


NATIONAL INCIDENT-BASED REPORTING SYSTEM

Sexual Assaults Recorded by Law Enforcement, 2015

This report presents statistics on <u>sexual assault victimizations</u> that were reported to NIBRS in 2015 by law enforcement agencies in 15 states. The National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) captures detailed information on four types of violent sexual assaults recorded by law enforcement: rape, sodomy, sexual assault with an object, and fondling. This report contains interactive charts that compare the demographic characteristics of sexual assaults to victims of other serious violent crimes, estimates of sexual victimization rates by victim demographic characteristics, and statistics on police clearance and arrest outcomes for sexual assaults. Data for this report were submitted by state and local law enforcement agencies from 15 states certified by the FBI to report all of their 2015 crime data to NIBRS. Those 15 NIBRS-certified states are highlighted in the map below.

#### In 2015 in South Carolina—

- 14% of all violent victimizations involved a sexual assault; the percentage was higher for females (12%) than for males (2%).
  - There were 77.9 sexual assault victimizations per 100,000 persons; the rate was 6 times higher for juveniles (224.4) than for adults (35.2).
- The average age of sexual assault victims was 11 years for males and 19 years for females.
- 93% of sexual assault victimizations were committed by someone the victim knew.

# Violent Victimizations That Involved a Sexual Assault

Over one-eighth of all violent victimizations recorded by law enforcement in South Carolina involved a sexual assault offense of rape, sexual assault with an object, sodomy, or fondling.

Most sexual assaults—85%—were against a female victim, while males were the majority—58%—of victims of non-sexual violent crimes, such as robbery, aggravated assault, kidnapping, and homicide.


In 2015, sexual assaults against females made up a sizeable portion

-about 12%-of all violent victimizations recorded by South Carolina law enforcement agencies.


On average, sexual assault victims were younger than victims of non-sexual violence. The majority—65%—of sexual assaults in South Carolina were against juvenile victims age 17 or younger, while juveniles accounted for a considerably smaller portion—12%—of non-sexual violent victimizations.

Sexual assaults against juveniles made up 9% of all violent crimes handled by South Carolina law enforcement in 2015.


Nearly three-fifths of the violent crimes experienced by victims ages 5 to 13 involved a sexual assault, making the victims in this age group the most likely to experience violence of a sexual nature.

Violent victimizations against youth age 17 or younger were more likely to involve a sexual assault than violent victimizations against victims age 18 or older. About 38% of violent crime victims ages 14 to 17 experienced a sexual assault, compared to 9% of victims ages 18 to 24.



Violent crimes against young females were more likely to involve a violent sexual assault than those committed against young males. About 73% of violent crimes against females ages 5 to 13 involved a sexual assault, compared to 35% for males in the same age group.

## Violent victimizations of females that involved a sexual assault, by victim age, South Carolina, 2015



# Characteristics of Sexual Assault Victims and Incidents

Sexual victimization and abuse can take on various forms. NIBRS captures information on four unique <u>sexual assault</u> <u>offense types</u>: rape, sodomy, sexual assault with an object, and fondling. Rape, sexual assault with an object, and sodomy offenses form the basis of the official <u>UCR definition of rape</u> in the United States. NIBRS provides detailed information about the context of sexual assault victimizations, such as the demographic characteristics of victims and offenders, the type of location and time of day during which these victimizations occur, the relationship of the victim to the offender, and the type of weapon or force used by the offender.


#### SEXUAL ASSAULT OFFENSE TYPES

The majority of sexual assault victimizations recorded by South Carolina law enforcement in 2015 consisted of fondling (40%) and rape (45%).



The age groups with the highest proportion of rapes recorded by law enforcement were victims ages 14 to 17 (25%) and ages 18 to 24 (20%). Approximately 45% of sodomy and 49% of fondling victimizations were committed against victims in one age group—children ages 5 to 13. Cases of fondling against children in this age group accounted for one-fifth (19%) of all sexual assaults recorded in 2015.

#### SEXUAL ASSAULT VICTIMS AND OFFENDERS


Most sexual assaults recorded by law enforcement were committed by someone the victim knew, typically a friend or acquaintance (53%) or a non-intimate family member (31%).

A small fraction—7%—of sexual assaults were committed by a stranger.

The majority of sexual assaults were committed against victims ages 5 to 17. Victimizations against children ages 5 to 13 accounted for over one-third of all sexual assaults recorded by law enforcement, and those against children ages 14 to 17 accounted for one-fifth.


Sexual assaults against children were far less likely to be committed by a stranger than those against victims age 18 or older.

Family members committed over two-thirds (69%) of all sexual assaults against young children under age 5 and half (50%) of those against children ages 5 to 13. Most sexual assaults against victims age 14 or older were committed by friends and acquaintances.








## Sexual assault victimizations of females, by victim age and offender sex, South Carolina, 2015

#### TYPE OF WEAPON AND FORCE USED


Nearly four-fifths—78%—of all sexual assaults were committed using personal weapons, such as the offender's hands, fists, feet, arms, teeth, etc. while nearly one-fifth (17%) involved no weapon or force.

Firearms were rarely used to commit sexual assaults. In South Carolina in 2015, 1.5% of all sexual assaults were committed with a firearm.



Firearms were rarely used to commit sexual assaults, regardless of the type of sexual assault committed. A firearm was used in 2.8% of rape offense victimizations and in 1.3%, 0%, and 0.3% of victimizations that involved sodomy, sexual assault with an object, or fondling, respectively.



Sex offenders used personal weapons such as hands, fists, feet, arms, teeth, etc. in 71% or more of sexual assault victimizations, regardless of whether the offender was a stranger (71%) or someone the victim knew, such as an acquaintance (78%) or an intimate partner (77%).

In 2015, there were 20 recorded sexual assault victimizations (0.6% of all sexual assault victimizations) committed by a stranger armed with a gun.

#### TIME OF DAY AND LOCATION OF SEXUAL ASSAULTS


Sexual assault victimizations recorded by law enforcement peaked at 8 a.m. and 12pm

However, the time of day at which sexual assaults occurred was strongly correlated with victim age. A juvenile was the victim in most sexual assaults that occurred between the daytime hours of 8:00 am and 6:00 pm. Persons age 18 or older were the most common victims of sexual assaults that occurred in the late evening and early morning hours between 11:00 pm and 6:00 am.



# PART 3 Rates of Sexual Assault Victimization, by Victim Demographics


Information on victim characteristics in NIBRS was combined with <u>U.S. Census population</u> <u>estimates</u> to calculate victimization rates for select demographic groups. The charts below display the overall sexual assault victimization rate for the state and rates for persons grouped by sex, race, and age. When expressed as a rate per 100,000 residents, NIBRS victimization data provides one indicator of the extent to which some demographic groups are at greater risk of sexual assault victimization relative to their share of the state population.

In 2015, there were 77.9 sexual assault victimizations per 100,000 South Carolina residents. The rate was 6 times higher for females (129.4) than for males (23.2).



The rate of sexual assault victimization in South Carolina was 99.3 per 100,000 for blacks, compared to 71.7 for whites, 15.1 for Native Americans/Alaska Natives, and 38.5 for persons of other races.



In South Carolina, black females experienced the highest rate of sexual assault victimization (158.1 per 100,000), about 2 times the overall rate for South Carolina (77.9).


Teens ages 14 to 17 experienced the highest rate of sexual assault victimization, compared to other age groups. In 2015, police recorded an estimated 775 sexual assaults against persons ages 14 to 17 (312.0 per 100,000), a rate 4 times higher than the overall rate (77.9) for South Carolina.

The rate of sexual assault victimization for females ages 14 to 17 (581.0 per 100,000) was 11 times higher than the rate for boys in this same age group (52.2 per 100,000) and 7 times higher than the overall rate for South Carolina (77.9).

## PART 4 Clearance and Arrest

NIBRS is the only source of incident-based crime data that also provides information about whether sexual assault incidents are cleared and whether law enforcement agencies make an arrest. NIBRS also allows users to examine whether police <u>clearance</u> and arrest outcomes vary according to attributes of the <u>incident</u>, such as the type of sexual assault(s) committed, whether the victim and offender were strangers, whether a weapon was used, and the time of day and location of the incident.

The result is a detailed picture of law enforcement handling of sexual assault incidents that come to their attention. For each sexual assault recorded by law enforcement, NIBRS captures information on whether the incident was cleared and whether the incident was cleared by arrest or by exceptional means. Sexual assault incidents that are cleared by exceptional means are considered solved for administrative purposes but do not result in an arrest or in the prosecution of the offender(s).


At least 34% of murder/non-negligent manslaughter, aggravated assault, or kidnapping incidents resulted in an arrest. For sexual assault incidents, 17% resulted in an arrest.

<u>Under certain circumstances</u>, law enforcement agencies may clear an incident by exceptional means rather than arrest. While the incident is still considered cleared, the clearance does not result in the arrest or conviction of an offender. In South Carolina, the exceptional clearance rate for sexual assaults was 16%, compared to 6% for robberies, 14% for aggravated assaults, and 8% for kidnappings.



For every age category, at least 62% of sexual assault incidents were not cleared by law enforcement. Sexual assault incidents involving victims ages 14 to 17 had the highest percentage of incidents resulting in an arrest.
