, the estimated coverage ratios for both males and females were below 1, indicating that both sexes are underrepresented based on current SCS weights. However, few differences existed between the representation of males and females at the state level, with males and females represented similarly relative to the CCD (figure 2-5). As expected, the national sample (the benchmark comparison) aligns with the CCD across all demographic characteristics examined, including sex. However, because of large sample sizes at the national level, the standard error for the national coverage rate is small. Additionally, the resulting confidence bands are narrow and do not include 1, indicating a statistical difference between SCS and CCD weight sums. From a substantive perspective, differences at the national level are of a much smaller magnitude than differences at the state level.

The evaluation of the representativeness of SCS weights within the seven largest states found that the SCS weights align well with estimates from the CCD by sex, race, Hispanic origin, and grade level. However, there were non-negligible differences between SCS and CCD counts overall and by sex, race, Hispanic origin, and grade level across states. Differences in population totals do not necessarily indicate bias for SCS estimates calculated with the original weights, as slight differences in population distributions do not necessarily equate to differences in resulting bullying totals and prevalence rates. Researchers further analyzed how calibrating SCS weights to CCD control totals within the seven largest states may affect key SCS-derived estimates and the precision of those estimates. Given BJS's interest in analyzing bullying prevalence across the seven largest states, original SCS weighted bullying estimates were compared to CCD recalibrated estimates.

SECTION 3. WEIGHTING EVALUATION

3.1 Overview of Weighting Evaluation

Differences between the population of public school students in the seven largest states, based on Common Core Data (CCD) and School Crime Supplement (SCS) weight sums, provide evidence that current SCS weights sometimes underrepresent or overrepresent certain state-level subpopulations of public school students. Slight differences in population estimates may, but do not necessarily, lead to bias in resulting bullying prevalence rates. A weighting assessment was conducted to determine the effects of recalibrating SCS weights to CCD control totals on bullying point and precision estimates.

SCS weights were recalibrated to CCD control totals within the seven largest states and at the national level. As with the coverage assessment, the national estimates comparison serves as a benchmark. Although the original SCS national weights did not use CCD as a data source for calibration, they are nationally representative and were calibrated to some of the same variables included in the CCD (e.g., sex, race, and Hispanic origin). However, grade level is available in the CCD but was not used in the national weighting. Despite this slight difference in weighting variables, differences between estimates based on the original weights and weights recalibrated based on CCD data should be minimal at the national level. If these differences are small, then differences between estimates based on the original and recalibrated SCS weights observed at the subnational level are attributed to the lack of controls at the state level rather than to differences between the national SCS weight methodology and the reweighting methodology. Furthermore, because subnational estimates based on recalibrated weights would be compared to national estimates (e.g., are state-level rates above or below the national rates?), it is crucial to ensure that the weighting methodology does not lead to issues with comparability.

Key bullying prevalence rates and victimization totals were calculated with both the original SCS weights and the recalibrated weights. The point and precision estimates were compared to determine the effects of recalibration. Because the SCS was not designed or weighted to calculate state-level estimates, recalibrating SCS weights to CCD control totals should minimize potential conditional bias in state-level estimates. However, the impact on estimated rates of precision must be evaluated and considered. Because the SCS was not designed to produce state-level estimates, state-level SCS sample sizes are smaller than at the

national level, so statistical power for state-level estimates is lower than that for national estimates. A decrease in state-level precision resulting from recalibrating weights may limit the utility of subnational estimates by further reducing the ability to make comparisons.

Alternatively, if calibration improves precision, recalibrated weights would provide more statistical power for comparisons of interest than would the original weights. For this reason, the impact of recalibration on precision must be evaluated before selecting the most appropriate weighting methodology for the SCS at the state level.

3.2 Recalibration of Weights for the School Crime Supplement in the Seven Largest States

Within each of the seven largest states and at the national level, weights were recalibrated based on control totals from the CCD. A single calibration model was fit for each geographic area (eight total models, including the national and seven state models), pooling CCD and SCS data across the 4-year period. The terms in **table 3-1** were included in the calibration model for each state. Additional years of CCD and SCS data will be added when available (e.g., 2015 data). All terms in the model were interacted with the year variable, ensuring that all controls were at the yearly level rather than pooled across multiple SCS years. This step ensures that recalibrated weights and resulting estimates for earlier years will not change when adding new years of data to the model. Due to inconsistencies between the CCD and SCS race definitions in 2007 and 2009, race and Hispanic origin constraints were applied only for years 2011 and 2013.

Calibration models used generalized exponential modeling available in SUDAAN's "WTADJUST" procedure (Folsom & Singh, 2000). Bullying estimates based on the recalibrated weights were calculated at the time of calibration (see *Section 3*). After calibration, each model was evaluated to assess convergence and the amount of variation that was added to the analysis weights through unequal weighting (Kish, 1965; Valliant et al., 2013). In all states, the initial

models converged without sizable increases to unequal weighting (i.e., increases of 20% or less), so these initial models were taken as the final calibration models.

3.3 Simultaneous Estimation of Bullying Measures

Weight calibration was implemented to reduce potential conditional bias in subnational estimates, but the effects on estimated precision depend on the correlation between the covariates in the calibration model and the outcomes of interest. Calibration can lead to a reduction in the standard errors of resulting point estimates when covariates in the calibration model are related to survey outcomes (Little & Vartivarian, 2006). Conventional linearization-based variance estimation approaches (i.e., those that use the final calibrated weight to make estimates after calibration) cannot account for efficiencies in the calibration process and can lead to upwardly biased variance estimates (RTI International, 2012).

Calibration can reduce bias in estimates and avoid artificially inflated variance estimates by using relatively new software that calculates estimates at the time of calibration (e.g., SUDAAN 11 (RTI International, 2012)). Using this approach, procedures such as SUDAAN's WTADJUST will produce descriptive statistics along with calibrated weights. This estimation approach was evaluated and recommended for calculating National Crime Victimization Survey (NCVS) subnational estimates. As further discussed in the methodological report for the NCVS subnational evaluation (Shook-Sa et al., 2015), this approach has the advantage of yielding lower and more accurate standard error estimates. It takes into account efficiencies gained in the calibration model when estimating the variances of percentage point estimates. However, to take advantage of this benefit, researchers must reproduce the calibration each time an analysis is conducted. Thus, analysts must have all the information needed for the final calibration step at the time of estimation (e.g., control totals for a coverage adjustment and precalibrated weights). In addition, this approach can leverage calibration efficiencies only from the last calibration step and cannot incorporate efficiencies gained in prior calibration steps (e.g., calibration steps used in developing the national SCS weights). Because the CCD control totals and subnational calibration models were available at the time of estimation and because it is the recommended subnational estimation approach for the NCVS, this approach was used to calculate the recalibrated SCS variance estimates.

3.4 Comparison of Point Estimates Based on Original Weights to Estimates Based on Recalibrated Weights

Comparisons were made between point and precision estimates calculated, based on the original SCS weights and the CCD-based recalibrated weights to determine whether original SCS weights produce biased state-level bullying estimates. As shown in the representativeness evaluation, researchers have observed differences between CCD estimates and SCS weight sums. Therefore, reweighting to CCD control totals inherently changes estimated bullying totals, but researchers did not know the direction and magnitude of differences and the effects of calibration on bullying prevalence rates.

Within each of the seven largest states and at the national level, four key bullying measures were calculated based on original and recalibrated weights (**table 3-2**). Single-year estimates were calculated for each of the overall measures. In addition, each of these measures was estimated among several reporting domains of interest (**table 3-3**). Due to small sample sizes at the domain level, these estimates were aggregated across 2 or 4 years of SCS data to produce reliable estimates.

For each outcome of interest, estimated victimization totals and prevalence rates were calculated using both sets of weights. Estimates based on the original weights were calculated using a traditional linearization-based approach using SUDAAN's DESCRIPT procedure, whereas estimates based on the recalibrated weights were calculated at the time of recalibration using SUDAAN's WTADJUST procedure (see *Section 3.3*).

They were classified as nonvictims of frequent bullying if they had experienced "any bullying" or if bullying occurred "once or twice this school year."
- Physical bullying: Respondents are classified as victims of physical bullying if they indicated experiencing one of the following actions, and they are classified as nonvictims of physical bullying if they responded "no" to all of these actions:
 - threatened you with harm
 - pushed, shoved, tripped, or spit on you
 - tried to make you do things you did not want to do
 - destroyed your property on purpose.

Pooling across the seven states, four bullying measures, and domains of interest produced 1,464 estimates:⁶

- seven states by 4-year groups by four bullying measures = 112 1-year estimates
- seven states by 2-year groups by four bullying measures by 10 domains = 560 2-year estimates
- seven states by four bullying measures by 30 domains = 840 4-year estimates.

An additional 216 estimates were calculated at the national level to serve as benchmark for comparison. Appendices D through F contain detailed tables comparing original and recalibrated SCS estimates across all states and analysis domains, but estimates were assessed in aggregate to detect patterns across states and estimate types.

Because estimates based on the original and recalibrated SCS weights are based on the same set of respondents, data are perfectly correlated, so statistical tests are greatly overpowered. Instead of testing for statistical differences between the two sets of estimates, researchers evaluated differences for substantive importance. First, plots comparing the two sets of estimates were examined to assess the direction of any detectable bias (i.e., to determine whether the recalibrated estimates tended to be larger or smaller than estimates based on the original weights). Then, the magnitude of differences was assessed by calculating the average percent relative difference in estimates across domains of interest.

For each of the seven largest states, original SCS weighted bullying prevalence estimates were plotted against the corresponding recalibrated bullying prevalence estimates, with 216 estimates in each state (minus any suppressed estimates or no estimates; **figure 3-1**). If prevalence rates based on original and recalibrated weights were consistent, a plot of the two sets of estimates would be expected to show estimates tightly clustered around the 45-degree line of equality, with about 50% of estimates slightly above and below the line. Prevalence rates based on the original and recalibrated weights compared reasonably well, but estimates were clustered


slightly above the 45-degree line of equality. Recalibrated prevalence rates were larger than those based on the original weights for the majority of estimates (61.7%), providing some evidence of bias when the original SCS weights are applied at the state level.

To assess the magnitude of differences between estimated bullying prevalence and totals based on the original and recalibrated weights, percent relative differences were calculated for the 1,680 prevalence estimates (216 national estimates and 1,464 state-level estimates):

$$RDP_i = \frac{ABS(p_o - p_c)}{p_o} \times 100,$$

where RDP_i is the percent relative difference for prevalence estimate i, p_o is the estimated prevalence rate based on the original SCS weights, and p_c is the estimated prevalence rate based on the recalibrated SCS weights.

Similarly, percent relative differences were calculated for estimated bullying totals, using a similar formula:

$$RDT_i = \frac{ABS(t_o - t_c)}{t_o} \times 100,$$

where RDT_i is the percent relative difference for the estimated total i, t_o is the estimated total based on the original SCS weights, and t_c is the estimated total based on the recalibrated SCS weights.

For both prevalence rates and totals, percent relative differences were aggregated and examined in two ways:

(1) within areas, across domains, to observe differences across geographic areas:

$$AVG_RDP_S = \frac{\sum_{i}^{ns} RDP_i}{ns}$$
, and $AVG_RDT_S = \frac{\sum_{i}^{ns} RDT_i}{ns}$,

where AVG_RDP_s and AVG_RDT_s are the average percent relative differences for prevalence rates and bullying totals, respectively, within geographic area s, and ns is the number of estimates in geographic area s, aggregated across all analytic domains;

(2) within domains, across estimate types and areas, to observe differences across domain types:

$$AVG_RDP_d = \frac{\sum_{i}^{nd} RDP_i}{nd}$$
, and $AVG_RDT_d = \frac{\sum_{i}^{nd} RDT_i}{nd}$,

where AVG_RDP_d and AVG_RDT_d are the average percent relative differences for prevalence rates and bullying totals, respectively, within analytic domain d, and nd is the number of estimates in analytic domain d, aggregated across the seven largest states (national estimates are excluded).

At the national level, relative differences in prevalence rates were smaller than state-level differences, as expected, with an average percent relative difference of less than 1% between prevalence rates based on the original and recalibrated weights for all four bullying measures (table 3-4). On average, national bullying prevalence rates based on the recalibrated weights were within 1% of estimates based on the original SCS weights. The largest differences in estimates were observed in Pennsylvania, which had the highest percent relative differences for

three of the four bullying measures (ranging from 4.24% to 7.40%). The smallest differences were observed in California and Texas, where average relative differences between original and recalibrated prevalence rate estimates for all bullying measures were less than 3.6%.

Findings show the lowest average percent relative differences for overall estimates, with all four bullying measures having average relative differences below 3.5% (table 3-5). Differences were also small for estimates by sex, with average percent relative differences below 3.9% for all four bullying measures. The largest relative differences were observed for estimates by race and Hispanic origin, with the average relative difference for physical bullying reaching 6.02%.





Figure 3-2. Comparison of bullying totals based on original and recalibrated weights in the seven largest states

Differences between bullying estimates based on the original and recalibrated weights were more pronounced for estimated bullying totals than for prevalence rates, as recalibrating to new control totals inherently changed estimated totals (**figure 3-2**). Estimates tracked above the 45-degree line of equality, and 73.8% of calibrated totals were larger than the totals based on the original weights. As with bullying prevalence rates, the magnitude of differences varied across states and estimation domains. Again, the two sets of estimates tracked better at the national level than at the state level, with average percent relative differences for all four measures at less than 9.3%. Differences in the number of bullied students at the state level based on original

compared to recalibrated weights were smallest in New York, with average deviations for all measures less than 13.4%. The largest differences were observed in Florida, with average percent relative differences ranging from 30.14% to 32.96% across the four bullying measures. Differences by estimation domains showed that the smallest percent relative differences were for the estimates calculated at only the 4-year level (sex by grade, sex by race and Hispanic origin, grade by race and Hispanic origin, and household income). As with prevalence rates, the largest differences were observed for race and Hispanic origin, and average percent relative differences were 21 percentage points or more for all bullying measures. Unlike prevalence rates, average relative differences for estimated totals were also large for overall annual estimates.

What constitutes a substantively significant difference is somewhat open to interpretation based on research goals. However, the observed differences for both prevalence rates and bullying totals were large enough to raise concerns about the quality of bullying estimates based on the original SCS weights at the state level, particularly when estimates were reported by domains of interest such as race and Hispanic origin. The magnitude of observed differences in

estimated prevalence rates and victimization totals based on original and recalibrated weights provides evidence that use of the original state-level SCS weights may lead to biased estimates. The original SCS weights tended to underestimate the prevalence and number of bullying victims in the seven largest states compared to recalibrated weights based on CCD control totals. The magnitude of differences was small for overall bullying measures, but the differences were non-negligible and varied when based on state and estimate type. Estimated totals were more affected by recalibration than prevalence rates, with larger percentage differences observed across all states and estimation domains.


The negligible differences between estimates based on the original and recalibrated weights at the national level provide further support for the proposed weighting methodology. Although national SCS weights are not based on CCD, they are nationally representative. Recalibration based on CCD did not change the national estimates in a substantively significant manner. Thus, the CCD reweighting approach does not introduce an inconsistency with the national SCS weighting methodology that would make estimates incomparable.

3.5 Comparison of Precision Estimates Based on Original Weights to Estimates Based on Recalibrated Weights

Because of the observed differences between estimates based on the original and recalibrated weights, it is preferable to use the recalibrated weights for SCS state-level estimation. These weights are expected to reduce conditional bias at the subnational level due to the original weights' not appropriately representing all subgroups of the population within each state. However, it is critical to examine the effects of recalibration on estimate precision before finalizing the SCS estimation approach at the state level.

The percent relative standard errors (RSEs) of the original and recalibrated bullying estimates were compared to the same set of estimates used to assess differences in point estimates for the seven largest states. The percent RSE is calculated as the ratio of the standard error of the estimate divided by the estimate, and then multiplied by 100. The percent RSE removes the scale and allows estimates (e.g., totals and prevalence rates). In general, the RSEs for bullying prevalence rates tracked along the 45-degree line of equality, demonstrating that the two methods produced similar precision estimates (**figure 3-3**). The calibrated RSEs were less than the uncalibrated RSEs for 58.4% of estimates, meaning that calibration improved estimated precision for the majority of estimates.




Figure 3-4. Percent relative standard errors of bullying totals based on original and recalibrated weights in the seven largest states

Improvements to precision measures due to calibration were more pronounced for estimated bullying totals (**figure 3-4**). Percent RSEs tracked below the 45-degree line of equality, and calibrated RSEs were less than RSEs based on the original weights for 97.5% of estimates in the seven largest states. Findings demonstrate that calibration offers two benefits over use of the traditional weights: It reduces conditional bias at the state level while simultaneously improving estimated precision. These findings support prior research conducted for the NCVS in states and metropolitan statistical areas, where calibration removed conditional bias and improved precision of the estimates (Shook-Sa et al., 2015).

The evaluation of estimate precision reinforces the use of recalibrated weights.

Furthermore, the precision evaluation shows that precision levels for the calculated estimates in the seven largest states are reasonable. Of the 831 domain-level estimates for states that were based on 4 years of pooled data, 85 (10.2%) of the calibrated estimates were flagged as unreliable based on having a numerator sample size less than or equal to 10 or a percent RSE of more than 50%. The majority of flagged estimates were for the two-variable crosses rather than for the main effects. Of the 520 domain-level estimates for states that were based on 2 years of pooled data, 87 (16.7%) of the calibrated estimates were flagged as unreliable. These estimates were primarily within the race and Hispanic origin domain. Of the 112 overall annual estimates for states, two (1.8%) estimates were flagged as unreliable. This provides assurance that the SCS data support BJS's goal of producing a substantive bullying report, provided that domain-level estimates are based on data that are pooled across two or more SCS years.

SECTION 4. SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The School Crime Supplement (SCS), administered through the National Crime Victimization Survey (NCVS), was designed to produce national estimates. Before SCS estimates were being calculated and reported at the state level, researchers evaluated the representativeness of sample weights and current SCS weights and developed an appropriate recalibration approach. An assessment of the representativeness of the SCS sample within the seven largest states was conducted by comparing weighted distributions of key student-level demographic characteristics to external control totals based on the Common Core Data (CCD), the most accurate state-level public school data available. Whereas, the total counts of public school students in grades 6 through 12 compared reasonably well, there were non-negligible differences for some states and across student subgroups, and the current SCS weights overrepresented or underrepresented subpopulations at the state level. SCS weights were recalibrated based on CCD control totals, and bullying count and prevalence rate estimates based on the original and recalibrated weights were compared. Findings show the recalibrated weights simultaneously reduced conditional bias in state-level bullying measures and improved precision when a simultaneous estimation and recalibration approach was implemented.

Based on the results of the representativeness and weighting evaluations, recalibrated weights should be used in all SCS analyses of bullying measures in public schools within the seven largest states. These analyses also found that there were minimal differences between the SCS weight sums and CCD sums at the national level, and reweighting to CCD control totals led to negligible differences in bullying point estimates at the national level. This outcome ensures that the weighting methodology applied at the state level is removing conditional bias due to demographic differences at the subnational level rather than fundamental differences between the national and subnational weighting processes. Because the national weights provide relatively consistent bullying measures, and to maintain consistency with all other published SCS estimates, the original SCS weights should be maintained for all national SCS estimates.

The findings in this report support prior research conducted for the NCVS in states and metropolitan statistical areas, where the national weights were found to misrepresent some subdomains within the population when applied to the subnational level. As with the SCS analysis, the NCVS analysis found that calibration removed conditional bias and improved

estimated precision rates (Shook-Sa et al., 2015). Because the SCS is conducted within the NCVS, the consistent findings ensure the robustness of these evaluations and conclusions.


These evaluations were conducted to produce SCS estimates for public school students only. Further research is needed for future studies that include private school students in the target population. Researchers would need to locate external control totals and conduct a similar analysis to the one described in this report to assess the representativeness of national SCS weights for the private school population. This analysis provides some evidence that state-level SCS estimates of private school students that are based on the original SCS weights could exhibit bias, so reporting of these estimates is not recommended without further evaluation.


